MONDAY, 19 JUNE 1995

1 The House met, at 12.30 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable Stephen Martin) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

**2 SUSPENSION OF STANDING AND SESSIONAL ORDERS—MOTION BY PRIME MINISTER**

Mr Beazley (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That so much of the standing and sessional orders be suspended as would prevent the Prime Minister moving forthwith a motion relating to the decision of the French Government to resume nuclear testing in the Pacific and for debate on the motion taking precedence over all other business until 3 p.m. this day.

Question—put and passed.

**3 FRENCH NUCLEAR TESTING**

Mr Keating (Prime Minister) moved—That this House:

- (1) condemns the decision of the Government of France to resume nuclear testing in the South Pacific;
- (2) calls on the French Government to reverse its decision and not to resume testing;
- (3) shares the resentment of South Pacific countries at nuclear testing in the South Pacific and endorses the statement condemning the decision issued by the South Pacific Forum;
- (4) deplores France's decision to breach its 1992 moratorium which had improved relations between France and countries in the region;
- (5) expresses its outrage that France's decision undermines the outcome of the recent Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons Review and Extension Conference, particularly the commitment made at the Conference that, pending entry into force of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT), the nuclear weapon states should exercise utmost restraint;
- (6) notes that Australia will do all in its power and urge all other countries to hold France to President Chirac's statement that France would sign a CTBT without reservation in autumn 1996; and

- (7) calls on France to sign and ratify the protocols of the South Pacific Nuclear Free Zone Treaty.

Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment—That the following words be added to the motion: “requires the Government to:

- (a) join with New Zealand and suspend military cooperation with France, except for surveillance, United Nations and humanitarian activities;
- (b) cease refuelling all French non-humanitarian military transit flights;
- (c) recall the Australian Ambassador to show the depth of our concern, and to develop in association with the South Pacific Forum a regional plan of action to embarrass and if possible hinder French nuclear testing, including action in the United Nations condemning French nuclear testing as a gross abuse of colonial power and, along with similar tests by the People’s Republic of China, as gross violations of the world environment; and
- (d) discuss with the United States of America the possibility of data sharing to remove the public French excuse for the tests”.

Debate continued.

Mr Snowdon (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Employment, Education and Training) addressing the House—

It being 3 p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with the resolution agreed to this day, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

#### 4 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (MR S. D. EINFELD)

The Speaker informed the House of the death, on Friday, 16 June 1995, of Mr Sydney David Einfeld, AO, a Member of this House for the Division of Phillip from 1961 to 1963.

As a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased all Members present stood, in silence.

Mr Hawker, from 40 petitioners, praying that Anzac Day be declared Australia's National Day of Commemoration and that it be held on 25 April each year and on no other day.

Mr Hawker, from 40 petitioners, praying that the Australian National Flag not be changed without approval through a national poll.

Mr Hicks, from 190 petitioners, praying that the House call on the Minister for Human Services and Health to withdraw her endorsement of the sex guide published in the December 1994 issue of *Cleo* magazine and on the Prime Minister to indicate his disapproval of it.

Mr Cadman, from 248 petitioners, and Mr Slipper, from 11 residents of the Division of Fisher, respectively, in similar terms.

Mr Hicks, from 100 petitioners, praying that Austudy payments be raised to the same level as the Job Search and Newstart allowances.

Mr Newell, from 37 petitioners, praying that family day care providers, users and sponsors be consulted before decisions are made concerning home based child care workers.

The following message from the Senate was reported:

Message No. 469

Mr Speaker,

The Senate has considered the bill for “*An Act to amend legislation relating to human services and health, and for related purposes*”, and has divided the bill into two bills:

a bill for “*An Act to amend legislation relating to human services and health, and for related purposes*” (Human Services and Health Legislation Amendment Bill (No. 1) 1995), consisting of clause 1, subclauses 2(1) to 2(3) and 2(6) to 2(9), clause 3, items 1 to 79 of Schedule 1, items 1 to 14 of Schedule 2, the words of enactment and the title of the original bill; and

a bill for “*An Act to amend the ‘Therapeutic Goods Act 1989’*” (Therapeutic Goods Amendment Bill 1995), consisting of items 80 to 150 (inclusive) of Schedule 1 and item 15 of Schedule 2 of the original bill, renumbered 1 to 71 and 72, respectively, has amended the bill and inserted words of enactment and a title in the bill as indicated by the annexed schedule.
