No. 13.—*Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Bill (continued)*—Clause 62—

62. (1) Any of the following associations may, on compliance with the prescribed conditions, be registered in the manner prescribed as an organization:—

- (a) Any association of employers in or in connexion with any industry, who have in the aggregate, throughout the six months next preceding the application for registration, employed on an average taken per month not less than one hundred employees in that industry; and
- (b) Any association of not less than one hundred employees in or in connexion with any industry.

^ (2) The conditions to be complied with by associations so applying for registration shall, until otherwise prescribed, be as set out in Schedule B.

(3) Upon registration, the association shall become and be an organization.

—(*Prime Minister.*)

And several amendments having been proposed as follow, viz.:—

(A)—That the following words be inserted after paragraph (b):—

“ Provided that ^ no association shall be registered—

(I.) Unless it has been formed and exists solely for the purposes of this Act, or ”

—(*Mr. Glynn.*)

(B)—That the following words be inserted in the proposed amendment of *Mr. Glynn* (A) after the words “ Provided that ” :—

“ no such organization shall be entitled to ^ [submit any industrial dispute to] the Court when and so long as its rules or other binding decisions permit the application of its funds to political purposes, or require its members to do anything of a political character.”

—(*Mr. McCay.*)

(C)—That the words “any declaration of preference by [^]” be inserted after the words “entitled to” in the proposed amendment of *Mr. McCay* (B).

—(*Mr. Groom.*)

(D)—That the words “or to” be added to the proposed amendment of *Mr. Groom* (C).

—(*Mr. McCay*)——

Question—That the words (“or to”) proposed to be added to the proposed amendment of *Mr. Groom* (C) be so added—put.
