- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Mackay presented a petition from certain citizens of New South Wales praying that this House take immediate steps to increase the base pension rate to 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings.
 - Mr Mackay also presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of Lowe praying that the House seek to ensure that Commonwealth legislation bearing on censorship of films, literature and radio and television programmes is so framed and so administered as to preserve sound moral standards in the community. Petitions severally received.
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 PAPERS: The following papers were presented, pursuant to statute:
 - Australian Tourist Commission Act—Australian Tourist Commission—Third Annual Report and financial statements, together with the Auditor-General's Report, for year 1969-70.
 - Export Payments Insurance Corporation Act—Export Payments Insurance Corporation—Fourteenth Annual Report and financial statements, together with the Auditor-General's Report, for year 1969-70.
 - Tariff Board Act—Tariff Board—Report for year 1969-70, together with Summary of Recommendations and statement of action taken in respect of the Recommendations.
- 5 PRECEDENCE TO GOVERNMENT BUSINESS: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, pursuant to notice—That government business shall take precedence over general business tomorrow.
 - Question—put and passed.
- 6 POST AND TELEGRAPH RATES BILL 1970: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—
 - Debate resumed by Mr Crean who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "the Bill be withdrawn and that a Joint Select Committee be appointed to inquire into the desirability and practicability of removing the Australian Post Office from the administrative influence of the Public Service Board and of establishing a public corporation to manage the business of the Post Office".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.
