Inquiry into Community Broadcasting

On behalf of the South Australian Multicultural and Ethnic Affairs Commission, I write in support of the National Ethnic and Multicultural Broadcasters Council's submission in relation to the Inquiry into Community Broadcasting.

Over many years, ethnic radio stations have played an invaluable role in providing communities with information on government initiatives and services, in addition to culturally appropriate entertainment.
