## THURSDAY, 21st AUGUST, 1924.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Right Honorable W. A. Watt) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works—Report.—Mr. Mackay, for the Chairman of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works, brought up the following Report from the Committee—

Report, together with Minutes of Evidence, relating to the proposed establishment of Automatic Telephone Exchanges at Unley and Norwood, South Australia.

Ordered to be printed.

3. Papers.—The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—Sir Edward Pellew Group of Islands—Report with special reference to Biology and Physical Features by Surgeon Lieutenant W. E. J. Paradice, R.A.N.

5. SEA-CARRIAGE OF GOODS BILL (1924).—The Order of the Day having been read for the third reading—Mr. Pratten (Minister for Trade and Customs) moved, That the Bill be now read a third time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a third time.

6. Supply Resolution—Supply Bill.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

### Supply Bill (No. 2) 1924-25.

Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer) moved—That there be granted to His Majesty for or towards defraying the services of the year 1924-25 a sum not exceeding £2,978,575.

Mr. Anstey moved, as an amendment, That the sum be reduced by £1.

Question—That the motion be agreed to—put and passed. Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Bamford reported accordingly. Resolved-That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

- 7. Suspension of Standing Orders.—Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay. Question—put and passed.
- 8. Supply Resolution.—The Resolution reported from the Committee of Supply was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer), was adopted by the House.
- 9. Ways and Means Resolution.—The House, according to order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

#### (In the Committee.)

### Supply Bill (No. 2) 1924-25.

Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer) moved, That, towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty for the services of the year 1924-25, there be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum not exceeding £2,978,575.

Question—put and passed.

Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Bamford reported accordingly.

Resolved-That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee. The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Earle Page, was adopted by the House.

Ordered—That Mr. Earle Page and Mr. Bruce do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

10. Supply Bill (No. 2) 1924-25.—Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer) then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to grant and apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five," and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Earle Page moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

#### (In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Bamford reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Earle Page, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time. 21st August, 1924.

11. Message from the Senate.—States Loan Bill (1924).—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate :-
