Question

How many cases of workplace bullying were reported in 2011-12? Include how that compares to previous years.

Answer

The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) recorded 16 cases of workplace bullying for the period 1 July 2011 to 30 June 2012. Of these:

- four were inquiries seeking information and/or guidance about whether behaviour experienced/witnessed may have constituted workplace bullying. An assessment was made that these separate incidents did not constitute workplace bullying and no further action resulted from these inquiries;
- two cases were followed up as there were grounds for concern that workplace bullying may have taken place, but further inquiries indicated that no bullying had taken place;
- eight cases were followed up and handled through informal measures (e.g. mediation/conciliation); and
- two cases were formally investigated as an alleged breach of the Code of Conduct.

DFAT recorded seven cases of workplace bullying for the period 1 July 2010 to 30 June 2011. Of these:

- one was an inquiry seeking information and/or guidance about whether behaviour experienced/witnessed may have constituted workplace bullying. An assessment was made that this incident did not constitute workplace bullying and no further action resulted from the inquiry;
- five cases were followed up and handled through informal measures (e.g. mediation/conciliation); and
- one case was formally investigated as an alleged breach of the Code of Conduct.

Question

Can you also tell me whether there have been any changes to the system of reporting, and how incidents in the workplace are classified?

Answer

In March 2011 there was a change to the system of reporting cases of bullying by Workplace Diversity Contact Officers in the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. As a result, the department's Workplace Diversity Unit (WDU) now sends cabled instructions every quarter to all divisions in Canberra, State/Territory Offices and overseas posts requesting that they provide a report to the WDU of any bullying cases that occurred during that three-month period. This helps ensure the WDU has visibility of all cases of bullying, especially those that may have been managed informally at posts.

Incidents are classified into the following five broad categories:

- informal approaches to the department's Workplace Diversity Unit/Workplace Diversity Contact Officer Network and/or Conduct and Ethics Unit that are classified as simply "seeking information and guidance" about bullying-related issues;
- inquiries seeking information and/or guidance about whether behaviour experienced/witnessed may have constituted workplace bullying, and an assessment was made that these separate incidents did not constitute workplace bullying and no further action resulted from these inquiries;
- situations where there are grounds for concern that workplace bullying may have taken place, but further inquiries indicated that no bullying had taken place;
- incidents that are followed up and handled through informal measures (e.g. mediation/conciliation);
- incidents that are formally investigated as an alleged breach of the Code of Conduct.

Would you take on notice to provide the committee with an indication of how many reports have been made that have not been rolled up into the departmental-level reporting?

Answer

Question

Could you give us an indication as to how many reports have been made that have results in some kind of action against an employee, whether it be a fine, a demotion or even termination of employment?

In the 2011-12 reporting period, of the two cases that were formally investigated as an alleged breach of the Code of Conduct, one case resulted in an employee being dismissed. The other case investigated found no evidence of bullying having taken place.

In the 2010-11 reporting period, of the single case that was formally investigated as an alleged breach of the Code of Conduct, a decision was taken not to apply a sanction. Senator Carr discussed the four-point invitation in a 90-minute meeting with Minister Fabius at the Quai d'Orsay in Paris.

The meeting took place on the same day that France ordered the temporary closure of 20 Middle East embassies following publication of anti-Islamic cartoons in a French satirical magazine.

Senator Carr said he could understand that many Muslims considered this material blasphemous but urged them to respond peacefully.

Senator Carr said they should be invited to do so by:

Funding explanations of Islam in western languages;

Producing formal online responses to anti-Islamic material

Funding institutes which promote tolerant Islam through teaching publications and seminars; and

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Using available legal avenues.

"All these responses would be more satisfactory than demonstrations which can be captured by extremists," Senator Carr said.

"Demonstrations can bring out the worst, and as we saw in Australia they can produce understandable outrage from the rest of the community.

"The alternative is peaceful engagement.

- B. Following more recent contact made by Mr Buckley, the Embassy in Beijing made official representations on this matter to the relevant Chinese authorities in late March 2013.

Question

During the AUSMIN talks there was an announcement about US-Australian radar systems being able to accurately track objects launched into orbit by China or Russia. Have either of these countries – China in particular in this part of the inquiry – made any comment to Australia in relation to that?

Answer

No such announcement was made at AUSMIN.

The 2012 AUSMIN joint communique announced cooperation between Australia and the United States to establish a jointly operated US C-Band space surveillance radar at the Harold E. Holt Naval Communication Station in Western Australia. The radar will enhance the United States Space Surveillance Network's ability to track manmade space objects orbiting Earth. This will provide satellite operators around the world with warnings of possible collisions with such space objects and thereby reducing the danger posed by space debris.

In relation to the AUSMIN announcement, DFAT is not aware of any inquiries by China, Russia or any other country.

Question

I have some questions about Burma. The UN Special Rapporteur's mandate is up for renewal in March. In his last report he expressed significant concern about the ongoing violation of human rights in Burma. Will Australia support the extension of the mandate of the UN Special Rapporteur for human rights in Burma for a further year?

Answer

Yes. The issue of extending the mandate of the UN Special Rapporteur on the Human Rights Situation in Myanmar was considered most recently during the 22nd session of the UN Human Rights Council (HRC) in Geneva, which took place from 25 February to 22 March. While Australia is not a member of the HRC, we can cosponsor resolutions. We have co-sponsored resolutions concerning the mandate of the Special Rapporteur for Myanmar since Tomas Quintana was appointed in 2008, and have co-sponsored the relevant HRC resolution again in 2013. Australia values the important contributions of UN Special Rapporteurs in progressing human rights issues and we appreciate the work of Tomas Quintana in this role.

Question No. 24 Program: DFAT Topic: Myanmar Question on Notice Page: 28 Senator Rhiannon

Question

I understand that the USA has implemented a reporting requirement for American companies investing in Burma. Under this requirement, companies will have to disclose their due diligence with regard to human rights and land acquisition. Has the government here looked at a similar process? And has there been any discussion on adopting a similar program? So, if you could take on notice whether we are considering doing it or whether there has been any consideration or any talks on this possibility, that would be appreciated.

Answer

No. The Government encourages Australian companies to conduct appropriate due diligence, exercise all reasonable precautions about who they are doing business with and, where necessary, obtain independent legal advice when considering investing in Myanmar, but does not require specific reporting of these activities.

Question

Is Australia providing any support, financial or otherwise, to the Australia-Myanmar Chamber of Commerce? If so, what support is being provided?

Answer

The Australian Government is not providing support, either financial or in-kind, to the Australia-Myanmar Chamber of Commerce.

Question

Staying on the Americas: this in relation to the AR15 weapon that was used in the recent US school shootings. I understand that there was a statement made by your minister on 24 October 2012 whereby you suggested that no weapons were produced in Australia. I quote: "There are no arms manufactured in Australia so the weapons that people use in crimes here are all imported and often imported illegally." Did you receive an advice from the department before you made that statement, specifically in relation to require arms?

Senator Carr: Can we check that quote?

Answer

The Minister receives regular briefings on international security matters including Australian efforts to negotiate an Arms Trade Treaty that seeks to regulate the global trade in conventional weapons, and help eliminate illegal and irresponsible trade in these arms. Question No. 29 Program: DFAT Topic: Import of beef from countries with BSE in cattle Question on Notice Page: 33 Senator the Hon Bill Heffernan

Question

Three years ago I was in Canada. When they discovered I was there, they did not deport me but invited me to the rural committee of the parliament to discuss why Australia would not import beef from Canada. As I said to them in very simple language, 'If you could guarantee us that you do not have any BSE in your herd, we would talk to you. Until you have not, we may not talk to you.' Given that we very nearly agreed to import beef from the United States, and BSE has been reacting there—and there have been many reactors in Canada which has an open border, or did have. It is the same with Mexico—no national livestock identification from birth to death, et cetera. There is no such thing as a BSE-free herd because the only way to know if someone has not got BSE in a cow is to kill it. As you know, there is probably up to a 30-year incubation period for CJD in humans. It is endemic in Europe. Given that we have recently announced that we have agreed to take beef from some countries in Europe that have had BSE, and I will be dealing very ferociously with that, in a diplomatic sense and in terms of diplomatic pressure to accept these importations of beef from countries that have had BSE, is there a risk from your perspective, Minister, that the pressure to come to a trade arrangement could be more powerful than the arguments on biosecurity, which have to be based on science and the vagaries of science and health?

Given that we have never had a BSE reactor in Australia, and given that there are no such things as BSE-free zones in the United States, at a DFAT level have you (Senator Carr) or DFAT had discussions as to how they could facilitate diplomatically the entry of such products into Australia?

Answer

Senator Carr has not had any discussions on how to diplomatically facilitate the import of beef from countries that have had bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE). The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) has assisted Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ) and the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) by providing information and responding to enquiries from trading partners on Australia's policy for imported food safety relating to beef and BSE.

Australia's laws, regulations and practices in relation to biosecurity and food safety are based on science and are consistent with its rights and obligations as a member of the World Trade Organization.

Question No. 30 Program: DFAT Topic: Sri Lanka Question on Notice Page: 43 Senator Rhiannon

Question

With respect to the document 'Lessons Learnt and Reconciliation Commission', you would be aware that there was considerable international criticism, that there was inequity in many areas and that there are continuing calls for there to be an independent international investigation into the war crimes on both sides. Have you given consideration to that call?

Answer

The Australian Government has consistently stated that accountability is integral to reconciliation in Sri Lanka. An international criminal tribunal with jurisdiction over Sri Lanka's civil war could not be established without the consent of Sri Lanka or a Chapter VII UN Security Council resolution. The Government continues to urge the Government of Sri Lanka to take further action to implement the recommendations in the Lessons Learnt and Reconciliation Report and to investigate and prosecute all allegations of serious international crimes committed by both sides to the conflict in a transparent and independent manner.

Question

You said, Mr Rowe, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade is serving on an IDC. What sort of level of representation does your department have on the IDC? Do you have available to you, and I appreciate you may not, a record of the meetings of the IDC? Do you have a record of the dates, times, places and attendance?

Answer

An inter-agency meeting on the Open Government Partnership was hosted by the Attorney-General's Department on 3 August 2012. It was chaired by the Attorney-General's Department at SES Band One level, and was attended at Director level by the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, and the Department of Broadband, Communications and the Digital Economy.

Question

- A. In relation to Australian students who are studying and undertaking educational exchange programs overseas, do you provide specific advice to them, or is it in terms of the Smartraveller website, or is it incorporated on the advice that is given depending on which country they are actually studying in?
- B. Is there anything specific for overseas students? I am interested to know if there is any exchange-student-specific information that is particularly pertinent for students.

Answer

Country-specific advice for all Australians is provided through the travel advice for each country. Advice to Australians travelling or living overseas is also provided through a range of pages on the website covering general issues or situations.
- B. There is no exchange student-specific information for overseas students provided on the Smartraveller website. Among the general advice pages, the "Living and working overseas" and "Backpacking" pages contain information that may be pertinent to students.

Question No. 33 Program: DFAT Topic: Australian Passports Question on Notice Page: 55 Senator Fawcett

Question

Please give us an indication of how many Australian passports over the last five years on an annual basis have been identified to be fake passports, whether it is through AFP, Customs or international agencies?

Answer

The only incidents of "fake", that is counterfeit, Australian passports we are aware of are those allegedly used in connection with the murder of Hamas figure Mahmoud al-Mabhouh about which the then Foreign Minister, Stephen Smith MP, made statements to Parliament on 25 February 2010 and 25 May 2010.

Question

- A. Has there been any reduction in the number of security personnel employed to guard Australian Embassies or High Commissions?
- B. I would like to verify the security clearance process for overseas missions, in particular whether the security checks on potential staff include their families.

Answer

- A. Over the last two financial years there has been an overall net increase in security guard numbers at Australian embassies and high commissions.
- B. The security clearance process for staff at overseas missions follows the requirements of the *Protective Security Policy Framework* (PSPF) and the Department's Security Manual (updated and reissued in February 2013). It is the same process used for staff based in Australia. While applicants for a security clearance must provide information relating to family members, all security checks relate directly to employees.

Question

Given the brevity of the time, could you take on notice and come back to the committee and advise us: what were the trade agreements or commitments or other obligations, including those under WTO, that Australia broke with Indonesia when we imposed the ban on the export of live cattle to Indonesia in 2011? I do not expect you to have that information, but it was obviously done without consultation with the Indonesians. I would be appreciative if you could provide that on notice for me.

Answer

Australia has the right under international trade rules to take action to ensure that Australian cattle are treated in accordance with international standards.

Question

Can I take you to our beef trade with South Korea. I notice on your website that you have listed beef exports between Australia and South Korea at \$770 million. Over what period was that?

The MLA has stated that beef exports are at \$632 million. I am trying to determine if the disparity in figures is simply a measurement assessment issue from each of the parties or if there is an actual discrepancy in one of the figures – one of them is not actually correct. Could you look at that for me?

Answer

The figure on the DFAT website for beef exports from Australia to South Korea is \$773 million and this is in respect of 2011 for fresh, chilled and frozen (fcf) beef. This figure appears in the Republic of Korea country brief. The MLA figure of \$632 million looks to be in respect of 2012, as per the table below displaying the value of beef exports to Korea, 2010 to 2012.

Question

Would a South Korean company pulling out of a bid with Australia citing sovereign risk – and I quote the Poongsan Corporation: "The sovereign risk the Australian program represents to Korean companies has become too large to ignore" be something that you are conscious of as to the impacts on trade? Is that something that has rung any alarm bells for you? It is on page 3 of the Australian Financial Review and you are not aware of it? Does no one read the paper in the department? Could you take on notice to ask somebody in your department to bring this to your attention, and could you provide the committee with your response as to the significance of that particular article?

Answer

DFAT sees articles of the type carried by the Australian Financial Review of 30 January, alleging "Australian sovereign risk", from time to time. Poongsan Corporation has not raised this matter with DFAT officials or our Embassy in Seoul, and neither has the Government of the Republic of Korea (ROK). ROK investment in Australia continues to increase strongly. Question No. 38 Program: DFAT Topic: South Korea - Trade Question on Notice Page: 60 Senator Nash

Question:

Can you take on notice for me, then, what you see those advantages as being (US having a tariff advantage) and what those advantages have been over the last 12 months for the US, and provide that to the committee? The investor state dispute settlement mechanism that South Korea wants to be in the FTA – is that the sticking point? Is that what is holding it up? What is our view on that?

Answer:

Under the Korea-United States FTA, Korea granted tariff concessions to the United States for all products except rice and rice-related tariff lines. The United States therefore has a preferential tariff compared to Australia for all products that Korea imposes tariffs on.

The investor-state dispute settlement mechanism is among a number of outstanding issues we are working on with the Korean Government to resolve in order to conclude an FTA. Treatment of Australian beef exports is also a key priority.

The Gillard government has explicitly stated in its Trade Policy Statement of April 2011 that Australia will not be seeking investor-state dispute settlement provisions in FTAs because of the disparity they create between the legal rights granted to foreign and domestic businesses.

The government is focused on achieving a timely and high quality outcome for this trade agreement, and which is balanced in accordance with the Trade Policy Statement. Question No. 39 Program: DFAT Topic: EFIC Question on Notice Page: 67 Senator Rhiannon

Question

In response to the (Productivity) Commission's recommendation 9.6 dealing with funding proposals that have significant adverse environmental or social impacts, which includes three separate recommendations, the government's response document says, 'Agree in part' across all three. Could you clarify which parts are agreed to and which parts are not agreed to?

Answer

The wording "agreed in part" was used to acknowledge the fact that EFIC already discloses its prospective involvement in a transaction associated with a project that has potentially significant adverse environmental or social impacts, consistent with its international obligations and that EFIC also makes public its support to projects located in Australia after a transaction is signed. EFIC does not disclose its potential involvement in transactions associated with a category A project in Australia because such projects are subject to the approval requirements of the relevant State or Territory government and, where required, the Commonwealth Government and these assessment processes already provide for extensive public consultation.

In early 2011, EFIC adopted the *Policy and Procedure for Environmental and Social Review of Transactions* to replace its previous *Environment Policy (2005)*. An independent facilitator's report on the public consultations remains on EFIC's website.

EFIC engages an independent environmental and social expert to conduct an audit of EFIC's application of the Policy and Procedure every two years. Independent consultants, Net Balance Management Group Pty Ltd (Net Balance), undertook the first audit from September – November 2012 and a copy of the audit report is on EFIC's website.

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In July 2012 EFIC launched a Complaints Mechanism in addition to the existing customer feedback tool under EFIC's Customer Service Charter. Any party concerned about, affected or likely to be affected by EFIC's activities, including a project supported by an EFIC transaction, can utilise the Complaints Mechanism. EFIC will continue to be informed in its environmental and social policies and practices by the World Bank's International Finance Corporation Performance Standards, the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) Guidelines on Multinational Enterprises, the United Nations Guiding Principles for Business and Human Rights, the Equator Principles and the OECD Common Approaches.

- B. Following Secretary Kerry's confirmation as Secretary of State, Senator Carr first spoke with him by phone on the morning of Sunday 10 February. They discussed a range of issues, including the US rebalance to the Asia Pacific, the UN Security Council, Middle East issues, negotiations towards an Arms Trade Treaty, climate change and oceans.

Senator Carr and Secretary Kerry held their first bilateral meeting in Washington on the morning of Monday 18 March 2013. They discussed the US rebalance to the Asia-Pacific region, our joint force posture initiatives, the Middle East Peace Process, North Korea, the South China Sea, Southeast Asia, negotiation of the Trans-Pacific Partnership, Myanmar, the Pacific, Syria, oceans and climate change.

On the evening of 18 March, Senator Carr and Secretary Kerry both spoke at an event organised by the National Geographic Society and the Pew Charitable Trusts to promote efforts to establish a marine protected area in Antarctica's Ross Sea.

C. As mentioned above, Senator Carr and Secretary Kerry held their first meeting in person in Washington on the morning of Monday 18 March 2013.

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- D. On the occasion of the Guest of Government visit to Australia by the then Secretary of State, the Honorable Hillary Rodham Clinton, for the Australia-United States Ministerial Consultations which was held in Perth in November 2012, Mrs Clinton was presented with the following gifts:
 - The Prime Minister presented her with an Australian designed necklace and earrings to the value of \$285.
 - Senator Carr presented her with a framed painting by Maggie Bird Mpetyane to the value of \$280.

We are not aware of any other gifts that may have been presented to Secretary Clinton by other ministers.

- A. Australia has signed a bilateral strategic partnership with Germany to institutionalise regular high-level policy dialogues between the two countries. Please provide further details of the partnership, including how often representatives from the two countries will meet.

- A. The Berlin-Canberra Declaration of Intent on a Strategic Partnership (Strategic Partnership) between Australia and Germany was signed on 28 January 2013 by the Australian and German Foreign Ministers, Senator Bob Carr and Dr Guido Westerwelle. It provides a framework for enhanced cooperation by institutionalising annual consultations at ministerial and senior-officials levels. It also establishes principles and priority areas for cooperation in the following areas: strategic policy; security and defence cooperation; economic relations, trade and investment; energy and resources, climate change, and clean technology; international development assistance cooperation; education, science and research; culture, media and people-to-people links; and social and labour policy.
- B. The Strategic Partnership will enhance the level of dialogue and cooperation between Australia and Germany. Germany is the world's 4th largest economy, as well as being the EU's most populous member state and largest single economy. It is a major development assistance and science and research partner for Australia, with significant trade and investment links. The Strategic Partnership will work to ensure both countries' key interests within the bilateral relationship are recognised at the most senior levels in government. The Annex to the Strategic Partnership, which is publicly available online, lists a number of initiatives/ work streams to be advanced under the priority areas for cooperation noted above.
- C. Australia currently has nine 'Strategic Partnerships', with: ASEAN, Brazil, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Japan, Singapore and the United States. Australia has comprehensive arrangements for consultation and cooperation with other key partner countries that are not titled 'Strategic Partnerships'.

- E. The value of the operating costs incurred in the delivery of the project is \$18 million.
- F. Contractors are currently procuring major items of plant, equipment and materials. Until such time as those procurements are completed, the value of Australian-sourced material is unknown.

G. Indirect tax concession arrangements are negotiated bilaterally on the basis of reciprocity. Following negotiations between DFAT and the Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs (KEMLU), DFAT has proposed an updated bilateral arrangement which will provide indirect tax concessions for construction and renovation arrangements, including the current Australian embassy construction project in Jakarta. KEMLU has given "in principle" agreement to DFAT's proposal; however, internal Indonesian Government agreement (with the Tax Office of the Ministry of Finance) is required for the updated arrangement for concessions to take effect. This approval process is similar to that in Australia. The construction project budget has been developed and approved on a VAT exclusive basis. Therefore, in the event that favourable resolution of this matter is achieved, no savings will be recognised against the approved budget.

Question

Does EFIC work much in the SME (small medium enterprise) sector? I refer to the statement from the Minister for Trade on 29 January 2013, "EFIC Reforms to help business in Asia.", 29 January 2013. The Minister said: "Small and medium-sized enterprises exporting to Asia will benefit most from changes to the Export Finance and Insurance Corporation." What are the changes to EFIC that will enable you to offer products to small businesses? Do these changes involve new products that EFIC can offer? If so, what are the new financial products you are offering? The Minister also said: "EFIC will apply a new market failure test that will help it determine an exporter's eligibility for its financial products and services." Can you expand on this market failure test? Can you outline EFIC's resource allocation (human resources and other) that will be deployed to these new products?

Answer

In the past 7 years, EFIC's support for SME clients (generally with turnover of less than \$150 million) has grown from \$26 million in 2006-07 to \$196.5 million in facilities signed in 2011-12. In 2011-12 EFIC signed a total 104 facilities worth a total of \$1 billion to support Australian exporters, of these facilities 95 supported EFIC's SME and Mid-Market clients across a wide range of products and sectors. Therefore, while in number terms over 90 per cent of EFIC's clients are SMEs, in value terms SMEs are less than 20 per cent. The reforms to EFIC include a new definition of SME to cover businesses with turnover of less than \$100m or less than 100 employees, compared to EFIC's current definition of turnover of less than \$150 million). EFIC advised in its supplementary submission to the Productivity Commission Review that its SME clients typically have a turnover between \$20 million and \$80 million.

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Amendments to the EFIC Act being proposed by the Government will introduce a market failure test and the requirement that EFIC focus its Commercial Account business on small and medium sized enterprises (SMEs). The proposed new legislation will broaden EFIC's existing guarantee powers to enable it to provide guarantees to overseas subsidiaries of Australian-based SMEs where the purpose of the guarantee supports Australian export trade, and where the SME certifies that the guarantee will not result in a net reduction in the number of its employees in Australia during the term of EFIC's guarantee. EFIC will need to consider what further changes to its products and services will be necessary, if any, to underpin its new focus on SMEs and will allocate resources as appropriate.

The market failure test will specify that EFIC support for exporters (on the basis of export contracts, eligible export transactions or Australian export trade) should be based on evidence of:

- . inadequate information about the credit risk and standing of an Australian exporter (or SMEs 'integral' to the domestic supply chain for export-focused projects), foreign buyer or the foreign buyer's bank, which has resulted in private financial providers employing rigid generalised rules and not forming an assessment on the merits of the transaction;
- . inadequate information about the value of some tradeable capital goods or the existence of liquid secondary markets for these goods, which has resulted in private sector financial providers refusing to provide services for transactions involving such goods; or
- . inadequate information about the risk associated with emerging and frontier country export markets or emerging and frontier country outward investment destinations, which has resulted in private sector financial providers refusing to provide products or services for transactions in those markets.

EFIC is considering how it will implement the Government's proposed legislative amendments and is unable to provide information on the human resource implications at this stage. Question No. 53 Program: DFAT Topic: PACER – timelines and sectoral interests Question in Writing Senator Rhiannon

PACER-Plus negotiations on Sanitary Phytosanitary (SPS) and Technical Barriers to Trade (TBT) have resulted in agreement that Island nations that are not WTO members will not be bound to apply the WTO consistent measures and instead will be supported in applying them through assistance from Australia and New Zealand.

- A. Will DFAT commit to a continuation of that flexibility in other areas of negotiations, particularly allowing Island nations to make non-GATS consistent commitments on Services?
- B. Will Australia be looking to have Parties to the PICTA TIS (Pacific Island Countries Trade Agreement Trade in Services) agreement make additional commitments in under any negotiations on services in PACER-Plus?

- A. Where appropriate, Australia will take a flexible approach in the PACER Plus negotiations to the development of treaty provisions relating to non-WTO member Forum Island countries. A number of Forum Island countries are WTO members and have therefore taken on WTO GATS obligations as part of their WTO membership. Initial discussions on services and investment are expected to take place at an inter-sessional PACER Plus meeting being held in Port Vila in early April 2013.
- B. Negotiations for the Pacific Islands Countries' Trade Agreements Trade in Services Protocol concluded in 2012. In August 2012 the Protocol was opened for signature for a period of one year. Country specific commitments under the Protocol are not yet publicly available. As of December 2012, nine countries had signed the Protocol, namely the Cook Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Kiribati, Republic of Marshall Islands, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu. Australia is not aware of any countries that have become a party to the Protocol. Similarly, to date, Australia is not aware that the Protocol has entered into force. Australia will take into account the Protocol, as well as other factors such as relevant WTO obligations and the capacities of non-WTO Forum Island countries, in future discussions on services in the PACER Plus negotiations. Initial discussions on services are expected to take place at an inter-sessional PACER Plus meeting being held in Port Vila in early April 2013.

Question

What is DFAT's position on the extension of the Seasonal Workers Program to include other sectors in the context of negotiating such an outcome in PACER-Plus?

Answer

Regional labour mobility is a priority issue for Forum Island Countries in the PACER Plus negotiations. Provisions for unskilled and less-skilled workers are not included in Australia's WTO GATS commitments or in our other trade agreements. Taking into account Australia's Most Favoured Nation commitments in other agreements, Australia supports negotiating labour mobility provisions in PACER Plus that do not disadvantage Forum Island countries. These issues are still being discussed in PACER Plus, along with a number of other labour issues.

The Seasonal Worker Program currently allows approved Australian employers in the horticulture industry to employ workers from eight Pacific Island nations and Timor-Leste, when there are not enough Australian workers available to meet seasonal demands. The Government is running a three year trial of the use of seasonal workers with accommodation providers, aquaculture ventures, and cotton and cane growers. Answer

A. Australia has offered funding to enable each Forum Island country to obtain a report on PACER Plus under the Trade Research Initiative. At the request of Forum Island countries, social issues may be addressed as part of the Trade Research Initiative report. The majority of Forum Island countries have benefited from the Trade Research Initiative. The remainder of Forum Island countries are being encouraged to take up the Trade Research Initiative offer and they may nominate research on social issues as part of the associated terms of reference for the report. In addition, consultants undertaking the development of past Trade Research Initiative reports for Forum Island countries have sometimes held meetings with interested non-state actors in Forum Island countries. As the remainder of Forum Island countries take up the Trade Research Initiative offer, they may decide to have meetings with interested stakeholders.

Australian domestic consultations on PACER Plus commenced in August 2009 and are ongoing. Consistent with usual practice, DFAT maintains up-to-date web information on the negotiations, provides opportunities for stakeholders to submit written views, and has meetings with stakeholders on request.

Australia continues to support the October 2009 decision by Pacific Islands Forum Trade Ministers to hold annual regional Dialogues with interested Non State Actors. Australia has contributed funds for two regional Dialogues with interested Non State Actors, most recently in March 2012.

B. Australia has offered to provide assistance with respect to implementation of PACER Plus as part of the negotiations.

Question

Answer

A. DFAT and AusAID are aware of allegations made by online newspaper *The Marvai Post*, in an article published on 26 October 2011, that Paladin Energy engaged in corrupt processes. The article also implied that the company was knowingly involved in the death of a prominent student and civil society activist. *The Marvai Post* subsequently published a correction on 22 November 2011 withdrawing the allegations as false. In October 2012, the Chair of Malawi's Human Rights Commission, Ambassador Sophie Kalinde, confirmed there was no substance to allegations that Paladin Energy was involved in the activist's death.

Local media reported in January 2013 that Paladin Energy had lodged a complaint with Malawi's Anti-Corruption Bureau following an alleged approach to the company by a senior Malawian figure soliciting a payment of approximately US\$1 million.

Separately, Paladin has refuted allegations of bribery made in Malawi's National Assembly in November 2012 by a Member of Parliament. In doing so, Paladin reaffirmed that bribery is a breach of company policy. According to local media reporting, the claims are not being investigated by Malawi's Anti-Corruption Board. This is a matter for the Malawian Government.

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Australia's Ambassador and Deputy Head of Mission in Harare visited the Kayelekera Mine site in November 2012, visiting several community projects funded by Paladin and observing a consultation meeting between Paladin management and local business leaders and community groups. Paladin has carried out 82 community projects in Karonga and areas surrounding the Kayelekera Mine, at a cost of more than \$16 million. This has included providing a state-of-the-art water treatment plant for the Karonga town water supply, costing more than \$10 million; the construction and upgrade of several schools in the immediate area around the mine site; significant improvements to the Karonga hospital; and significant support – including from Paladin employees – for a school for the deaf. In addition to the significant positive impact of the community work, the Kayelekera Mine is driving employment and other economic growth benefits for northern Malawi, including through a commitment to local procurement (for example, 85-90 per cent of perishable food for workers is procured from Karonga producers).

Based on Paladin's response to the allegations made, and its conduct within Malawi, and across Africa more generally, DFAT is confident of Paladin Energy's suitability as a partner for the delivery of DAP projects.

B. All decisions about the allocation of DAP funds are subject to the DAP guidelines. The DAP is managed by DFAT at Australia's overseas posts and is available to registered NGOs, organisations and individuals working on development activities on a not-for-profit basis. This includes potential co-funding with private companies conducting not-for-profit development activities. In accordance with the guidelines, applications are assessed on their merits in line with development criteria and objectives established by DFAT, AusAID and each post. All successful projects must demonstrate clear humanitarian or development outcomes for a disadvantaged group of people. Projects must also fall within the OECD Development Assistance Committee sectors. Under the DAP guidelines, posts must have in place well-defined risk management strategies and transparent accountability processes and be able to justify their selection processes when reporting on their annual DAP allocation expenditure. Further details about the DAP guidelines can be found at

http://www.dfat.gov.au/direct_aid_program/dap_guidelines.html.

C. Posts are responsible for the management of their respective DAP programs, and are required to make best endeavours to confirm that a project is on track to be completed within the agreed timeframe through evaluation of regular progress reports and photographs of the projects and through site visits where practical and/or cost-effective. Advice from regional governments, local councils, NGOs or local cooperatives may also be sought to evaluate whether a project is on track to be completed as required. Posts must also fully acquit all DAP projects. Reports on DAP projects are not made public. There are a number of measures DFAT can take or initiate as appropriate if it is not satisfied with a recipient's use of DAP funding. These include referral of the case to AusAID's Audit Section and DFAT's Conduct Ethics and Fraud Unit for further investigation; efforts to recover misappropriated funds and assets; and investigation and prosecution of the offenders by local authorities, as appropriate.

Legislation giving effect to the Government's response to the Productivity Commission Report on Australia's Export Credit Arrangements was introduced into the House of Representatives in the last week of the Autumn sittings of Parliament. EFIC will need to consider what changes to its structure and processes will be necessary to implement the proposed new legislation.

The Government undertakes a detailed assessment of the risks and benefits of proposed transactions on the National Interest Account (NIA) and provides clear public explanations of the reasons for providing facilities on the NIA. In addition, information on the performance of the NIA is disclosed in the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Portfolio Budget Statements.

EFIC currently provides information on the facilities signed during a financial year in its on-line register and Annual Report. This information includes the name of the firm, the facility type, the amount of the facility and the environmental category.

A. The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner (OAIC), established under the Australian Information Commissioner Act 2010, provides advice to all agencies governed by the Freedom of Information Act 1982 with respect to responding to FOI requests. This advice is available at http://www.oaic.gov.au/publications/guidelines.html#foi_guidelines. From time to time, this advice is updated. In recent months, there have been some updates to these guidelines. The online version represents the most up-to-date version of the advice.

The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet provided FOI Guidance Notes to all departments on 28 July 2011. This is available at http://www.dpmc.gov.au/foi/guidance_notes.cfm. There has been no update to this advice since it was issued.

B. DFAT compiles information on staff-hours and non-labour costs relating to FOI at the end of each financial year. DFAT provides this information to the Office of the Information Commissioner (OAIC) for publication in the usual reporting cycle. The OAIC then uses its own methodology to estimate the cost for each agency.

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This final cost information is published by the Office of the Information Commissioner on its website in the Freedom of Information Act 1982 Annual Report. For 2011-2012, DFAT provided its inputs to the OAIC, including estimated total staff-hours of 13710 and non-labour costs of \$9562. The OAIC methodology indicates an estimated total cost to DFAT of \$938,602.

Reporting partial year results may not provide an accurate comparison to previous whole year data. Moreover, answering this question would involve an unreasonable diversion of resources to undertake the task part way through the reporting cycle. The process must be undertaken at the end of the reporting period. The information will be provided by DFAT at the end of the financial year and will be published by the Office of the Information Commissioner on its website.

C. For the half year from July to December 2012, the Department received 107 FOI requests, a rate of 214 requests/year.

A range of statutory extensions of time are permitted under the FOI Act. Response times over 30 days do not necessarily indicate that the response is overdue, once statutory extensions are allowed for. Nevertheless, in some cases the Department's response has occurred after the processing time has elapsed. Where it occurs, the reason for the delay beyond the processing times allowed under the FOI Act is that the request is large and/or complex, requiring extensive analysis and consultation.

In the financial year of 2011-12 DFAT closed 204 FOI requests. In the half year from July to December 2012, the Department closed 111 requests.

Requests may be closed through a variety of means, including finalisation of the request, withdrawal of the request – some requests were withdrawn in the context of the applicant submitting a re-scoped request, and agreement to receive a document outside the FOI Act.

In the period from 06 March until 14 March 2013 there was an impact on performance due to internet slowness. This was a result of a number of factors. Further analysis indicates that the majority of jobs reported during this period of 'slowness' related to when officers were accessing particular internet resources. The most significant factor in the slow access times during these periods has been bandwidth exhaustion. It is probable that the Ministers' offices were also affected on these occasions.

The total expenditure by the department on legal services from the Australian Government Solicitor for this financial year to 28 February was \$1,313,468 broken down as follows: (i) \$609,495 for commercial advice; (ii) \$675,752 for litigation and dispute resolution; and (iii) \$28,221 for general advice.

Answer

The release on 21 March of Fiji's draft constitution is a significant development, but Fiji's return to democracy will require much more.

It will be important that public consultation on the constitution involve free and robust debate, and that the Fiji Government take account of the full range of views expressed

The people of Fiji and the international community will judge the constitutional process on whether it results in a credible election that is consistent with basic principles of human rights and democracy. It is important that Fiji's constitution support principles of human rights, good governance, judicial independence and transparency and accountability, as well as freedoms of media, speech and association.

Fiji's constitution is ultimately a matter for the people of Fiji. It is their views that need to be heard and respected.

The Centre for International Economics in 2009 found that opening up the Australian economy to more trade has made Australian households better off on average by an estimated \$3,900 per annum.

The use of trade restrictions would also damage Australia's credibility as a global advocate for trade liberalisation, and weaken our arguments for other countries to open up their economies to trade.

From the MLA website it can be seen that the figure of 125,000 tonnes for 2012 was forecast by them, in January 2012. At that time the latest available official estimates were in respect of November 2011.

Customs data provided by the Government of the Republic of Korea (South Korea) indicates that South Korea's beef imports from all sources declined from 307,316 tonnes in 2011 to 264,376 tonnes in 2012, a fall of 14 per cent.

From 2011 to 2012, by source country and volume, South Korean beef imports from Australia declined by 9.7 per cent. By comparison, South Korean beef imports from the US declined by 17.6 per cent, New Zealand by 19.8 per cent and Mexico by 52.7 per cent.

The decline in South Korea's beef imports from 2011 to 2012 was primarily due to declining pork and chicken prices in the South Korean market, which attracted consumers away from beef, which remained expensive.

Beef exports to South Korea in 2011 were abnormally high due to that year's outbreak of foot and mouth disease in South Korea, which encouraged Korean consumers to purchase imported beef rather than the domestic product.

Topic: Treaty on Certain Maritime Arrangements in the Timor Sea

Question in Writing

Senator Madigan

Question

The CMATS treaty between Australia and Timor-Leste can, according to Article 12 of the treaty, be unilaterally terminated by either party at any time, now that a development plan has not been agreed to before the end date of 23rd February 2013.

The Foreign Minister gave several detailed answers to my questions in the Senate. In those answers the Minister referred to an independent reserve estimate study that is currently underway.

- A. Can you advise when that study commenced and what its estimated reporting date will be?
- B. As this study has been agreed to by all the involved parties can you advise whether the Australian and Timor-Leste governments are kept informed of ongoing developments as they occur or will this information be withheld until the final report is issued?

In my question to the Minister on whether Australia would be prepared to engage in maritime boundary negotiations if the CMATS treaty were terminated, the Minister stated, understandably, that he would not speculate on what action Australia would take in such an event. However, it seems unlikely that this scenario has not been considered and some plans formulated to cover this possibility.

- C. Can you advise whether any plans have been drawn up to cover such a contingency?
- D. Have other legal avenues been considered, should a dispute over maritime boundaries arise?
- E. Are you aware of any plans for Australia to rejoin the UNCLOS process from which we withdrew in 2002?
- F. Can you advise how many meetings have been held between the Australian and Timor-Leste Governments on this matter over the past two years?
- G. Who were the representatives at those meetings?
- H. Can you advise how many meetings have been held between the Australian Government and Woodside on this matter over the last two years?

- I. Who were the representatives at those meetings and were any third parties involved?
- J. Does the government include the Timor-Leste government in any development negotiations it has with Woodside?

Answer

- A. Australia and Timor-Leste have worked towards an independent reserve estimate study since November 2011. Agreement to proceed with the study was reached by the Sunrise Commission in March 2012. Tenders to undertake the reserve estimate study were sought in November 2012 and are being assessed. The reporting date has yet to be finalised.
- B. The Sunrise Commission is responsible for the independent reserve estimate study. The Australian and Timor-Leste Governments will be advised of ongoing developments through the Commission.
- C. Australia remains committed to the existing treaty framework, including CMATS, which was agreed after long and complex negotiations between Australia and Timor-Leste. The Australian Government continues to focus its efforts on achieving a mutually agreeable development option for Greater Sunrise consistent with the existing treaties.
- D. As a general position, Australia's preference is to settle maritime boundaries by consultation and negotiation. If disputes arise we seek to settle them by such means in a spirit of bilateral cooperation.
- E. There are no plans to change Australia's declaration that it does not accept the dispute settlement provisions of the 1982 *United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea*, or by the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea and the International Court of Justice, for disputes relating to sea boundary delimitations.

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- F. Australia is focussed on development of the Greater Sunrise area in its discussions with Timor-Leste. The Minister for Resources and Energy, Mr Ferguson, emphasised Australia's commitment to work with Timor-Leste to develop the Greater Sunrise area consistent with the Timor Sea treaty framework in discussions with his counterpart, the Timorese Minister for Petroleum and Mineral Resources, on 21-22 February 2013. Australian and Timor-Leste Government officials regularly discuss development of Greater Sunrise at meetings of the Sunrise Commission. The Sunrise Commission has met five times in the past two years.
- G. On discussions related to development of the Greater Sunrise area in the Sunrise Commission, Australia and Timor-Leste are represented by their respective Sunrise Commissioners and Timor-Leste's National Petroleum Authority, the joint regulatory authority responsible for the portion of the Greater Sunrise area in the Joint Petroleum Development Area.
- H. Australian Government Ministers, their staff and officials from the Department of Resources, Energy and Tourism and Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade meet regularly with representatives from Woodside and other Greater Sunrise Joint Venture partners to discuss their interests in Australia and overseas, including in the Timor Sea.
- I. See answer H above.
- J. The Greater Sunrise Joint Venture partners are invited on occasion to discuss development of the Greater Sunrise area with the Australian and Timor-Leste Governments through the Sunrise Commission. In December 2012, a workshop on development of the Greater Sunrise area, involving the Australia and Timor-Leste Sunrise Commissioners and the Greater Sunrise Joint Venture partners, was held in Australia under the auspices of the Sunrise Commission.

Question No. 158 Program: SED/DFAT Topic: West Papuan prisoners Question in Writing Senator Di Natale

Question

- A. Is the Department aware that West Papuan prisoners August Sananay Kraar, Dominikus Sorabut, Edison Waromi, Ferdinand "Feri" Pakage, Filep Karma, Forkorus Yaboisembut, Luis Gedi, Jefrai Murip, Selpius Bobii, Buktar Tabuni are currently being held in Abepura prison in Indonesia?
- B. Have any Australian diplomatic staff visited these prisoners? Are any staff planning to visit them?
- C. Does the Department agree that the above list of prisoners are political prisoners (i.e. imprisoned for political offences such as free speech, free assembly, and displaying the Morning Star flag) rather than conventional criminals?

Answer

- A. The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade is aware of a number of Papuan prisoners currently held in Abepura prison, including Filep Karma, Forkorus Yaboisembut, Edison Gladius Waromi, Selvius Bobii, Dominikus Sorabut and August Sananay Kraar. We understand Buchtar Tabuni was released on parole from Abepura prison in January 2013.
- B. No Australian diplomatic staff have visited these prisoners, or intend to visit them.

The Australian government has no jurisdiction to investigate crimes in Indonesia, just as Indonesian authorities have no authority to do so in Australia, and Australia has no consular responsibilities for non-Australians in prison in Indonesia.

Occasionally, in the course of routine Embassy meetings on political and legal issues in the Papua provinces, Embassy staff meet with legal counsel who represent prisoners, including some of those listed above.

C. The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade is not in a position to confirm the specific offences for which each of the above-named have been imprisoned. Some political activities, such as displaying the Morning Star Flag and campaigning for Papuan independence, continue to attract criminal penalties under Indonesian law.

The Australian Government supports freedom of expression and the right to peaceful assembly, even when we disagree with the political objectives of those demonstrating. We make this point regularly to the Indonesian government, and continue to register the importance of safeguarding freedom of expression, including in the Papuan provinces. This includes representations at the UN Human Rights Council's Universal Periodic Review of Indonesia in May 2012, where Australia recommended Indonesia intensify its efforts to respect and uphold freedom of expression, including political expression, for all of its citizens; as well as representations regarding specific cases, including raising Australia's concerns at the March 2012 conviction for subversion of five of the above-named following the Third Papuan Congress of October 2011.

Question No. 159 Program: DFAT Topic: Hezbollah Question on Notice Page: 22 Senator Fawcett

Question

On a broader but related issue, your department's website has quite a comprehensive page talking about our obligations under United Nations Security Council resolutions in terms of counter-terrorism that goes both to the freezing of assets but also the prescription of organisations as terrorist organisations. Other countries such as the US, Canada, the Netherlands, Egypt and Bahrain have all banned Hezbollah as an entire organisation—a step that Australia has not taken. In fact, Mr Brennan, the US counter-terrorism chief, has told his EU counterparts that a failure to designate Hezbollah as a terrorist organisation makes it harder to defend our countries and protect our citizens. In light of this incident where there has been clearly interaction between Australia and its citizens and Hezbollah and terrorist activities and those statements from the US plus pressure from other stakeholders, is Australia reconsidering its 2003 decision to not list the whole of Hezbollah as a terrorist organisation?

Senator Bob Carr: I am interested in the arguments about it and I am interested in what implications this case has for Australia moving our policy from what you say is a 2003 position, and I will seek further advice.

Answer

Hezbollah is already listed by Australia pursuant to UN Security Council (UNSC) Resolution 1373, which requires Australia to prevent and suppress the financing of terrorist activities.

Under the *Charter of the United Nations Act 1945*, the Minister of Foreign Affairs must list a person or entity if satisfied on reasonable grounds that the person or entity is (a) a person who commits, or attempts to commit, terrorist acts or participates in or facilitates the commission of terrorist acts; (b) an entity owned or controlled directly or indirectly by such persons; (c) a person or entity acting on behalf of, or at the direction of such persons or entities.

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Thus an offence is committed under the Act if a person or entity uses or deals with an asset owned or controlled by Hezbollah or allows it to be used or dealt with.

Such listings are for a three year duration, and Hezbollah's listing expires on 25 November 2013 unless relisted.

My department is actively reviewing Hezbollah's listing status and will soon make recommendations on the actions I might take. These actions could include re-listing Hezbollah for an additional three years or designating additional persons or entities linked to Hezbollah, pursuant to UNSC Resolution 1373.

The other relevant listing process is the listing of terrorist organisations under the *Criminal Code Act 1995*, administered by the Attorney General's Department. This process is entirely separate to the UNSC 1373 process. There are currently seventeen groups on this list, including Hezbollah's External Security Organisation (ESO), which was relisted under the Criminal Code on 10 May 2012 for an additional three years.

For an organisation to be listed as a terrorist organisation under the Criminal Code, the Attorney General must be satisfied on reasonable grounds that the organisation is (a) directly or indirectly engaged in, preparing, planning or assisting in or fostering the doing of a terrorist act (whether or not an act has occurred); or (b) advocates the doing of a terrorist act (whether it has occurred or will occur).

A Criminal Code listing attracts a number of offences including membership, recruiting for, training or receiving training from, and providing support for a listed organisation whereas a 1373 listing does not.

Question

What is the level of travel advice for the Philippines?

Answer

The following advice is current and ongoing.

Australians are advised to exercise a high degree of caution (level 2 of 4) overall in the Philippines because of the high threat of terrorist attack and the high level of serious crime. Australians are advised to reconsider their need to travel (level 3 of 4) to **eastern Mindanao** due to very high levels of violent crime. Australians are strongly advised not to travel (level 4 of 4) to **central and western Mindanao**, **including the Sulu Archipelago and surrounding waters**, due to the very high threat of terrorist attack, kidnapping, violent crime and violent clashes between armed groups.
