- 1 The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

 - Sir John Cramer, Mr Graham, Mr Kerin, Mr Lloyd, Mr MacKellar, Mr Morris, Mr Olley, Mr Ruddock and Mr Turner—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House see that television is used to build into the nation integrity, teamwork and a sense of purpose by serving, and to bring faith in God to the heart of the family and national life.
 - Mr Hayden (Minister for Social Security), Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Cooke, Mr Davies, Mr Drury, Mr Killen and Mr Wilson—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the existing national health scheme.
 - Mr Coates—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House move to make available to the Tasmanian Government a special grant for the purpose of securing Lake Pedder in its natural state.
 - Mr Coates—from certain citizens of Tasmania praying that Parliament move swiftly to stop the flooding of Lake Pedder until the committee of inquiry brings down its report and recommendations.
 - Mr Garrick—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House immediately revoke all Australian whaling licences and ban the importation of all whale produce.
