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- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
  - 2 **MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS:** Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Mr Young (Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs and Leader of the House), Mr Holding (Minister for Aboriginal Affairs) was acting as Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs and Mr Bowen (Attorney-General) was acting as Leader of the House.
  - 3 **QUESTIONS:** Questions without notice being asked—  
*Paper:* Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) presented the following paper:  
Opposition commitments unrepudiated by Mr Howard—Schedule.  
Questions without notice continued.
  - 4 **PAPER:** The following paper was presented:  
Torres Strait Fisheries Act—Protected Zone Joint Authority—Report for period 15 February 1985 to 30 June 1986.
  - 5 **CHILD SUPPORT REFORMS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT:** Mr Howe (Minister for Social Security), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of proposals for child support reforms.  
Mr Blunt, by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
  - 6 **PETITIONS:** The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:  
Mr Cadman, Dr H. R. Edwards, Mr Rocher and Mr Slipper—from certain citizens praying that the closure of post office agencies be prevented and their services be extended.  
Mrs Jakobsen, Mr Kent, Mr Scott and Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that importation of cobalt 60 and other radioactive substances be banned and regulations permitting irradiation of food in Australia be disallowed.  
Mr P. S. Fisher, Mr Nehl and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that the Department of Veterans' Affairs remain a separate department.  
Mr Cadman and Mr Rocher—from certain citizens praying that the right of employees to select their own superannuation scheme be guaranteed and certain other action be taken in relation to superannuation.  
Dr H. R. Edwards and Mr Wilson—from certain citizens; and Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that deletion of the 45 commonly prescribed drugs from the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme be reconsidered.

- Mr Kent and Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that the US Government be urged to join the Soviet Union's nuclear test ban.
- Mr Kent and Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that the Government support the stand taken by the New Zealand Government on nuclear vessels and that the policy of developing zones of peace and nuclear free zones in the Indian and Pacific Oceans be implemented.
- Mr Beale—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.
- Mr Cadman—from certain citizens; and Mr Blunt—from certain residents of the Division of Richmond praying that the proposal for an identification card be rejected.
- Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the fringe benefits tax legislation be repealed.
- Mr Rocher—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.
- Mr Cadman—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the Western Sydney State University be established in conjunction with the NSW Government.
- Mr Conquest—from certain residents of the Division of Hinkler praying that legislation be enacted to ensure that 1987 pension increases are based on the rate of pension applicable between June 1986 and 9 October 1986.
- Mr Duffy—from certain citizens praying that the Flags Amendment Bill receive a speedy passage.
- Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that any proposal for a national identification numbering system be rejected.
- Mr Martin—from certain citizens praying that the Illawarra planetarium project be given sufficient funding to proceed.
- Mr Martin—from certain citizens praying that funding for occasional child care be increased.
- Mr Nehl—from certain citizens praying that funding be provided to improve the Pacific Highway between Port Macquarie and Woolgoolga, NSW.
- Mr Slipper—from certain citizens praying that measures be taken to reduce the burden of imposed costs and regulation on Australian horticultural growers.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of Queensland praying that the fringe benefits tax be abandoned.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the existing national flag remain sacrosanct.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the assets test be reconsidered.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that home loan interest rates be tax deductible.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the Australian Bill of Rights Bill be repealed.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that public funding for projects which are undesirable or of dubious worth be halted.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that means be sought for the protection of the people's interests to reverse the decision to hand Ayers Rock over to an Aboriginal Land Council.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the right to work be acknowledged and protected and certain other action be taken to protect workers.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the capital gains tax proposal be abandoned.

Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that Australia use its influence to establish a nuclear test moratorium and comprehensive nuclear test ban treaty.

Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that the agreement with the US Government regarding the facilities at Pine Gap be renewed only if the US Government agrees to take up the phased nuclear disarmament plan put forward by the Soviet Union.

Mr Staples—from certain residents of the Division of Jagajaga praying that tertiary education remain free to all students.

Mr Tuckey—from certain citizens praying that the Anzac Rifle Range, Malabar, NSW, be retained.
