In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to make provision for Pensions for Judges of Courts established under laws of the Commonwealth and to make provision for the families of such Judges, and for other purposes.

Canberra, 16th November, 1948.

Ordered—That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clauses 10 and 11 agreed to.

Clause 12 debated and agreed to.

Clauses 13 and 14 agreed to.

Clause 15 debated-

Mr. Spender moved, as an amendment, That the words ", unless the Governor-General otherwise decides, be payable to a Judge, or to the widow and children of a Judge, who has been removed under section seventy-two of the Constitution" (page 5, lines 1-4) be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:—" be payable to a Judge who has been removed under section seventy-two of the Constitution on the ground of misbehaviour being proved misdemeanour or felony under the law of the Commonwealth or of a State".

Debate continued.

Question-That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the clause-put,

(a) by omitting sub-section (1.) and inserting in its stead the following sub-section: (1.) Every dwelling house in which the Director has an interest, and all building material on the site of, and for use in the erection of, a dwelling house in which the Director has or will have an interest, shall be insured as prescribed against fire and prescribed risks.'; and ".

Page 2, omit paragraph (c). Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clauses 3 and 4 agreed to.

Title agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mr. Clark reported accordingly.
