- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Acting Speaker (Mr Lucock) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Dr Klugman and Mr Newman—from certain citizens praying that private nursing homes be subsidised to allow pensioner patients to retain \$6 per week for personal use and that certain other action be taken in connection with pensioner benefits.
 - Mr Neil and Mr E. G. Whitlam—from certain citizens praying for the reversal of the decision withdrawing financial assistance from students of non-State tertiary institutions.
 - Mr Gillard—from certain citizens of Bathurst, N.S.W., praying that the facts for and against the proposed mining and export of uranium be publicised and a referendum be held on the issue.
 - Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying for the negotiation of an excursion air fare for all points in Europe at the level currently charged to Great Britain and certain major European cities.
 - Mr MacKellar—from certain citizens praying that the Broadcasting and Television Act be amended in relation to program standards.

- 5 MEMBER FOR MACKELLAR (MR WENTWORTH)—STATEMENT BY MEMBER: Mr Wentworth, by leave, made a statement with respect to his resignation from the Liberal Party of Australia.
- 6 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—STRIKES AND ABUSE OF UNION POWER: Mr Acting Speaker informed the House that Mr Shipton, Mr Innes and Mr Neil had each proposed that definite matters of public importance be submitted to the House

for discussion today. In accordance with the provisions of standing order 107, he had given priority to the matter proposed by Mr Shipton, namely, "The current wave of strikes and abuse of union power throughout Australia".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Shipton addressed the House.
