## Senate committee activity

SUMMARY AS AT 11 May 2017

## Activity

In the $45^{\text {th }}$ Parliament, at 11 May 2017, there have been:

- 127 references ( 101 new references and 26 re-adopted from the 44th Parliament);
- 121 reports tabled;
- 183 hearings.

The following tables compare references and reports at the same point in previous parliaments, as well as a tally by financial year of references and hearings held.

## Additional indicators of activity:

- The department is currently supporting six select committees. Two select committees have completed their inquiries. During the $44^{\text {th }}$ Parliament, the department supported 12 select committees (including one committee later re-established).
- At present, the department also supports six joint committees.
- The busiest committee during the $44^{\text {th }}$ Parliament was the Economics Committee, which managed 20 inquiries in February 2016, and 18 in September and in November 2015.


## Staffing

Average staffing for 2016-17: At 3 May 2017 there were 70.4 Full Time Equivalent staff in the Committee Office, compared with an average FTE of 66.8 for 2015-16.

## Administration

Cost of running Senate committees: The current annual budget for the Committee Office is approximately $\$ 8.8$ million. At 30 April 2017, the 2016-17 year-to-date operational costs for the office were $\$ 8.5$ million.

In 2015-16, operational costs for the Committee Office were $\$ 10.7$ million (including corporate overheads). Additional resources were sought and used in the last financial year.

As an indicator of the level of committee activity, the following chart averages the number of inquiries referred over the duration of each parliament. For instance, there were fewer references in the 44th Parliament than the 43rd, however, the 44th Parliament was 19 weeks (4 and a half months) shorter in duration so the level of activity over time was higher. Similarly, the figures for the 45th Parliament cover just over 8 months, to mid-May 2017, but as can be seen the rate at which matters have been referred is higher than in the previous two parliaments.
