## Student pastoral care programs

Senator JACINTA COLLINS: Senator Ryan referred to a large body of research that shows that student pastoral care programs—I think he may have actually focused on part of the program statement, the advantages in relation to social and emotional skills. Does that research focus on student pastoral care programs in a general sense or does it focus solely on programs provided by chaplains?
