- 2. PAPER. -Mr. Tudor presented, pursuant to Statute-Quarantine Act—Regulation Amended (Provisional)—Statutory Rules 1912, No. 185.
- 3. MATERNITY ALLOWANCE BILL.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-

Debate resumed. Mr. Groom moved an amendment, That all the words after the word "That" be omitted.

Debate ensued.

Question-That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question-put.

And so it was resolved in the affirmative.

Sir Robert Best proposed to move-

That the following words be added to the question: -- "and that the Committee on the Bill be instructed to incorporate in the Bill provision for a national insurance scheme, providing for sickness, unemployment and medical attendance as well as maternity, and subsidized by an Appropriation to the extent necessary to make the benefits immediate and adequate."

Mr. Speaker ruled that the amendment was out of order on the ground of irrelevancy and also on the ground that the Bill had not yet been read a second time.

Mr. Deakin gave notice in writing of the following objection to the ruling:-

That the ruling of the Honorable the Speaker that the amendment of the Member for Kooyong is irrelevant to the motion that the Bill for an Act to provide for payment of Maternity Allowances be now read a second time be and is hereby disagreed with.

The debate thereon was forthwith adjourned to the next sitting day.

Debate on main question continued.

Question-That the Bill be now read a second time-put and passed.—Bill read a second time. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

26th September, 1912.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Poynton reported accordingly. Resolved—That the House will, to-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee.
