- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 GWYDIR ELECTORAL DIVISION—ISSUE OF WRIT: Mr Speaker informed the House that he had this day issued a writ for the election of a Member to serve for the Electoral Division of Gwydir, in the State of New South Wales, in the place of Mr Archibald Ian Allan, resigned. The dates in connection with the election were fixed as follows:

Date of nomination Friday, 16 May 1969. .. Saturday, 7 June 1969.

Date of polling ... Date of return of writ On or before Friday, 4 July 1969.

3 Petition: Mr Whittorn presented a petition from certain residents of Victoria praying that the Commonwealth Government place an immediate and total ban on the export of all kangaroo meat and fur products and set up a body to administer conservation of kangaroos in all States of Australia.

Petition received and read.

- 4 OUESTIONS: Ouestions without notice were asked.
- 5 DROUGHT BONDS-MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr McMahon (Treasurer), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of the main principles of the scheme previously announced by the Government to issue drought bonds. Mr Patterson, by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 6 Message from the Senate—Merino export embargo: Mr Speaker reported the receipt of the following message from the Senate:

MR SPEAKER. Message No. 179

The Senate transmits to the House of Representatives the following Resolution which was agreed to by the Senate on Tuesday, 29 April 1969, viz.:

"That the Senate is of opinion that the embargo on the export of Merinos should not be removed at this time and that the embargo should remain in force until a majority of those persons affected shall decide by referendum or other fair means in favour of removing or relaxing the embargo.".

 - (5A) That the Chairman of the Committee may from time to time appoint another member of the Committee to be Deputy Chairman, and that the member so appointed act as Chairman of the Committee at any time when the Chairman is not present at a meeting of the Committee.
 - (5B) That the Deputy Chairman, when acting as Chairman, have a deliberative vote and, in the event of an equality of votes, also have a casting vote. Question—put and passed.
- 10 SUPERANNUATION BILL (No. 2) 1969: Mr McMahon (Treasurer), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Superannuation. Bill read a first time.

Mr McMahon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
