HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

No. 172

THURSDAY, 11 MAY 1972

- 1 The House met, at ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Acting Speaker (Mr Lucock) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following honourable Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Peacock (Minister for External Territories), Mr Calwell, Mr Armitage, Mr Bonnett, Mr Calder, Mr C. R. Cameron, Mr Corbett, Mr Fox, Mr Grassby, Mr Jacobi, Mr Jarman, Mr L. K. Johnson, Mr Keating, Mr Kelly, Mr Keogh, Mr Maisey and Mr Robinson—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will immediately enact legislation providing for a base pension rate of 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings and other health and social service changes and initiate a public inquiry into Australia's social welfare structure.
 - Mr Swartz (Minister for National Development), Mr Bonnett, Mr Duthie, Mr Giles, Mr Jacobi and Mr O'Keefe—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House will take immediate steps to call a halt to the closing of post offices and the reorganisation of the Post Office and initiate a joint parliamentary inquiry into the Postmaster-General's Department.
 - Mr Luchetti—from certain residents of the western suburbs in the Sydney metropolitan area and surrounding districts praying that this House take appropriate steps to ensure that the Government does not proceed with the proposal to site the second twenty-four hour international airport for Sydney at Richmond or anywhere else in the far western suburbs of the metropolitan area.
 - Mr Keating—from certain employees of the aircraft industry of Australia and citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the policy statement by Mr Fairbairn (Minister for Defence) referring to aircraft production be rescinded and immediate contracts be placed with the Australian aircraft industry to design and construct aircraft to meet immediate and future needs of the armed services to provide effective defence for the nation.
