MONDAY, 25 NOVEMBER 1974

- 1 The House met, at fifteen minutes past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr L. R. Johnson (Minister for Housing and Construction), Mrs Child and Mr Kerin—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take urgent steps to ensure that further mining and export from Australia of uranium, except for bio-medical purposes, be banned and that the Australian Atomic Energy Commission be transformed into an Australian Energy Commission.
 - Mr Crean (Treasurer) and Mr Oldmeadow—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take immediate steps to restore education benefits to parents, at least to the 1973-74 level, either by increasing taxation deductions or through taxation rebates.
 - Mr Holten—from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Family Law Bill be debated and passed as soon as possible.
 - Mr Holten—from certain citizens of Australia praying that (1) the Metric Conversion Act be repealed and (2) the Government take urgent steps to cause the traditional and familiar units to be restored in those areas where the greatest inconveniences and distress are occurring.
 - Mr Jarman—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take action against the Government's decision to recognise the sovereignty of the Soviet Union over the Baltic States of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.
 - Mr Kerin—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government forthwith return to the States all moneys raised by way of taxes and excise on petroleum products.
 - Mr McLeay—from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government take no measures to interfere with the existing national health scheme.

- 7 ABORIGINAL AFFAIRS—STANDING COMMITTEE—REPORT—STATEMENT BY MEMBER: Mr Cross (Chairman) brought up the First Report from the Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs on the present conditions of the Yirrkala people, together with minutes of proceedings of the committee.

8 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—INFLATION AND UNEMPLOYMENT— EXTERNAL INFLUENCES: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Lynch (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The dangerously misconceived view held by the Treasurer designate that Australia's high level of inflation and unemployment are derived from external economic events".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Lynch addressed the House.
