A.N.Z.U.S. COUNCIL-FIRST MEETING-MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-LEAVE TO INCORPORATE IN Hansard—Statement by Mr. Speaker.—Mr. Casey (Minister for External Affairs) was granted leave to have incorporated in the Report of Parliamentary Debates, without reading the matter to the House, a Ministerial Statement with reference to the first meeting of the A.N.Z.U.S. Council established under the terms of the Security Treaty between Australia, New Zealand and the United States of America.
 - Mr. Speaker stated that the granting of leave in such a case was unusual. The House was master of its own business but he hoped there would be an understanding that the matter would not be drawn into precedent.
