Reasons of the House of Representatives for Disagreeing to the Amendments of the Senate.

As to Amendment No. 3-

Item 2—That it is essential for the development of the Northern Territory that the railway from Port Darwin to Pine Creek should, as soon as practicable, be continued from Pine Creek to the Katherine River and southwards, and that it is not practicable to provide the money for the construction of such lines out of revenue.

As to Amendment No. 4-

Item 5—That the payment for land purchased for any public purpose falls essentially within the domain of capital expenditure, and not of current expenditure, and that the amount in this item is necessary to meet commitments already entered into, and that it is impracticable to provide for the same out of revenue.

Sir John Forrest moved, That the Committee's Reasons be adopted.

Mr. Fisher moved an amendment, That the word "impracticable" in the second last line of the Reasons be omitted.
