- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice being asked—

- 10 MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL—ASSENT TO BILL: A message from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced informing the House that His Excellency, in the name of Her Majesty, had assented to the following Bill:

And so it was resolved in the affirmative—Bill read a second time. The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

#### In the committee

Clauses 1 to 6, by leave, taken together.

Mr Costello moved the following amendment: Clause 4, page 2, omit

proposed subsection 68(3), substitute the following subsection:

"'(3) Neither the statement, or the fact that the person has signed the record, as the case may be, nor any information, document or other thing obtained as a direct or indirect consequence of the person making the statement or signing the record, as the case may be, is admissible in evidence against the person in:

(a) a criminal proceeding; or

(b) a proceeding for the imposition of a penalty; other than a proceeding in respect of:

(c) in the case of the making of a statement—the falsity of the statement: or

(d) in the case of the signing of a record—the falsity of any statement contained in the record.".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Clauses agreed to.

Clause 7 debated and agreed to.

Remainder of Bill, by leave, taken as whole.

Mr Costello moved the following amendment: Clause 9, page 4, omit the clause, substitute the following clause:

"9. After Division 3 of Part 9.11 of the Corporations Law the following Division is inserted:

# 'Division 4—Change resulting from the Corporations Legislation (Evidence) Amendment Act 1992

Application of section 1316A

'1370. Section 1316A applies in relation to a requirement made at or after the commencement of section 8 of the Corporations Legislation (Evidence) Amendment Act 1992, even if the proceeding concerned began before that commencement.'".

Amendment negatived.

Remainder of Bill agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Dobie reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Duffy (Attorney-General), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
