Topic: Copyright Amendment

Senator Brown, Carol asked:

- 1. Please provide an update on the Copyright Amendment (Disability Access and Other Measures) Bill.
 - (a) What is its current status?
 - (b) An exposure draft of the Bill was released for public comment at the beginning of 2016, what were the outcomes of that consultation process?
 - (c) When will the Bill be introduced?

Answer:

- (a) The Copyright Amendment (Disability Access and Other Measures) Bill 2017 was introduced in the House of Representatives on 22 March 2017 and passed on 28 March 2017. It was then introduced in the Senate, read and moved on 29 March 2017 and is expected to be debated in the winter sittings.
- (b) The Department received 89 submissions on the exposure draft from stakeholders which are now available on the Department's website (www.communications.gov.au/have-yoursay/updating-australias-copyright-laws). The Department also conducted numerous face-to-face, telephone and correspondence-based consultations with various copyright stakeholders. A list of stakeholders that the Department consulted following the release of the exposure draft is at **Attachment A**.

The changes made after consultation included:

- i. Amendments to the definitions for "institutions", "original form" and "persons with a disability".
- ii. Disability access provisions amended to clarify that copying can be conducted by or on behalf of a person with a disability.
- iii. Clarification of how the provisions for libraries and archives are intended to operate and which libraries and archives the provisions apply to. Conditions for making preservation and research copies simplified and expanded to apply to copying for other libraries.
- iv. Educational statutory licence amended to:
 - a. Expand the licence to cover internet transmissions of broadcast content and catch-up television services.

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- b. Clarify the priority of the statutory licence over other exceptions in the *Copyright Act 1968*.
- c. Enable the Copyright Tribunal to determine retrospective and prospective licence fees, requirements for entry onto school premises and sets out arrangements for making applications and referrals to the Tribunal, and
- d. Expand the exam copying exception to apply to all types of copyright material.
- v. New provisions for the duration of copyright for unpublished works where there are joint authors and for unpublished sound recordings and films.
- vi. Removal of the measures to expand the Safe Harbour scheme from the Bill. The Safe Harbour measures considered extending the scheme to a broader range of online service providers (such as universities and search engines). The measure was removed from the Bill before its introduction to enable the Government to further consider feedback received on this proposal whilst not delaying the passage of the remainder of the Bill.
- (c) The Australian Government introduced the Copyright Amendment (Disability Access and Other Measures) Bill 2017 in the House of Representatives on 22 March 2017.
