Question:

Current funded health policies clearly inhibit and prevent medical practitioners from diagnosing and treating many pathogenically ill patients, often resulting in life long illness and sometimes morbid outcomes. Why are there no effective guidelines or regulations underpinning appropriate medical practitioner training to enable medical practitioners to deal with patients who have presented with recognisable symptoms of pathogenic infections but remain undiagnosed due to limited specific testing?

Answer:

As part of ongoing medical education and registration medical practitioners are required to maintain relevant clinical knowledge.
