- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Leo McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 OUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 3 PAPERS: The following papers were presented:

4 BUILDING A COMPETITIVE AUSTRALIA—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT AND PAPER—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister), by leave, made a ministerial statement relating to economic policy and announced measures to improve the productive capacity of the economy to make it more internationally competitive, and presented the following paper:

Building a competitive Australia—Statements by Mr Hawke, Prime Minister, Mr Keating, Treasurer and Senator Button, Minister for

Industry, Technology and Commerce, dated 12 March 1991.

Mr Beazley (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Debate adjourned (Dr Hewson—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 5 BUILDING A COMPETITIVE AUSTRALIA—TAXATION MEASURES—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Keating (Treasurer), by leave, made a ministerial statement on taxation reform measures which would reduce tax burdens on Australian industry.
- 6 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—RURAL AND REGIONAL AUSTRALIA: The House was informed that Mr Anderson had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The economic depression throughout much of rural and regional Australia which has been exacerbated by the uncertainty caused by the Federal Government's approach to primary industries, particularly the wheat industry".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Anderson addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

- 9 PUBLIC WORKS—PARLIAMENTARY STANDING COMMITTEE—REPORT— STATEMENTS BY MEMBERS: Mr Hollis (Chairman) presented the following report:

Public Works—Parliamentary Standing Committee—Report relating to the redevelopment of Borneo Barracks, Cabarlah, Qld (1st report of 1991).

Ordered to be printed.

Mr Hollis and Mr Taylor, by leave, made statements in connection with the report.

- 10 LOAN BILL 1991: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed by Mr Rocher who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House is of the opinion that the Government should be condemned for its economic mismanagement and fiscal irresponsibility, which has resulted in a severe and protracted recession and led to:
 - (1) a substantial decline in Commonwealth revenues for the year ending 30 June 1991:
 - (2) a major increase in Commonwealth expenditure for the year ending 30 June 1991;
 - (3) a reduction in the Budget forecast of an \$8.1 billion surplus to a possible deficit for 1990-91;
 - (4) an increase in the public sector's call on national savings of up to 3% of Gross Domestic Product in 1990-91, compared with the Budget forecast of a zero requirement; and
 - (5) an expected deficit starting point for the 1991-92 Budget based on existing forward estimates".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 106, dated 21 February 1991, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of moneys for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

Mr Crean (Minister Assisting the Treasurer) moved—That the Bill be now read a third time.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a third time.

11 SALES TAX LAWS AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 1) 1991: Mr Crean (Minister Assisting the Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the law relating to sales tax.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Crean moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper: Mr Crean presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr Hawker), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
