Statute of Westminster Adoption Bill.—Mr. Casey (Treasurer), for Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General), moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to provide for the adoption of sections two, three, four, five and six of the Statute of Westminster, 1931, and for other purposes. Question—put and passed.
- 6. Colonial Light Dues Collection Bill (1936).—Mr. Casey (Treasurer), for Mr. Thorby (Assistant Minister for Commerce), moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Colonial Light Dues Collection Act 1932–1934 and for other purposes. Question—put and passed.
- 7. Message from the Governor-General.—States Grants (Unemployment Relief) Bill.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and was read by Mr. Speaker:-

GOWRIE,

Message No. 122.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund sums for the purposes of Financial Assistance to the States of the Commonwealth in the provision of Assistance to persons out of employment.

Canberra, 23rd November, 1936.

Ordered-That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Casey (Treasurer) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund sums for the purposes of Financial Assistance to the States of the Commonwealth in the provision of Assistance to persons out of employment.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

Mr. Casey moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Casey, was adopted by the House.

Ordered -That Mr. Casey and Sir Henry Gullett do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Casey then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed —Bill read a first time. Mr. Casey moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Clause 1—

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

Resolved -That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

7. WAYS AND MEANS [CUSTOMS TARIFF AMENDMENT (No. 6)].—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.
