### THURSDAY, 11TH JULY, 1912.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.-Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. LEAVE OF ABSENCE TO MEMBER (MR. HEDGES).—Mr. Fowler moved, by leave, That leave of absence for one month be given to the honorable Member for Fremantle (Mr. Hedges), on account of absence from the Commonwealth. Question—put and passed.
- 3. PAPERS.-Mr. Tudor presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General-
  - Lighting of the Coast Line of the Commonwealth-Report (June, 1912) on the Lighting of the Coast Line of the Commonwealth-North-east Coast (Torres Strait to Cape Moreton) (in substitution of paper presented on 20th June last).

4. ADDRESS-IN-REPLY TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Addressin-Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to by this House :—
