2 REPUBLIC REFERENDUM—JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE

Mr McGauran (Acting Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That Mr Adams, Mr Danby, Ms Hall, Mr McClelland, Mr Price and Ms Roxon be appointed members of the Joint Select Committee on the Republic Referendum. Question—put and passed.

3 SOCIAL SECURITY (FAMILY ALLOWANCE AND RELATED MATTERS) LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL 1999

Mr Truss (Minister for Community Services), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Social Security Act 1991*, and for related purposes.

Mr Truss moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr Truss presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr M. J. Ferguson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 A NEW TAX SYSTEM (FAMILY ASSISTANCE) (ADMINISTRATION) BILL 1999

Mr Truss (Minister for Community Services), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to implement A New Tax System by providing assistance to families, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Motion of censure of the Prime Minister

Mr Beazley (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, moved—That this House censures the Prime Minister for his failure to uphold his Ministerial Code of Conduct in regard to the actions of the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Industry, Science and Resources:

- (1) in failing to include in his Statement of Members' Interests his interests as Director and Company Secretary of Cape York Concrete Pty Ltd;
- (2) in failing to include in his Statement of Members' Interests his interests as Director and Company Secretary of Vervale Pty Ltd;
- (3) in engaging in the business of Vervale Pty Ltd, negotiating with the ANZ Bank while a Parliamentary Secretary over the sale of Hurricane Station on Cape York Peninsula;
- (4) in retaining a directorship in companies in which the shareholdings extend beyond his own family, in breach of the Prime Minister's Code of Conduct;
- (5) in being the beneficiary (through Cape York Concrete) of a business contract with the Australian Defence Force;
- (6) in being thereby in probable contravention of section 44(v) of the Constitution which states that 'Any person who ... holds any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any agreement with the Public Service of the Commonwealth ... shall be incapable of sitting as a ... member of the House of Representatives'; and
- (7) for blatantly misleading the House during Question Time today.

Debate ensued.

14 TAXATION LAWS AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 5) 1999

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr K. J. Thomson who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House notes that:

- (1) the proposals as originally introduced have already been modified because of the actions of Labor in referring them to the Senate;
- (2) the construction and infrastructure industries are still concerned about the potential impact of the legislation on their industries;
- (3) the legislation needs further consultation with relevant stakeholders;
- (4) the government has not achieved real tax reform in Australia, it has merely agreed to introduce an unfair GST;
- (5) the new Howard/Lees GST will involve a massive tax mix switch which will hurt families, which is directly contrary to the balloted policy of the Australian Democrats:
- (6) the Howard/Lees deal will actually increase the tax on food in Australia;
- (7) hardworking people will now face a GST on top of state indirect taxes on bank accounts; and
- (8) the amended tax package is still unfair and will also damage the environment".

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Dr Emerson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
