MONDAY, 11 MARCH 1991

- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Leo McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 MENZIES ELECTORAL DIVISION—ISSUE OF WRIT: Mr Speaker informed the House that it was his intention to issue a writ on 5 April 1991 for the election of a Member to serve for the electoral division of Menzies, in the State of Victoria, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the Honourable Neil Anthony Brown, QC. The dates in connection with the election would be fixed as follows:

Friday, 5 April 1991. Issue of writ Close of roll Friday, 12 April 1991.

Nominations close . . . Friday, 19 April 1991.

Date of polling Saturday, 11 May 1991.

Return of writ On or before Sunday, 14 July 1991. Friday, 12 April 1991.

- 5 ANTI-DUMPING AUTHORITY—REPORT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Beazley (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the following paper:
 - Anti-Dumping Authority Act—Anti-Dumping Authority—Report for 1989-90.
 - Debate adjourned (Mr McLachlan), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 6 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—TRANSPORT INFRASTRUCTURE REFORM: The House was informed that Mr Sharp had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The Government's total failure to achieve reform of Australia's transport infrastructure, disadvantaging exporters and manufacturers and leading to a decline in the economy and employment opportunities".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support— Mr Sharp addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

9 MARINE NAVIGATION (REGULATORY FUNCTIONS) LEVY BILL 1991: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Sharp who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House condemns the Government for its failure to reduce costs imposed by Government through inefficiencies and inadequate reform in the Australian shipping industry, placing a competitive disadvantage on Australian exporters".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to, after debate. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Dubois reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr R. J. Brown (Minister for Land Transport), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 105, dated 21 February from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr R. J. Brown (Minister for Land Transport), the Bill was read a third time.

11 PRIMARY INDUSTRIES LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL 1991: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question-That the Bill be now read a second time-

Debate resumed by Mr P. S. Fisher who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House

is of the opinion that the renaming of the Australian Meat and Live-stock Research and Development Corporation to the Meat Research Corporation will be of minimal effect unless the Government undertakes:

- (1) to remedy the inefficiency and exorbitant costs associated with the current meat inspection system; and
- (2) to ensure that industrial action by meat workers does not continue to cause serious disruption to the operation of abattoirs.".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.

 - Debate resumed by Mr McGauran who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House:
 - (1) is of the opinion that the very existence of the Discretionary Grants Scheme and the Generic Technologies Scheme, administered by the Industry Research and Development Board, attests to the Government's failure to carry out necessary economic reforms which has resulted in:
 - (a) the incapacity of Australia's economy to derive the full benefits of technological innovation;
 - (b) the high cost of capital and general economic conditions which have compromised industry investment, especially in technology-related business strategies; and
 - (c) the inability of small start-up companies to gain access to suitable private capital backing or industry support at the early stages of product development; and
 - (2) notes that the extension of these schemes until 1994, which the Bill proposes, is further evidence of the Government's failure in this regard".

Debate continued.
