3 DECLARATION OF BILLS AS URGENT BILLS—LIMITATION OF DEBATE: Mr Young (Leader of the House) declared that the Dairy Produce Bill 1986, the Dairy Produce Levy (No. 1) Bill 1986, the Dairy Produce Levy (No. 2) Bill 1986, the Dairying Industry Research and Promotion Levy (Termination of Levy) Bill 1986, the Dairy Industry Stabilization Levy (Termination of Levy) Bill 1986 and the Dairy Legislation (Transitional Provisions and Consequential Amendments) Bill 1986 were urgent Bills.

Question—That the Bills be considered urgent Bills—put and passed.

Allotment of time: Mr Young then moved—That the time allotted in connection with the Bills be as follows:

- (5) Dairy Industry Stabilization Levy (Termination of Levy) Bill 1986—For the remaining stages, until 4.20 p.m. this day.
- (6) Dairy Legislation (Transitional Provisions and Consequential Amendments) Bill 1986—For the remaining stages, until 4.25 p.m. this day.

Debate ensued.

Mr Dubois, Dr H. R. Edwards, Mr Free and Ms McHugh—from certain citizens praying that 1988 be proclaimed the first International Earth Repair Year.

Mrs Sullivan—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.

Dr H. R. Edwards, Mr Reith and Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.

Dr H. R. Edwards—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.

Mr Blunt and Mr Reith—from certain citizens praying that no cut backs be made to the portfolio of Veterans' Affairs and certain action be taken to assist ex-servicemen and women.

Mr Goodluck—from certain residents of Hobart praying that funds be made available to construct an SBS television translator in the Hobart area.

Mr Hodgman—from certain citizens praying that action be taken to assist the Polish people affected by the Chernobyl nuclear disaster and that the Soviet Union be condemned for its negligence.

Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that the proposed adoption of a flat rate family allowance be reconsidered.

- Mr Humphreys—from certain citizens praying that a television translator be erected to improve the reception of the Brisbane SBS UHF television station.
- Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that the problems which identification cards are intended to reduce be attacked by other methods.
- Mr Lee—from certain citizens praying that a Medicare office be established in Wyong, NSW, as soon as possible.
- Ms McHugh—from certain citizens praying that action be taken to ensure all legal barriers to the equality of women workers are removed.
- Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that importation of cobalt 60 and other radioactive substances be banned and regulations permitting irradiation of food in Australia be disallowed.
- Mr Nehl—from certain citizens and from certain electors of the Division of Cowper praying that the Australian Bill of Rights Bill and associated bills be rejected, the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission be abolished and ratification of the Covenant on Civil and Political Rights be withdrawn.

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Howard addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

8 PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE: Mr Young (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That Mr Punch be discharged from attendance on the Joint Committee of Public Accounts, and that, in his place, Mr Downer be appointed a member of the committee.

Question-put and passed.

9 DAIRY PRODUCE BILL 1986: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.
