Question

Government payments of accounts

a) From 7 September 2013 to date, has the department/agency paid its accounts to contractors/consultants etc in accordance with Government policy in terms of time for payment (i.e. within 30 days)? b) If not, why not? Provide details, including what has been the timeframe for payment of accounts? Please provide a breakdown, average statistics etc as appropriate to give insight into how this issue is being approached) c) For accounts not paid within 30 days, is interest being paid on overdue amounts and if so how much has been paid by the portfolio/department agency for the current financial year and the previous financial year? d) Where interest is being paid, what rate of interest is being paid and how is this rate determined?

Answer

The Department of Employment was established on 18 September 2013. Previously the functions were delivered by the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR).

For the month of September 2013 DEEWR paid 97 per cent of suppliers within 30 days of receiving a correctly rendered invoice.

For the period 1 October to 30 November 2013, the answer refers to the Department of Employment¹. In this period 97 per cent of suppliers were paid within 30 days of receipt a correctly rendered invoice.

¹. Corporate and the State Office Network provide services to the Department of Employment and the Department of Education. The value associated with these functions has been attributed to both departments.

For accounts not paid within 30 days there are a variety of reasons for late payment. These include time delays in determining correctness of invoice, invoicing for projects prior to advice that all requirements of the project have been met, and invoicing prior to the provision of goods or services.

No claims for interest due to late payment have been received during the 2012-13 financial year and none of the payments not made within 60 days related to small business.
