- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—INFRASTRUCTURE—STANDING COMMITTEES—PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEE POWERS AND PROCEEDINGS: The following message from the Senate was reported:

Message No. 37

Madam Speaker,

The Senate acquaints the House of Representatives of the following Resolution agreed to by the Senate this day:

(1) That the Standing Committee on Infrastructure, when considering the matters referred to it on 26 October 1987, viz:

"All notices of intention to modify or vary the plan of lay-out of the city of Canberra and its environs, and all modifications and variations of that plan, under section 12A of the Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910",

be empowered to sit as a joint committee with the Standing Committee on Infrastructure of the House of Representatives when that Committee is considering those matters.

- (2) That the joint committee appoint as its chairman the Chairman of the Senate Committee or the Chairman of the House of Representatives Committee.
- (3) That the quorum of the joint committee be 2 Senators and 2 Members of the House of Representatives.
- (4) That a sub-committee of the Senate Committee, when considering the matters referred to in paragraph (1), be empowered to sit with a subcommittee of the House of Representatives Committee, when that subcommittee is considering those matters, as a sub-committee of the joint committee.
- (5) That a Senator who is not a member of the Senate Committee may attend a meeting of the joint committee or a sub-committee, with the approval of the joint committee or sub-committee, and participate in its proceedings and deliberations, but may not vote.
- (6) That nothing in this resolution be taken to affect the power of the Senate Committee to consider the matters referred to in paragraph (1) or its duty to report to the Senate on those matters.

The Senate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives in paragraphs (2) to (5), inclusive, of this Resolution.
