- 1 The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Gun presented a petition from certain citizens of South Australia praying that the export of all kangaroo products, including pet foods and furs, be banned immediately.

Petition received and read.

Mr L. F. Bowen presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.

Petition received.

- 3 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr McMahon (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Mr Anthony (Minister for Trade and Industry), Mr Nixon (Minister for Shipping and Transport) was acting as Minister for Trade and Industry.
- 4 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 5 Messages from the Senate: Messages from the Senate were reported returning the following Bills without amendment:

1 April 1971-Message-

No. 142-Dried Fruits Research 1971.

No. 143—Dried Fruits Levy 1971 (without requests).

6 ALTERATION OF DAY OF NEXT MEETING: Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved—That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Tuesday next at half-past two o'clock p.m. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

7 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—MINISTERIAL CONTROL OF ARMED FORCES:
Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition)
had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House
for discussion, namely, "The unresolved issue of Ministerial control of the Armed
Forces"

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Barnard addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

8 Public Works Committee—Reference of Work—Development roads, Stuart and Victoria Highways, N.T.: Mr Chipp (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1969, the following proposed works be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for investigation and report: Construction of Northern Territory development roads—Alice Springs to Erldunda section of Stuart Highway and Timber Creek to Dingo Gap section of Victoria Highway.

Mr Chipp presented plans in connection with the proposed works. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

9 REPATRIATION BILL 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "whilst not opposing the second reading of the Bill, the House is of the opinion that—

- (1) the pension rate for the totally and permanently incapacitated ex-servicemen, the general rate pensioners and war widows should not have been allowed to decline notwithstanding the proposed increases, in relation to average weekly earnings, and
- (2) a joint select committee should be appointed to inquire into and make recommendations on all aspects of the provisions and operation of the Repatriation Act".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Holten (Minister for Repatriation), the Bill was read a third time.

11 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Swartz (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.
