# VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

## HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

### MONDAY, 13TH AUGUST, 1923.

- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Right Honorable W. A. Watt) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Land Tax Assessment Bill (1923).—Mr. Groom (Attorney-General), for Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer), moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend Section Twentynine of the Land Tax Assessment Act 1910-1916.
  - Mr. Scullin moved, as an amendment, That all the words after the word "That" be omitted, with a view to the insertion of the following words in place thereof:—"the motion be withdrawn and immediate action taken to collect the land tax due on Crown leaseholds."
  - Debate ensued.

    Mr. Charlton addressing the House, and not having concluded his speech, the House ordered that the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.
  - Ordered—That the debate be now adjourned, and that the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for a later hour this day.
