THURSDAY, 16TH AUGUST, 1923.

1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Right Honorable W. A. Watt) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2. ADJOURNMENT-MOTION FOR PURPOSE OF DISCUSSION.—Mr. Lacey rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The unsatisfactory shipping facilities existing at Eyre's Peninsula and Spencer's Gulf Ports, which are detrimental to the trade and development of that part of South Australia".

Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly— Mr. Lacey moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Mr. Lacey moved, Debate ensued. Question --put.

5. SULPHUR BOUNTY BILL.—The Order of the Day having been read for the consideration in Committee of the whole House of His Excellency the Governor-General's Message No. 20-Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Resolved, on the motion of Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister)-That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for the Payment of a Bounty on Sulphur.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed ; Mr. Robert Cook reported accordingly.

Mr. Bruce moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay.

Question-put and passed.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Bruce, was adopted by the House.

Ordered-That Mr. Bruce and Mr. Austin Chapman do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Bruce then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a first time.

Mr. Bruce moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Clauses 1 and 2 agreed to. Clause 3 debated and agreed to. Clause 4 debated and agreed to. Clauses 5 to 9 agreed to. Clause 10 debated and agreed to. Clauses 11 to 13 agreed to. Preamble agreed to. Title agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed ; Mr. Watkins reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Bruce, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.

6. WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTION-CUSTOMS TARIFF [SULPHUR] AMENDMENT.-The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, on the motion of Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister)-That, so long as a bounty is payable on sulphur under any law of the Commonwealth, the importation of sulphur, to which sub-Item (A) (1) of Item 275 of the Schedule to the *Customs Tariff* 1921-1922 applies, shall be free of duty. Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Watkins reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee. Mr. Bruce moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay. Question-put and passed.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time. Mr. Bruce moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.
