- 2 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Bowen (Acting Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Mr Dawkins (Minister for Trade), Mr Kerin (Minister for Primary Industry) was acting as Minister for Trade.
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.

#### 4 PAPER: Mr Speaker presented the following paper:

Mr Young (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper. Debate adjourned (Mr N. A. Brown—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Debate adjourned (Mr Willis-Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

13 EXCISE TARIFF PROPOSALS NO. 5 (1985): Mr Jones (Minister Assisting the Minister for Industry, Technology and Commerce) moved Excise Tariff Proposals No. 5 (1985).

Debate adjourned (Mr Hodgman), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 SOCIAL SECURITY AND REPATRIATION (BUDGET MEASURES) AMENDMENT BILL 1985: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Message from the Administrator: Message No. 73, dated 4 October 1985, from His Excellency the Administrator was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Howe (Minister for Social Security), the Bill was read a third time.
