- 2 SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS—MOTION WITHOUT NOTICE: Mr Hunt (Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia) moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia moving forthwith a motion to disallow the amendment to the Export Control (Orders) Regulations as contained in Order 1986 No. 2, made under the Export Control Act 1982, which vests discretion (a) in the Secretary of the Department of Primary Industry or his nominee not to provide inspection services to designated primary export industries and (b) in the Minister to direct the Secretary of the Department to make a particular decision.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed, with the concurrence of an absolute majority.

3 EXPORT CONTROL (ORDERS) REGULATIONS—MOTION FOR DISALLOWANCE: Mr Hunt (Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia) moved—That the amendment to the Export Control (Orders) Regulations as contained in Order 1986 No. 2, made under the Export Control Act 1982, be disallowed.

Debate ensued.

Closure: Mr Kerin (Minister for Primary Industry) moved—That the question be now put.

- 9 PHILOSOPHY, AIMS AND POLICY GUIDELINES FOR ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER EDUCATION—PAPERS—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPERS: Mr Dawkins (Minister representing the Minister for Education) presented the following papers:
 - Philosophy, aims and policy guidelines for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander education—Report by National Aboriginal Education Committee, together with statement by Senator Ryan, Minister for Education.
 - Mr Bowen (Attorney-General) moved—That the House take note of the papers. Debate adjourned (Mr N. A. Brown—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Mr Nehl—from certain electors of the Division of Cowper praying that the Australian Bill of Rights Bill and associated bills be rejected, the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission be abolished and ratification of the Covenant on Civil and Political Rights be withdrawn.

Mr Robinson—from certain residents of the north coast of New South Wales praying that the ABC radio studio in Grafton be retained and that the Grafton City Council's submission on the second regional radio network be heeded.

Mr Sharp—from certain citizens praying that the Illawarra region's only locally-based television station not be removed from VHF to UHF transmission.

Mr Simmons—from certain citizens praying for cessation of all investigations, studies and proposals for the relocation of the Army training facilities to the Central Tablelands area, NSW, including the Macquarie River.

12 AUSTRALIAN CITIZENSHIP AMENDMENT BILL 1986: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Clause 7—

On the motion of Mr Hurford (Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs), the following amendment was made: Page 4, line 7, omit "did not do", substitute "had not done".

Mr Cadman, by leave, moved the following amendments together:

Page 4, proposed sub-sub-paragraph 23AA (1) (b) (iv) (A), omit "permanently" (twice occurring).

Page 4, lines 21-30, omit proposed sub-sub-paragraphs 23AA (1) (b) (iv) (B) and (C), substitute the following word and sub-sub-paragraph:

(B) in a case where the person is not residing in Australia—to return to Australia; and".

On the motion of Mr Hurford, the following amendment was made: Page 4, lines 17-30, omit proposed sub-paragraph 23AA (1) (b) (iv), substitute the following sub-paragraph:

"(iv) intends that-

(A) if the person again becomes an Australian citizen and is residing in Australia at the time when the person so becomes an Australian citizen,

the person will continue to reside in Australia after so becoming an Australian citizen; or

(B) if the person again becomes an Australian citizen and is not residing in Australia at the time when the person so becomes an Australian citizen, the person will commence to reside in Australia after so becoming an Australian citizen and before the expiration of the period of 3 years commencing on the day on which the statement is made; and".

Mr Cadman moved the following amendment: Page 4, lines 40 and 41, omit "hardship or detriment of an economic nature", substitute "significant hardship or detriment".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Clause 8 agreed to.

Clause 9-

On the motion of Mr Hurford, the following amendment was made: Page 6, line 7, omit paragraph (b), substitute the following paragraph:
