- 4 PRIVILEGE—STATEMENT BY SPEAKER: The Speaker referred to the matter raised on 30 May 1991 by Mr Howard concerning the alleged arrangements made in November 1988 between the Prime Minister and the then Deputy Prime Minister relating to the leadership of the Government. The Speaker stated that he did not consider that a question of privilege or contempt had arisen and accordingly he was not prepared to give precedence to a motion on this matter.

Debate resumed by Mr Lloyd (Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia) who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House:

(1) regrets the Government's unnecessary decision to create a Wool Realisation Commission separate from the Australian Wool Corporation;

(2) regrets the Government's failure to provide some certainty in the wool market by not implementing an orderly schedule, with appropriate legislative authority, for releasing specified quantities of wool from the Australian Wool Corporation's stockpile; and

(3) calls on the Government to support a properly managed industry funded flock reduction scheme to be introduced if and when the industry agrees such a scheme is necessary".
