THURSDAY, 4 APRIL 1974

- 1 The House met, at ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DEATH OF THE PRESIDENT OF FRANCE (M. GEORGES POMPIDOU): Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) referred to the death of President Georges Pompidou of France and informed the House that His Excellency the Governor-General would represent Australia at the State memorial service for the late President. A message of sympathy had been sent to the Prime Minister of France extending the condolences of the Government and the people of Australia.

Mr Snedden (Leader of the Opposition), Mr Anthony (Leader of the Australian Country Party) and Mr Wentworth joined in the expressions of condolence.

As a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased all Members stood, in silence.

- 3 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Adermann, Mr Armitage, Mr Katter and Mr Keogh—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House immediately revoke all Australian whaling licences and ban the importation of all whale produce.
 - Mr Drury, Mr MacKellar, Mr McLeay and Mr Staley—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the existing national health scheme.
 - Mr Barnard (Minister for Defence)—from certain citizens of Australia praying that sub-clause 10 (3) of the Human Rights Bill 1973 be amended by adding the following words: "and no revenue derived in any way from any Australian citizen shall be appropriated by the Australian Government, or by a State Government, or by a Municipal Government, for the propagation or support of any religion".
 - Mr McLeay—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government legislate to protect the whale from commercial exploitation.
 - Mr Staley—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House acknowledge the right of every Australian child to equal grants of Government money spent on education.

- 7 FREEWAY PLANS IN STATE CAPITAL CITIES—REPORT AND MINISTERIAL STATEMENT— MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPERS: Mr Uren (Minister for Urban and Regional Development), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

- 8 COMMITTEE OF PRIVILEGES—REPORT: Mr Enderby (Chairman) brought up the following report from the Committee of Privileges:
 - Report relating to a letter fraudulently written in the name of the honourable Member for Casey, published in *The Sun News-Pictorial* on 6 December 1973, together with minutes of proceedings of the committee.

Ordered to be printed.

- Ordered—That the consideration of the report be made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 9 ALTERATION OF DAY OF NEXT MEETING: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved—That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Monday next at eleven o'clock a.m., or such time thereafter as Mr Speaker may take the Chair. Question—put and passed.
- 10 STATES GRANTS (URBAN PUBLIC TRANSPORT) BILL 1974: Mr Jones (Minister for Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Financial Assistance to the States for the purpose of Urban Public Transport.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Jones moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

- Debate adjourned (Mr Street), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 11 URBAN PUBLIC TRANSPORT (RESEARCH AND PLANNING) BILL 1974: Mr Jones (Minister for Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to make Provision with respect to Research and Planning in connexion with Urban Public Transport. Bill read a first time.

Mr Jones moved--That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Street), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 12 POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY: Ordered—That orders of the day Nos. 1 to 3, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 13 FISHERIES (PAPUA NEW GUINEA BOATS) BILL 1974: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Dr Patterson (Minister representing the Minister for Primary Industry), the Bill was read a third time.

14 SUPERANNUATION (DISTRIBUTION OF SURPLUS) BILL 1974: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

- On the motion of Mr Daly (Minister for Services and Property), the Bill was read a third time.
- 15 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE: A message from the Senate was reported acquainting the House that the Senate had agreed to the amendment made by the House in the following Bill:

4 April 1974—Message No. 14—Legislative Drafting Institute 1973.

16 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 4) 1973-74: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Ordered—That Mr Snedden (Leader of the Opposition) be granted an extension of time. Debate continued.

Ordered—That Mr Lynch (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) be granted an extension of time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Daly—Leader of the House), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

- 17 SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS—HEALTH INSURANCE BILLS—LIMITATION OF DEBATE: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent—
 - (1) a Health Insurance Bill 1973 and a Health Insurance Commission Bill 1973
 - (a) being presented forthwith and read a first time together and one motion being moved without delay and one question being put in regard to, respectively, the second readings, the committee's report stage, and the third readings, of the Bills together, and
 - (b) being considered in one committee of the whole.
 - (2) the Leader of the House making one declaration of urgency and moving one motion for the allotment of time in respect of a Health Insurance Bill 1973 and a Health Insurance Commission Bill 1973.

Debate ensued.

The time allowed by standing order 91 for debate on the motion having expired— Question—put and passed, with the concurrence of an absolute majority.

18 DECLARATION OF HEALTH INSURANCE BILLS AS URGENT BILLS—LIMITATION OF DEBATE: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) declared that the Health Insurance Bill 1973 and the Health Insurance Commission Bill 1973 were urgent Bills.

Question—That the Bills be considered urgent Bills—put and passed.

Allotment of time: Mr Daly then moved—That, notwithstanding the order of the House of 7 March 1974, the time allotted in connection with the Bills be as follows:

(1) For the second readings of the Bills, until 9.45 p.m. this day.

(2) For the committee stage of the Bills, until 10 p.m. this day.

(3) For the remaining stages of the Bills, until 10.15 p.m. this day.

Debate ensued.

The time allowed by standing order 92 for debate on the motion having expired— Question—put and passed.

- 19 HEALTH INSURANCE AND HEALTH INSURANCE COMMISSION BILLS 1973: Mr Hayden (Minister for Social Security) presented the following Bills:
 - A Bill for an Act providing for Payments by way of Medical Benefits and Payments for Hospital Services and for other purposes, and
 - A Bill for an Act to constitute a Health Insurance Commission and for purposes connected therewith.

Bills together read a first time.

Mr Hayden moved-That the Bills be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

- *Limitation of debate:* At fifteen minutes to ten o'clock p.m., Mr Speaker having called the attention of the House to the fact that the time allotted for the second readings of the Bills had expired—
- Question—That the Bills be now read a second time—put and passed—Bills together read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bills, by leave, taken as a whole together, and debated.

Limitation of debate: At ten o'clock p.m., the Chairman having called the attention of the committee to the fact that the time allotted for the committee stage of the Bills had expired—

Question-That the Bills be agreed to-put and passed.

Further question-That the Bills be reported without amendment-put and passed.

The House resumed; Mr Scholes reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Hayden, the House adopted the report.

Mr Hayden moved—That the Bills be now read a third time.

Debate ensued.

Limitation of debate: At fifteen minutes past ten o'clock p.m., Mr Speaker having called the attention of the House to the fact that the time allotted for the remaining stages of the Bills had expired—

Question—That the Bills be now read a third time—put.
