Message No. 59.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for the application of certain Funds vested in the Australian Wool Realization Commission.

Canberra, 23rd July, 1946.

"(3.) Where an application is made under sub-section (2.) of section fifty-one of this Act, for a declaration that the Crown in right of the Commonwealth or a State has contravened section forty-three of this Act, the declaration shall not be made if it is proved that the act or omission which is alleged to constitute the contravention was duly directed, approved or consented to by a Local Committee or, on review or appeal, by the Central Committee or a court, and that the decision of the Local Committee or Central Committee, as the case may be, does not stand reversed as th result of review or appeal."

No. 2.—Page 18, clause 50, line 31, leave out "or added tradesman".

No. 3.—Page 18, clause 50, line 35, leave out "added tradesman".

No. 4.—Page 18, lines 39 to 43, leave out clause 51, insert the following clause:—

"51.—(1.) If any person (not being the Crown in right of the Commonwealth or a State) contravenes, or fails to comply with, any provision of this Act, or fails to comply with any order of a court or direction of a Committee made or given under this Act, that person shall be guilty of an offence punishable, upon conviction, by a fine not exceeding One hundred pounds or imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months, or both.

(2.) Where a person considers that the Crown in right of the Commonwealth or a State has contravened, or failed to comply with any provision of this Act, or failed to comply with any order of a court or direction of a Committee made or given under this Act, that person may make an application to a court of summary jurisdiction constituted by a Police, Stipendary or Special

Magistrate for a declaration accordingly.

"(3.) The court shall hear the application and, if the court is satisfied that there has been any

such contravention or failure, make a declaration accordingly.

"(4.) The Governor-General may make regulations, not inconsistent with this Act, prescribing the procedure to be observed with respect to the making and hearing of applications under subsection (2.) of this section."

No. 5.—Page 20, Fourth Schedule, after "Refrigeration mechanic or serviceman.", insert "Shift

And so it was resolved in the affirmative.—Bill read a second time.
