TUESDAY, 15 SEPTEMBER 1970

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: Mr Whittorn presented a petition from certain residents of Victoria praying that the export of products made from kangaroos be banned and the Commonwealth Government take necessary steps to have all wildlife in Australia brought under its control.

Petition received and read.

A similar petition was presented by Mr Fox, and was received.

Mr Hughes (Attorney-General) presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) the allowance of personal education expenses as a taxation deduction, (2) the removal of the present age limit in respect of the deduction for education expenses, (3) an increase in the deduction allowable for tertiary education expenses and (4) the exemption of nonbonded scholarships for part-time students from income tax.

Petition received.

Mr Grassby presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House provide the finance to enable State Education Departments and local government authorities to establish pre-school centres, after-school centres and facilities for training staff for the centres.

Petition received and read.

- 3 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr McEwen (Deputy Prime Minister) informed the House of the following ministerial arrangements during the respective absences abroad of Mr McMahon (Minister for External Affairs), Mr Bury (Treasurer), Mr Sinclair (Minister for Shipping and Transport) and Senator Wright (Minister for Works):
 - Mr Swartz (Minister for National Development) was acting as Minister for External Affairs;

Mr Gorton (Prime Minister) was acting as Treasurer;

- Senator Cotton (Minister for Civil Aviation) was acting as Minister for Shipping and Transport and would be represented in this House by Mr Nixon (Minister for the Interior); and
- Mr Chipp (Minister for Customs and Excise) was acting as Minister for Works and would be represented in the Senate by Senator Sir Kenneth Anderson (Minister for Supply) who would also represent the Ministers for Labour and National Service, Education and Science and External Territories and the Attorney-General.

- 9 SHELTERED EMPLOYMENT (ASSISTANCE) BILL 1970: Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Sheltered Employment (Assistance) Act 1967.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Wentworth moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.
