# FIRST SESSION OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH PARLIAMENT

TUESDAY, 30 APRIL 1996

#### **PROCLAMATION**

- I, WILLIAM PATRICK DEANE, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting under section 5 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, which provides, among other things, that the Governor-General may appoint such times for holding the sessions of the Parliament as he thinks fit, by this Proclamation:
- appoint Tuesday, 30 April 1996, at 10.30 a.m. as the day and time for all Senators and Members of the House of Representatives to assemble at Parliament House; and
- summon all Senators and Members of the House of Representatives to attend accordingly.

# 2 MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY'S DEPUTY BY THE USHER OF THE BLACK ROD

The following message was delivered by the Usher of the Black Rod:

Honourable Members,

The Deputy of His Excellency the Governor-General desires your attendance in the Senate Chamber.

Accordingly Members of the House of Representatives went to the Senate Chamber, where the Deputy addressed the Members of both Houses as follows:

Members of the Senate and Members of the House of Representatives:

His Excellency the Governor-General, not thinking fit to be present in person at this time, has been pleased to appoint me his Deputy to declare open the Parliament of the Commonwealth, as will more fully appear from the instrument which will now be read by the Clerk of the Senate.

The instrument was read as follows:

I, WILLIAM PATRICK DEANE, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting under section 126 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia and Clause IV of the Letters Patent dated 21 August 1984 relating to the office of Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, appoint SIR FRANCIS GERARD BRENNAN, Chief Justice of Australia, to be my deputy to declare open the Parliament of the Commonwealth at the time and place appointed by the Proclamation published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* on 9 April 1996.

Members of the Senate and Members of the House of Representatives:

I have it in command from His Excellency the Governor-General to let you know that, after certain Members of the Senate and Members of the House of Representatives shall have been sworn, the causes of His Excellency calling this Parliament together will be declared by him in person at this place; and, it being necessary that a Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be first chosen, you, Members of the House of Representatives, will retire to the place where you are to sit, and there proceed to the choice of some person to be your Speaker; and later this day you will present the person whom you shall so choose to His Excellency the Governor-General at such time and place as he shall appoint.

I will attend in the House of Representatives for the purpose of administering the oath or affirmation of allegiance to honourable Members of that House.

# 3 SIR GERARD BRENNAN TO ADMINISTER THE OATH OR AFFIRMATION OF ALLEGIANCE TO MEMBERS

The Honourable Sir Francis Gerard Brennan, AC, KBE, Chief Justice of Australia, having been ushered into the Chamber and conducted by the Serjeant-at-Arms to the Chair, handed to the Clerk at the Table an authority, which was read and is as follows:

I, WILLIAM PATRICK DEANE, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting under section 42 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, authorise SIR FRANCIS GERARD BRENNAN, Chief Justice of Australia, to attend at the House of Representatives Chamber at Parliament House, Canberra, in the Australian Capital Territory, on Tuesday, 30 April 1996, forthwith after the opening of the Parliament of the Commonwealth at 10.30 in the morning of that day, and there and then to administer the oath or affirmation of allegiance to those Members of the House of Representatives who are present.

Sir Gerard Brennan retired.

#### 7 ELECTION OF SPEAKER

Mr Charles, addressing himself to the Clerk, proposed to the House for its Speaker Mr Halverson, and moved—That he do take the Chair of this House as Speaker, which motion was seconded by Mr M. A. J. Vaile.

Mr Halverson informed the House that he accepted nomination.

There being no further proposal Mr Halverson was declared elected as Speaker, and Mr Charles and Mr M. A. J. Vaile conducted him to the Chair.

Mr Halverson returned his acknowledgments to the House for the honour it had been pleased to confer upon him by choosing him to be its Speaker, and thereupon sat down in the Chair.

Mr Fischer (Deputy Prime Minister) informed the House that the Parliamentary Party of the National Party of Australia had elected him as its Leader and Mr Anderson (Minister for Primary Industries and Energy) as its Deputy Leader. Mr Hicks had been appointed as Chief National Party Whip and Mr M. A. J. Vaile as National Party Whip.

#### 14 PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS BROADCASTING AMENDMENT BILL 1996

Mr Howard (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Parliamentary Proceedings Broadcasting Act 1946.

Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting.

#### 15 HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH

The Speaker reported that the House had that day attended His Excellency the Governor-General in the Senate Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of the Parliament. (*Text of the speech appears in Hansard*)

## 16 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH

Mr Howard (Prime Minister) moved—That a committee, consisting of Mrs Gash, Mr Brough and the mover, be appointed to prepare an Address in Reply to the speech delivered by His Excellency the Governor-General to both Houses of the Parliament and that the committee report at the next sitting.

Question—put and passed.

Suspension of sitting: At 3.41 p.m., the Speaker left the Chair. Resumption of sitting: At 5 p.m., the Speaker resumed the Chair.

#### 17 APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTY SPEAKER AND SECOND DEPUTY SPEAKER

Mr Hicks moved—That Mr Nehl be appointed Deputy Speaker of this House, which motion was seconded by Mr Somlyay.

Mr Kerr moved—That Mr Jenkins be appointed Deputy Speaker of this House, which motion was seconded by Mr Crean.

There being no further proposal—

Debate ensued.

The House proceeded to ballot; and the ballot being concluded, the Speaker reported the result, as follows:

Mr Jenkins ......48 votes

Mr Nehl ......96 votes

Mr Nehl was thereupon declared appointed as Deputy Speaker and Mr Jenkins was declared appointed as Second Deputy Speaker.

Mr Howard (Prime Minister), Mr Beazley (Leader of the Opposition) and Mr Fischer (Leader of the National Party of Australia) congratulated Mr Nehl and Mr Jenkins, who made their acknowledgments to the House.

#### 18 TRAGEDY AT PORT ARTHUR, TASMANIA

Mr Howard (Prime Minister), by leave, moved—That this House:

- (a) expresses its shock at the tragic and violent shooting that took place at Port Arthur, Tasmania, on Sunday, 28 April 1996;
- (b) extends its deepest sympathy to the families and friends of those killed and injured;
- (c) urges all governments to work cooperatively in response to issues raised by this tragedy; and
- (d) requests the Speaker to convey the terms of this resolution and the sincere wishes of this House to those families affected by this enormous tragedy, to the community of Port Arthur, and to the people of Tasmania.

Debate ensued.

All Members present having risen, in silence-

Question—put and passed.

# 19 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (THE HONOURABLE SIR HUBERT OPPERMAN)

Mr Howard (Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Honourable Sir Hubert Opperman, and moved—That the House expresses its deep regret at the death on Thursday, 18 April 1996, of the Honourable Sir Hubert Ferdinand Opperman, OBE, Member of the House of Representatives for the Division of Corio from 1949 to 1967, Government Whip from 1955 to 1960, Minister for Shipping and Transport from 1960 to 1963, and Minister for Immigration from 1963 to 1966, places on record its appreciation of his long and meritorious public service, and tenders its profound sympathy to his family in their bereavement.

Mr Beazley (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr Fischer (Leader of the National Party of Australia) and other Members having

addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Question—passed.

### 20 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (THE HONOURABLE M. J. YOUNG)

Mr Howard (Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Honourable M. J. Young, and moved—That the House expresses its deep regret at the death on Monday, 8 April 1996, of the Honourable Michael (Mick) Jerome Young, AO, Member of the House of Representatives for the Division of Port Adelaide, from 1974 to 1988, Special Minister of State in 1983 and from 1984 to 1987, Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs in 1987, Minister for Immigration, Local Government and Ethnic Affairs and Minister Assisting the Prime Minister for Multicultural Affairs from 1987 to 1988, Leader of the House in 1983 and from 1984 to 1988, and Vice-President of the Executive Council in 1983 and from 1987 to 1988, places on record its appreciation of his long and meritorious public service, and tenders its profound sympathy to his family in their bereavement.

Mr Beazley (Leader of the Opposition) seconded the motion.

Mr Fischer (Leader of the National Party of Australia) and other Members addressing the House in support thereof—

Adjournment negatived: It being 7.30 p.m.—The question was proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Mr Ruddock (Minister for Immigration and Multicultural Affairs) requiring the question to be put forthwith without debate—
