# FRIDAY, 30TH JULY, 1920.

- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.
- 2. ABSENCE OF MR. SPEAKER.—The Clerk, at the Table, having informed the House that Mr. Speaker was unavoidably absent, the Chairman of Committees took the Chair as Deputy-Speaker, and read Prayers.
- 3. GOVERNMENT BUSINESS-PRECEDENCE TO .- Mr. Hughes moved, pursuant to notice, That on each sitting day, unless otherwise ordered, Government Business shall take precedence of General Business.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Gabb moved, as an amendment, That all the words after the word "That" be omitted, with a view to the insertion of the words "this House meet on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday of each week " in place thereof.

Amendment ruled out of order.

Debate continued on the main question.

Mr. Nicholls moved, as an amendment, That the words "save one" be inserted after the word "day", and that the words "and that there shall be an additional sitting day on Tuesday of each week" be added to the motion.

Amendment ruled out of order.

Point of Order.-A Point of Order having been raised that the amendment should not have been ruled out of order, Mr. Nicholls handed in in writing the following objection to the ruling:-That Mr. Deputy-Speaker's ruling—that on the motion of the Prime Minister—"That on each sitting day, unless otherwise ordered, Government Business shall take precedence of General Business"—the amendment moved to insert "save one" after "day" and to add at the end of the motion "and that there shall be an additional sitting day on Tuesday of each week "-was out of order—be disagreed to.

The debate thereon was forthwith adjourned to the next sitting day.

Question-That on each sitting day, unless otherwise ordered, Government Business shall take precedence of General Business-put.

The House resumed; Mr. Bamford reported accordingly. Resolved—That the House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

- 7. Suspension of Standing Orders.—Sir Joseph Cook moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay. Question—put and passed.
- 8. Supply Resolution.—The Resolution reported from the Committee of Supply was read, and, on the motion of Sir Joseph Cook, was adopted by the House.
- 9. Ways and Means Resolution.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

#### (In the Committee.)

SUPPLY BILL (No. 2) 1920-21.

Resolved, on the motion of Sir Joseph Cook-That, towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty for the services of the year 1920-21, there be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum not exceeding £2,367,826.

Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Watkins reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Sir Joseph Cook, was adopted by the House.

Ordered—That Sir Joseph Cook and Mr. Greene do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.
