A Proposed Law intituled "Appropriation Act 1935-36", as finally passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth, having been presented to the Governor-General for the Royal Assent, His Excellency has, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, assented to the said Law.

    - (c) used by him on or after the seventh day of January, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-six, and prior to a date fixed by proclamation under the Act incorporated with the Flour Tax Act (No. 1) 1934 as amended by the Act passed to give effect to this Resolution, in the manufacture of goods.
  - (2) That flour tax be imposed upon flour, and upon the goods specified in the Schedule to the Flour Tax Act (No. 3) 1934, imported into Australia and on or after the seventh day of January, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-six and, prior to a date fixed by proclamation under the Act incorporated with the Flour Tax Act (No. 3) 1934 as amended by the Act passed to give effect to this Resolution, entered for home consumption under the law relating to the Customs, at the rate of Two pounds twelve shillings and sixpence per ton in respect of each pound of that flour and in respect of each pound of flour used in the manufacture of those goods.
