- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DEATH OF EARL MOUNTBATTEN OF BURMA—ADDRESS OF CONDOLENCE TO HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN: Mr Fraser (Prime Minister) referred, with deep regret, to the death of Earl Mountbatten of Burma, which occurred on 27 August, and moved—That—
 - (1) An address to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in the following terms be agreed to:
 - To The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty:
 - MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN:

We, the Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia in Parliament assembled, have received with profound sorrow the news of the death of Earl Mountbatten of Burma. On behalf of Your people throughout the Commonwealth of Australia, we express deep sympathy to Your Majesty and other members of the Royal Family in Your personal loss and we mourn the loss sustained by the United Kingdom, the Commonwealth and indeed the whole world.

- (2) This House expresses its horror and shock at the violence which was perpetrated upon Earl Mountbatten of Burma and upon his family and condemns this type of action as a breach of all that is humane and reasonable in the world.
- And Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr Anthony (Leader of the National Country Party of Australia) and other Members having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—
- Question—passed.
- 3 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Baume, Mr Bowen, Dr Edwards, Mr Hunt, Mr James, Mr L. R. Johnson, Dr Klugman, Mr Lucock, Mr Lusher, Mr Martin, Mr O'Keefe and Mr West from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the 1980 level of education expenditure to Government schools be restored and increased in real terms.
 - Mr Aldred, Mr Bowen, Mr E. C. Cameron, Mr Goodluck, Mr Hodgman, Mr Lloyd, Mr Street and Mr Willis—from certain citizens praying that the Metric Conversion Act be repealed and the traditional and familiar weights and measures be restored.
 - Dr Blewett, Mr Chapman, Mr Jacobi, Mr Porter and Mr Wallis—from certain citizens praying that subsidies to pre-schools be increased to provide adequate pre-school services in South Australia.

- Mr Anthony, Mr Innes, Mr Shipton and Mr Thomson—from certain citizens praying that pension payments be restored to twice-yearly adjustments and that pensions and unemployment benefits be raised to 30% of average weekly earnings.
- Mr Drummond and Mr Martyr—from certain citizens praying that the National Health Scheme patient contribution rate not be increased.
- Mr Jull and Mr Martyr—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished.
- Mr Baillieu—from certain citizens praying that diplomatic approaches be made to the Czechoslovakian Government to secure the release of Mr Jiri Lederer from detention.
- Dr Blewett—from certain citizens praying that fees for tertiary study not be reintroduced and that the Tertiary Education Assistance Scheme not be threatened by the introduction of a loans scheme of student financing.
- Mr Cairns—from certain citizens praying that the imperial system of weights and measures be restored.
- Mr Connolly—from certain citizens praying that the televising of adult promotional material without a warning concerning its classification be rectified.
- Mr Fisher—from certain citizens praying that a humane policy be adopted to assist refugees to enter Australia.
- Mr Giles—from certain citizens praying that the decision by Australia Post not to issue a commemorative stamp to mark the 50th anniversary of Apex Clubs be reconsidered.
- Mr Innes—from certain citizens praying that action be taken to have telephone subscribers in the 047 zone included in the Sydney telephone district.
- Mr Innes—from certain citizens praying for the restatement of Australian policy on East Timor and that certain other action be taken with regard to East Timor.
- Mr Innes—from certain citizens praying that Parliament debate the Report of the Royal Commission on Human Relationships, facilitate public debate and take certain other action in connection with the Report.
- Mr Innes—from certain citizens praying for the appointment of an independent inquiry into the Australian Broadcasting Commission to investigate the qualifications of commissioners and certain other matters.
- Mr L. B. McLeay—from certain citizens praying that there be no extension of Kingsford-Smith Airport, Sydney.
- Mr Martyr—from certain citizens praying for the prohibition of pornographic material involving children.
- Mr Moore—from certain citizens praying that federal funding to State schools be restored to 1974–75 levels, that the independence of the Schools Commission be maintained and that tied grants be made to Queensland to ensure achievement of national standards.
- Mr Wallis—from certain citizens praying that there be no cuts in Federal funding for pre-school education.
- Mr Wallis—from certain citizens praying that funds be provided to improve the standard of living of the Aboriginal people.
- Mr Wallis—from certain citizens praying for continued and increased Federal subsidies to maintain all existing South Australian country rail services.
- Mr West—from certain citizens praying that the proposal to increase the marine radio licence fee be reconsidered.
- Mr Connolly—from John Fairfax & Sons Limited praying that the House will grant leave to your Petitioner and its legal representatives—
- (1) To issue and serve subpoenas for the production of the relevant official records of the proceedings of this House as described in the second schedule.
- (2) Further, to issue and serve subpoenaes for the attendance in Court of those persons who took the record of such proceedings.

(3) Further, to adduce in evidence and to make reference to and otherwise to use in its defence of the said action in Court the full and official records of the proceedings and the proceedings themselves of this House set out in the second schedule hereto.

- (3) notes the call by Australia's Catholic bishops, the Brotherhood of St Laurence and the Victorian Minister, Mr Dixon, that the Government's present assistance to the unemployed of Australia is grossly inadequate.

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8 PATENTS AMENDMENT (PATENT COOPERATION TREATY) BILL 1979: Mr Macphee (Minister for Productivity), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to approve the accession by Australia to the *Patent Cooperation Treaty* and to amend the *Patents Act* 1952.

- 12 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1979-80-BUDGET DEBATE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question-That the Bill be now read a second time-
