#### WEDNESDAY, 28 NOVEMBER 1973

- 1 The House met, at half-past eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following honourable Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Adermann, Mr Berinson, Mr Bonnett, Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Cooke, Mr Corbett, Mr Drury, Mr Jarman, Mr Katter, Mr Killen, Mr McVeigh, Mr E. L. Robinson, Mr Viner, Mr Wallis and Mr Wilson—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the existing national health scheme.
  - Mr Edwards, Mr Keating, Mr Ruddock and Mr Wentworth—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House see that television is used to build into the nation integrity, teamwork and a sense of purpose by serving, and to bring faith in God to the heart of the family and national life.
  - Mr Jarman and Mr Staley—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House acknowledge the right of every Australian child to equal grants of Government money spent on education.
  - Mr Edwards—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take steps to ensure that the Government does not site a second international airport for Sydney in the Galston area or surrounding suburbs.
  - Mr Staley—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House immediately revoke all Australian whaling licences and ban the importation of all whale produce.

10 AUSTRALIAN APPLE AND PEAR CORPORATION BILL 1973: Dr Patterson (Minister representing the Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to Establish an Australian Apple and Pear Corporation.

Bill read a first time.

Dr Patterson moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Bonnett), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Bill read a first time.

- 16 MODERNISATION OF H.M.A. NAVAL DOCKYARD (STAGE 1), WILLIAMSTOWN, VIC.---APPROVAL OF WORK: Mr L. R. Johnson (Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice-That, in accordance with the provisions of the Public Works Committee Act 1969-1973, it is expedient to carry out the following proposed work which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works and on which the committee has duly reported to Parliament: Modernisation of H.M.A. Naval Dockyard (stage 1), Williamstown, Vic.
