MONDAY, 16TH NOVEMBER, 1964.

1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
2. PETITIONS.—Mr. Aston presented a petition from certain residents and electors of the Commonwealth, members of the Russian Orthodox Church (Abroad), praying that for the sake of the persecuted and oppressed believers in the U.S.S.R. and in the name of the sacred human rights free people are bound to preserve and uphold, the Parliament add its authoritative voice to the universal protest against oppression and persecution of religion in the U.S.S.R.
Mr. Cockle presented a petition from certain residents of Neutral Bay, Cremorne, Mosman and North Sydney praying that the proposal to develop the Neutral Bay submarine base be re-considered.
Petitions severally received and read.
3. QUESTIONS.—Questions without notice were asked.
