# THURSDAY, 28 OCTOBER 1971

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Acting Speaker (Mr Lucock) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Federal Government take immediate steps to act on behalf of all Australian people to preserve Lake Pedder in its natural state.

Petition received and read.

Similar petitions were presented by Mr Everingham and Mr Garrick, and were severally received.

Mr FitzPatrick presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House should (1) increase monetary aid for the refugees in India to at least \$10 million immediately and make provision for a further and extra grant for the victims of the famine in East Pakistan, (2) grant tax deductibility to donations of \$2 and over to Australian voluntary agencies working with the refugee problem and (3) ensure that the Australian Government does all in its power to help bring about a political settlement which would be acceptable to the people of East Pakistan.

Petition received and read.

Similar petitions to that presented by Mr FitzPatrick were presented by Mr Bennett, Mr Sherry, Mr Kirwan, Mr Enderby and Mr Jenkins, and were severally received.

Mr Stewart presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.

Mr Reid presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take steps to offer employment, at least on a temporary basis, in order to effect some relief, to academic and qualified persons among the refugees from Bangla Desh.

Mr Berinson, Mr Webb and Mr Bennett each presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the sales tax and customs duties on all forms of contraceptive devices be removed, and that all contraceptive devices be placed on the National Health Scheme Pharmaceutical Benefits list.

Mr Pettitt presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government grant income tax deduction for donations over \$2 made towards the relief of overseas disaster areas and that this be effected with haste to ensure the maximum possible aid to those at present in refugee camps and those in danger of famine in East Pakistan.

Mr Kirwan also presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House give earnest consideration to the crisis in Aboriginal welfare which exists in the South West Land Division of Western Australia.

Petitions severally received.

Mr Bennett also presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take immediate steps to abolish the means test for all people who have reached retiring age or who otherwise qualify for social service benefits or pensions.

Mr Bennett also presented a petition from certain residents of Western Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to ensure provision of funds to provide for the all-weather sealing of the Eyre Highway.

Petitions severally received and read.

Mr Dobie presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House will take immediate steps to release Geoff Mullen and other non-compliers with the National Service Act, and will repeal the National Service Act. Petition received.

3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.

5 H.M.A.S. Leeuwin—Incidents involving recruits—Report of Judicial inquiry—Ministerial statement: Mr Mackay (Minister for the Navy), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of the findings of His Honour Judge Rapke in his inquiry into incidents involving the alleged maltreatment of recruits by other recruits at H.M.A.S. Leeuwin.

Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) and Mr Beazley, by leave, also made statements with reference to the matter.

Mr Mackay, by leave, made a further statement with reference to the matter.

9 DRIED VINE FRUITS LEVY BILL 1971: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry) presented a Bill for an Act to impose a Levy on certain Dried Vine Fruits.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 DRIED VINE FRUITS LEVY COLLECTION BILL 1971: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry) presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Collection of Levy imposed on certain Dried Vine Fruits.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

11 DRIED VINE FRUITS STABILIZATION BILL 1971: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Certain Dried Vine Fruits. Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 STATES GRANTS (UNIVERSITIES) BILL (No. 2) 1971: Mr J. M. Fraser (Minister for Education and Science), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Grant of Financial Assistance to the States in Connexion with Universities.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Fraser moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Stewart), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 Excise Tariff Bill 1971: Mr Chipp (Minister for Customs and Excise) presented a Bill for an Act relating to Duties of Excise.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Chipp moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 Customs Tariff Bill (No. 3) 1971: Mr Chipp (Minister for Customs and Excise) presented a Bill for an Act relating to Duties of Customs.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Chipp moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

15 EXPORT INCENTIVE GRANTS BILL 1971: Mr Peacock (Minister assisting the Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Grants for the purpose of providing Export Incentives.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Peacock moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

16 STATES GRANTS (SPECIAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1971: Mr Peacock (Minister assisting the Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the States of South Australia and Tasmania.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Peacock moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
