Senator FAULKNER: I appreciate that. Thank you, Mr Varghese. Perhaps if Mr Exell could just give us the background as to when that IDC was established. I appreciate the information we have—that it is co-chaired with DFAT and the Department of Health. What other agencies are involved, and effectively how regularly does the IDC meet? What does this mean in terms of departmental resources for your own department?

Mr Exell: As the secretary has outlined, I co-chair the IDC with my counterpart in the Department of Health. I would have to take on notice the exact first meeting, but from memory it is at least three or four weeks ago that we started a formal process. Obviously, before then there was quite a lot of contact between a range of departments across government sharing information about the situation.

Senator WONG: Sorry, could you tell us the name of the co-chair?

Mr Exell: It is Kylie Jonasson, the first assistant secretary in the office of health protection. We meet at least weekly. In the last week we have met more than that. We had a meeting earlier this week. We have meetings as required. A couple of subgroups have also been established to follow through on particular issues that we may need to actually dive in to a bit more deeply or have broader conversations and discussions around. In terms of the membership, as I mentioned, it is the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, the Department of Health, PM&C, Defence, DMA, immigration, agriculture, Treasury and Finance. I would have to take on notice whether there are other members, but I think that is an indication of the broad membership.

Mr Exell: There have been, in the last four or five weeks, a range of contacts and, indeed, calls for finance, resources and other forms of assistance through to the department from a range of people both globally and domestically.

Senator WONG: Are you able to provide us with a list or perhaps just go through some of them? On notice, you can add to it if you need to for completeness? **Mr Exell:** To give you a full list, I will have to take it on notice. We have had conversations with Australian NGOs—for example, the Australian Red Cross and Plan. There has also been communication from UN organisations, such as the WHO. Some of those have come to us through the mission in Geneva and some of those have come through the Department of Health, as the secretary mentioned, with the relationship with it that Health has. Some of it has come to us as we have participated in telecons and other meetings around this issue.

Mr McDonald: If I could add to that. This year the humanitarian budget has been increased by about 30 per cent overall.

Senator IAN MACDONALD: Thirty per cent over what?

Mr McDonald: It was basically about \$264 million last year and this year it is \$338 million. So that is roughly a 30 per cent increase in our humanitarian expenditure overall for this financial year.

Senator IAN MACDONALD: Sorry, can I just interrupt you. Again, for comparison, what was it the previous year?

Mr McDonald: The previous year it was \$264 million and with a 30 per cent increase it is now \$338 million.

Senator IAN MACDONALD: But I mean the year before that.

Mr McDonald: I would have to take that on notice.

Senator IAN MACDONALD: Was it more or less, do you recall?

Mr McDonald: I would have to check. I am not 100 per cent. What also changed was what we called our emergency budget, which was previously \$90 million and has now been increased to \$120 million. When we are identifying how to expend funding on humanitarian, we have already spent \$60 million this year on humanitarian expenditure in addition to the Ebola money. They have been spent on things like the Palestinian crisis, for example. They have also been spent in Somalia, for example. In doing that, we have a balance. With the \$120 million for emergency funding over the year, we work on roughly a \$10 million a month allocation. The reason for that is, as you know, that within our region we need to have sufficient funding from now until April-May to be able to respond to immediate cyclones or earthquakes—and this is something we experienced very much last year with the Philippine cyclone and the like. So there is always this balance about how we try to manage that. In addition, in Africa we also have a bilateral program of over \$100 million in place. When you look at the whole of ODA for Africa, it is about \$186 million overall. So it is still a substantial program of activity that is occurring in addition to the humanitarian expenditure we have in countries in Africa as well.

Senator DI NATALE: I would also like to put this crisis in perspective. How many recent natural disasters, or indeed infectious disease outbreaks, has the UN indicated may result in 1.4 million people dying?

Mr Varghese: I am not in a position to answer that. I do not know if anyone else is, but I suspect it may be a rhetorical question?

Senator DI NATALE: No, it is not rhetorical at all. We have just had a discussion about where this outbreak sits next to a whole range of other natural disasters and our international aid effort. I think it is important to reflect on the impact of this outbreak. What I am asking you is, have there been any other natural disasters, or indeed outbreaks, where the UN has projected that, should it not be contained, we are looking at 1.4 million deaths?

Mr Varghese: I am not aware of any, but I am happy to take that on notice.

Answer

No. While the United Nations often makes predictions about the number of people affected by a disaster, it rarely makes predictions about the number of deaths.

In September 2014, the U.S Centre for Disease Control and Prevention reported that "...without additional interventions or changes in community behavior (e.g., notable reductions in unsafe burial practices), the [CDC] estimates that Liberia and Sierra Leone will have approximately 550,000 Ebola cases (1.4 million when corrected for underreporting)" by 20 January 2015. This report was based on modelling undertaken in August 2014. The report predicted possible Ebola cases, not deaths.

More broadly, the UN reports on the number of deaths caused by preventable infectious diseases, including: an estimated 1.5 million deaths from tuberculosis in 2013 (from an estimated 9 million cases); an estimated 1.5 million deaths from HIV/AIDS (from an estimated 35 million cases in 2013); and an estimated 584,000 malaria deaths (from an estimated 198 million cases in 2013).

Mr Varghese: Colleagues may wish to add to this. We have a process which occurs within the portfolio and we have a process that occurs across government. Within the portfolio, we examine what are the options that the foreign minister may wish to consider in relation to what Australia can do in response to the Ebola crisis. Those go to options in relation to financial contributions and options in other areas, whether it is providing logistics support, or healthcare support, or wherever the spectrum takes you.

Senator WONG: Are you are able to—not now because you will have to consider it—give me the date on which the foreign minister was first briefed in those terms? **Mr Varghese:** It is a dynamic process.

Senator WONG: No, a formal brief; a written brief. When was the first written brief to the foreign minister in those terms?

Mr Varghese: We can try and get you an answer quickly on that. Then you have the whole-of-government process. As Mr Exell has explained, an important part of that is the interdepartmental committee that is co-chaired by us and the Department of Health. That obviously looks at a broader range of issues, including issues that go beyond our portfolio in relation to how we would deal with an outbreak of Ebola domestically, what we might do in the event of a problem in the region and so on. Some of that IDC process would be reflected in information that is put to the National Security Committee of Cabinet. Some of it obviously would also find its way to ministers through briefings prepared by their own departments. That is broadly the way the system works.

I appreciate that you have taken it on notice, but I do find it extraordinary that no-one can actually tell me when the government first asked you to go and do that.

In your introduction or in an earlier question, Mr Varghese, when you were asked about additional assistance by another senator, you made the point that any additional assistance—this is what I thought you said; I want to go back to it—would be provided from within the existing DFAT resources. Senator MILNE: I can appreciate that, but I have asked the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet who provided the briefing to the Prime Minister in relation to the details of MH370 and they said that they did not. Somebody obviously did and I am trying to establish whether DFAT provided the briefing to the Prime Minister on the details of MH370 on the basis of which he then briefed President Xi Jinping. **Mr. Varabese:** Lam happy to take on notice whether or not DFAT provided a separate

Mr Varghese: I am happy to take on notice whether or not DFAT provided a separate briefing to the Prime Minister for that meeting on MH370.

Senator MILNE: Thank you—please establish for me whether it was DFAT who briefed the Prime Minister on the details. Would you be able to indicate whether that briefing was prepared in consultation with the chair or members of the joint coordinating group here in Australia, which was headed up by Angus Houston? I would like to know if he was consulted in the briefing. Also, I would like to know what critical detailed analysis of the information was conducted before the Prime Minister told the President of China, 'We've narrowed the search area and we're very confident the signals are from the black box.' Can anyone shed any light on how the Prime Minister came to make that statement in China?

Senator Brandis: Perhaps I can be of assistance. First of all, most of what you have asked is, as Mr Varghese has pointed out, best asked of the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet to the extent to which it is a proper question. Secondly, much of the information that you have identified in your question would appear to me to go to the content of advice to ministers, in this case the Prime Minister, and, as you ought to know, is not allowable. We will take the question on notice and we will respond to that much of it as is (a) relevant and (b) permissible.

Senator MILNE: Surely, Minister, in China, a country where about 154 of the people who died in MH370 were citizens, the Prime Minister ought to have had a substantial reason for telling the Chinese President, 'We're confident the signals are from the black box.' I am trying to establish who provided the Prime Minister with that briefing and whether the joint task force had been consulted before he made that statement. **Senator Brandis:** Your state of mind and the reasons you are asking the questions you are asking or making the statements you are making are really of no interest to me. I have told you we will take the question on notice and we will respond to that part of it that is (a) relevant to this committee and (b) permissible.

Senator MILNE: In relation to the issue of the ISIL terrorism that is going on in the Middle East, has the government met with officials from Kuwait or Qatar in relation to implementing strong anti-money-laundering or counterterrorism financing regimes? Have we actually met with officials from either of those countries in relation to that matter?

Mr Varghese: I do not know whether our ambassador for counterterrorism is in the room. If he is not, I will take the question on notice. We regularly discuss counterterrorism issues with governments across the world, including in the Middle East. As to whether we have had detailed discussions in relation specifically to the question you raise, I will see whether Mr Armitage is in a position to respond to that. **Mr Armitage:** As the secretary said, we have had discussions with the countries in the region. In terms of the precise details in relation to Kuwait and Qatar, I would need to take that on notice. But our general representations to the countries in the region have obviously covered the question of support to ISIL in all its various forms. In implementing the UN resolutions, particularly 2170 and 2178, which impose obligations on member states to disrupt and prevent sources of funding to ISIL, we have obviously raised that with the countries in the region.

Senator MILNE: I can assume from your answer we have raised it with both Kuwait and Qatar?

Mr Armitage: I will need to check on both those countries.

Answer

Yes. The former Ambassador for Counter-Terrorism, Mr Bill Fisher, and the Ambassador to the United Arab Emirates (with accreditation to Qatar), Mr Pablo Kang, visited Qatar from 24-25 March 2014. They met senior Qatari officials including the Chairman of the Qatar Central Bank and the Chairman of the National Anti-Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing Committee and discussed combatting money laundering and terrorist financing. Ambassador Kang has made representations to the Qatari Assistant Minister for Foreign Affairs, HE Mohammed bin Abdullah bin Muttib Al Rumaihi, regarding the importance of global efforts to counter terrorist financing, including most recently on 22 September 2014.

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Also in his role as Ambassador for Counter-Terrorism, Mr Bill Fisher visited Kuwait from 15-17 April 2013. He and the Ambassador to Kuwait, Mr Bob Tyson, met senior Kuwaiti officials, including the Vice President of the National Security Bureau and the Chief of Staff of the Kuwait Armed Forces, and discussed efforts to stem the flow of money to terrorist groups, particularly to Syria.

Ambassador Bob Tyson has since discussed the issue of terrorist funding with a number of Kuwaiti officials, most recently the Acting Undersecretary of the Foreign Ministry on 23 September 2014 and the Director of the National Security Bureau on 4 November 2014.

Senator MILNE: Okay. Given that the United States has now sanctioned a number of Qatari and Kuwaiti nationals and NGOs in recent months for their role in providing cash and arms to terror groups associated with ISIL, has the Australian government done the same? Have we actually sanctioned any Qatari or Kuwaiti nationals or NGOs in relation to that? Are there any sanctions currently in place?

Mr Varghese: I think we would have to take that on notice. Obviously, if any of those are listed under the sanctions committee of the Security Council, we would, as we are obliged to, impose sanctions. Whether we have done so and if we have gone further than that I would have to take on notice.

Senator MILNE: Yes, if you would not mind. Also, can you tell me if it is under active consideration, or are you saying that it is a matter of course? It is just a matter of identifying them?

Mr Varghese: If it is a decision of the sanctions committee, we would do it as a matter of course. We would execute that position, as we are obliged to. We do have a capacity to impose additional sanctions, and that would depend on the evidentiary basis for it.

Senator MILNE: I guess what I am asking is: is there any active consideration of that? Is there any investigation into that?

Mr Varghese: I will have to take that on notice.

Answer

Australia fully implements the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) resolution 1267/1989 Al-Qaida sanctions regime. Designations of persons and entities by the UNSC or the UNSC Al-Qaida Sanctions Committee have automatic and immediate effect in Australia. As at 23 October 2014, the following Kuwaiti and Qatari citizens had been designated by the UNSC or the UNSC Al-Qaida Sanctions Committee expressly for their association with ISIL:

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- . Hamid Hamad Hamid Al-'Ali (Kuwaiti citizen, listed 15 August 2014)
 A Kuwait-based financier, recruiter and facilitator for Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant and Jabhat al-Nusrah.
- . 'Abd al-Rahman Khalaf 'Ubayd Juday' al-'Anizi (Kuwaiti citizen, listed 23 September 2014)

 Provides support to Al-Qaida and Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant, in Syria and Iraq.

The one entity that was recorded as having a presence in Kuwait at the time of its listing for UNSC Al-Qaida sanctions, the Wafa Humanitarian Organization (listed 6 October 2001), was designated on the basis of its association with Al-Qaida rather than an association with ISIL. No entity designated for UNSC Al-Qaida sanctions is recorded as having a presence in Qatar.

Given the fluid nature of the allegiances of persons and entities associated with Al-Qaida, it is possible that other designated persons or entities may have developed an association with ISIL since their listing, which will not be reflected in the original reasons for their listing.

The Australian Government does not comment on whether or not designations of additional persons or entities are under consideration, given the risk of asset flight as a result of tipping them off.

Has Australia done anything in that regard—maybe notifying Australian businesses or importers of the need to take particular care to follow the source of these products and where they are coming from?

Mr Varghese: Again, we will have to take that on notice.

Answer

Purchasing oil, directly or indirectly, from ISIL or any other person or entity designated for the UN Security Council 1267/1989 sanctions regime contravenes Australian sanction laws and is serious criminal offence.

DFAT uses a range of mechanisms to ensure Australian businesses and members of the public are aware of Australian sanction laws, including Australia's implementation of targeted financial sanctions against ISIL under the Al-Qaida sanctions regime. These mechanisms include:

- . publishing details of Australian sanction laws are on the DFAT website
- . regularly notifying Australian businesses and members of the public of updates to Australian sanction laws through a subscription e-mail service
- conducting regular outreach in major Australian cities on Australian sanction laws, including delivering general seminars for businesses, and tailored seminars for universities and financial institutions
- . maintaining the Online Sanctions Administration Service web portal, through which Australian businesses and other members of the public may contact DFAT for guidance about specific proposed transactions or activities.

In the period 26 May 2014 until 20 November 2014, 35 passports have been refused or were cancelled by the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade pursuant to a competent authority request under Section 14 (reasons relating to potential harmful conduct that might prejudice the security of Australia or a foreign country) of the *Australian Passports Act 2005*.

- . Emilie Konig.

Australia fully implements the UN Security Council resolution 1267/1989 Al-Qaida sanctions regime. Designations of persons and entities by the UNSC or the UNSC Al-Qaida Sanctions Committee have automatic and immediate effect in Australia. As a result, the persons and entities referred to above are subject to targeted financial sanctions (including an asset freeze) and an arms embargo under Australian law. The designated persons are also subject to a travel ban.

Senator McGRATH: I suspect I know the answer to this one, but how many terrorist listings has the government renewed in accordance with the United Nations Security Council resolutions on combating terrorism?

Ms Cooper: In total? Are you talking about the whole range of sanctions, or just in relation to ISIL?

Senator McGRATH: The whole range.

Ms Cooper: It is a large number. I have a summary table here. Again, it might be better if I answer that on notice. I am not trying to avoid the question, but it is quite a complex summary of different sanctions—which ones are autonomous, which are UN sanctions and how we have implemented them. So I would like to give you an accurate breakdown.

Answer

There are two United Nations Security Council sanctions regimes related specifically to terrorism: the UNSC resolution 1373 counter-terrorism sanctions regime and the UNSC resolution 1267/1989 Al-Qaida sanctions regime.

Part 4 of *Charter of the United Nations Act 1945* was amended in November 2010 to provide that listings under Australia's UNSC resolution 1373 counter-terrorism sanctions regime would expire after three years unless the Minister for Foreign Affairs declared them to continue to have effect. This requirement was introduced in response to recommendations by the Parliamentary Joint Committee on Intelligence and Security's Report, Review of Security and Counter-Terrorism Legislation, tabled in Parliament in December 2006.

As at 23 October 2014, there had been one review of listings under Part 4 of the Charter of the United Nations Act. In November 2013, the Minister for Foreign

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Affairs declared 83 listings would continue to have effect until November 2016, and four listings were allowed to expire.

Designations of persons or entities for the UNSC Al-Qaida sanctions regime are done by the UNSC or the UNSC Al-Qaida Sanctions Committee. It is an international obligation for all UN Member States, including Australia, to implement targeted financial sanctions and an arms embargo against designated persons and entities, and travel bans against designated persons, until they are de-listed by the UNSC or the UNSC Al-Qaida Sanctions Committee. Review of such designations is the responsibility of the UNSC or the UNSC Al-Qaida Sanctions Committee.

Answer

Yes.

The Australian Federal Police (AFP) cooperates with the Maldives Police Service (MPS) under a bilateral Memorandum of Understanding on combating transnational crime and developing police cooperation. Both services recognise the increasing threat of complex transnational crime, including terrorism, terrorist financing and money laundering, requires international cooperation. In September 2014, the AFP held a criminal assets confiscation and financial investigations symposium at the Maldives Institute for Security and Law enforcement Studies, for members of the MPS, other government agencies and a bank.

Australia supports effective governance in the Maldives through support to the UNDP-led Integrated Governance Program. The programme aims to strengthen the transparency and accountability of public institutions, promote equitable access to justice and respect for human rights, and strengthen the voice of civil society organisations. Australia has provided a total of \$850,000 to date, including \$300,000 in 12/13; and \$550,000 in 13/14.

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In 2013 DFAT provided \$11,764 for a police training course for the MPS on terrorism, counter-terrorism, national security, government and business-related security issues. It was delivered by Macquarie University's Centre for Policing, Intelligence and Counter-Terrorism (PICT) at the Maldives Institute for Security and Law Enforcement Studies (ISLES) between 23 June and 4 July 2013.

Senator WRIGHT: Do you have available for me today the number of Australian passports issued for children born through surrogacy in India in the last 12 months? **Mr Varghese:** I do not. Maybe we could take that on notice, as well.

Answer

The passport issuance system does not have the functionality to track the number of passports issued to children born through surrogacy. As a result, the department is unable to provide statistics on the number of passports issued for children born through surrogacy in South-East, South and Central Asia.

Similarly, the department does not have statistics on the number of Australian passports issued for children born through surrogacy in India in the last 12 months. However, the Department of Immigration and Border Protection in New Delhi has confirmed that Australian citizenship was granted to 112 children born through surrogacy arrangements in the 2013-14 financial year. A further 30

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children have been granted citizenship from 1 July 2014. All of these children would have been eligible for an Australian passport once they obtained citizenship.

Of the eleven alleged cases investigated, one individual faced charges under the criminal code but was not convicted and two were investigated under the APS code of conduct. Two cases were reported to the AFP but no criminal charges pursued.

Three officers remain in the department. In all three cases, investigated allegations of sexual abuse were found to be unsubstantiated.

Senator Brandis: I am not, by the way, acknowledging that the answer will not be that we do not disclose this material. But, in view of the point you take, I think the reasonable course of action is to proceed as I have indicated.

Senator WONG: Right. Thank you, Senator Brandis, I appreciate that. A few points that might be of use: we have had a look back through evidence of various estimates and, very interestingly, this may not have been a bilateral, but Senator Faulkner even got details of who attended a meeting, which included Mrs Howard. The Prime Minister's personal secretary, Mr Varghese, when he was head of ONA, provided details of DFAT officers attending meetings. At the Indian Rim Association Council of Ministers Meeting on 9 October 2014, the Hon Julie Bishop MP, Minister for Foreign Affairs, announced a new initiative under the Government Partnerships for Development scheme. Under the initiative 'Improving the capability of three national search and rescue services in the Indian Ocean region', the Australian Maritime Safety Authority (AMSA) will be funded to assist Mauritius, Maldives and Sri Lanka strengthen their national Search and Rescue (SAR) services to enable more effective response to maritime and aviation distress situations in their SAR regions.

Subject to a thorough 'gap analysis' of partner countries' SAR capabilities, AMSA's work may include: development of an electronic broadcasting systems to more effectively respond to SAR incidents; the development of standard operating procedures so that national SAR agencies can more closely align with internationally recognized protocols; in-country training of SAR personnel to ensure they can use upgraded systems; and joint SAR exercises and workshops between Australian and partner SAR authorities to test and practice communication systems and protocols that occur during a live SAR incident.

Answer

The Australian Embassies in Tel Aviv and Amman, and the Australian Representative Office in Ramallah, facilitated the departure of 28 Australian citizens and permanent residents from Gaza to Jordan (through the Erez crossing) in July and August 2014. The departures were coordinated by the United Nations' Access Coordination Unit and took place on 13 July, 20 July and 7 August.

The Australian Government assisted with the departure and entry requirements of Israel and Jordan respectively, accompanied the UN convoy to the Jordanian border, provided ground transport from the Jordanian border to Amman and helped evacuees to make onward travel arrangements once in Jordan.

In addition to those departing through the Erez crossing, we are also aware of a further six Australians who departed Gaza through the Rafah crossing into Egypt. These departures were not facilitated by the Australian Government.

These were a private meeting between the two Prime Ministers and a formal bilateral meeting. During the private meeting, the Australian High Commissioner to India was present. During the formal bilateral meeting, the Minister for Trade and Investment attended, plus the Australian High Commissioner to India; the Deputy High Commissioner, New Delhi; First Secretary (Economic), New Delhi; and other members of the Prime Minister's delegation.

During his visit to Japan on 5-8 April 2014, Prime Minister Abbott had two bilateral meetings with Prime Minister Abe. These were an informal dinner between the two Prime Ministers and a formal bilateral meeting. During the informal dinner the Australian Ambassador to Japan was present. During the formal bilateral meeting, DFAT officers present were the Australian Ambassador to Japan and the Head of the Embassy's Political and Strategic Section.

During his visit to Ottawa on 8-9 June 2014, Prime Minister Abbott had four bilateral meetings with Prime Minister Harper. These were an informal breakfast meeting, a bilateral meeting, a working lunch and an official dinner. During the working lunch DFAT officers present were the High Commissioner, First Assistant

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Secretary (Americas Division) and the DFAT officer on exchange with the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development. The High Commissioner and the First Assistant Secretary (Americas Division) attended the official dinner.

The Australian High Commissioner to Sri Lanka has raised specific cases of arrests made under the Prevention of Terrorism Act (PTA), including representations in March 2014 calling for the release of prominent Sri Lankan human rights defenders Father Praveen and Ruki Fernando, who had been detained under the PTA.

We continue to urge the Sri Lankan Government to progress as a priority full implementation of its national reconciliation agenda, particularly the National Plan of Action (NPoA) to implement recommendations of the Lessons Learnt and Reconciliation Commission process. The NPoA includes a recommendation for the Sri Lankan Government to appoint an Independent Advisory Committee charged with monitoring and examining detention and arrest of persons taken into custody under any regulations made under Sri Lanka's Public Security Ordinance or the PTA.

The Australian High Commissioner to Sri Lanka has raised issues related to women's vulnerability, including to sexual and gender-based violence, with senior government figures. The Australian High Commission takes regular opportunities to advocate publicly and privately for the empowerment of women through local media and public diplomacy events. We also continue to urge the Sri Lankan Government to demilitarise the north and east of Sri Lanka.

In 2013, Australia's aid program in Sri Lanka helped to increase the incomes of over 2900 poor women through a range of activities, particularly in the conflict-affected north and east, including through small-scale investments in the sectors of fishing and aquaculture, and rice, fruit and vegetable cultivation.

But these are not, to my knowledge, specifically returnees from Australia. These are Tamils returning to the north and east of Sri Lanka, having been away from the country. So I am not aware that that necessarily goes to the cohort that may have been returned from Australia. **Senator RHIANNON:** Is it an arrangement that DFAT previously had, or may still have, with UNHCR or are you talking about something that is quite separate? **Mr Hutchesson:** I am not aware of a current or previous formal arrangement, but I am happy to take that on notice.

Senator RHIANNON: Could you also take on notice the process that returnees to Sri Lanka who feel they are at risk should go through in order to seek protection or to notify Australian authorities of their situation once they have been returned? Could you explain that process, please? Will you take that on notice?

Mr Hutchesson: I will take that on notice.

Answer

UNHCR facilitates the voluntary return of Sri Lankan refugees and assists them during the reintegration process, including through post-return monitoring. UNHCR also conducts refugee status determination of asylum seekers. UNHCR's work in Sri Lanka is conducted independently of the Australian Government. There is no formal arrangement between the Australian Government and UNHCR relating to monitoring of asylum seekers the Australian Government has returned to Sri Lanka.

Australia does not return people to Sri Lanka who engage Australia's international non-refoulement obligations. We are aware of a small number of allegations of mistreatment raised by asylum seekers the Australian Government has returned to Sri Lanka. Such allegations are taken seriously and followed up where

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appropriate. To date, none of these claims have been substantiated. Verifying these allegations is complicated by the fact that most have been made anonymously, or by third parties. Australian Government agencies have no authority to conduct investigations in Sri Lanka.

Asylum seekers who volunteer to depart may be provided with reintegration assistance by the International Organization for Migration to assist with their sustainable return. The Australian Government has no role in the reintegration of returnees.

The program is scheduled to end in December 2015.

The Australian Government supports the Project of Technical Assistance to the Ministry of Lands Housing and Survey in the Solomon Islands. Australia's contribution is AUD907,895 over three financial years (2013-14 to 2015-16). The Project is supporting the survey of crown land in selected informal settlements in Honiara so that lots may be tendered as fixed-term estates (long-term leases). The Project is managed by the Secretariat of the Pacific Community and activities are undertaken in partnership with the Solomon Islands Ministry of Lands Housing and Survey.

ACTING CHAIR: The market value of Jakarta—what is it compared against? Is it compared against the investment in the building, and that drives the contribution? **Mr Nixon:** No, we are not basing the rent that the attached agencies pay on the basis of an economic return that is required to be generated. There is an independent evaluation that is done by Savills, an international property firm of valuers. They undertake a market assessment and they issue a rent certificate. So there is the transparency for each attached agency to recognise that they are paying a market value rent.

ACTING CHAIR: Thank you for that. I would like to know, perhaps on notice, the Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade component of rent, for want of a better word, for the new Jakarta facility so that we know how much has been paid.

Yes.

2. Has the Australian Government provided, or does it intend to provide, any other assistance for the conduct of elections in the Maldives? If so, what assistance?

Yes. Australia provided \$3.34 million in core funding to the Commonwealth Secretariat (2013-14); the Secretariat in turn directly funds Commonwealth election observer missions. Australia has also provided \$850,000 (2012-14) to the UNDP-led Integrated Governance Program, which supports a number of democratic, human rights and justice sector institutions and strengthens related civil society organisations. Through this program, UNDP has worked with the Maldives Elections Commission to provide training for 3,000 staff and polling officials, support voter education and strengthen coordination among relevant institutions on election related issues.

- 3. In supplementary estimates hearings on 23 October 2014, Mr Bryce Hutchesson (Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Acting First Assistant Secretary, South and West Asia Division) stated that the Australian High Commissioner in Colombo had recently been instructed to make a round of representations to the Maldivian Government about the current issues relating to the Human Rights Commission of the Maldives.
 - a. Have these representations now taken place? If so, when did they take place?

Yes. Australia's High Commissioner accredited to the Maldives, resident in Colombo, made representations to the Maldivian Ambassador at Large for Foreign Affairs, Ahmed Mohamed, on 23 October 2014 to express concern at action initiated by the Maldives Supreme Court against the Maldives Human Rights Commission. Australia's Ambassador and Permanent Resident to the UN in Geneva reiterated our concerns on 14 November 2014 to the Maldives Acting High Commissioner to the UK and Ambassador-designate to the EU.

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b. What was the content of these representations?

Australia expressed concern about developments in the Maldives which have constrained public discussion and freedom of expression, including reports of recent intimidation and attack on journalists. Australia expressed particular concern about the implications of action initiated by the Maldives Supreme Court's against the Maldives Human Rights Commission following the latter's report to the UN High Rights Council.

c. What response to these representations, if any, was received from the Maldivian Government?

Maldivian officials noted our concerns.

d. What further actions, if any, does the Australian Government intend to take on the issues of human rights and democracy in the Maldives?

The Australian Government continues to monitor developments in the Maldives and will take opportunities as necessary to raise human rights and democratisation concerns with the Maldives Government. Our aid program continues to provide support towards strengthening democracy and democratic institutions.

The only conditions relate to the Australia Awards scholarships. All applicants who accept an Australia Awards scholarship are required to sign a contract with the Commonwealth of Australia declaring that they will comply with the conditions of the scholarship.

c. What assurances, if any, are provided by the Maldivian Government that the aid is spent in accordance with any conditions?

Australia's aid program in the Maldives is not delivered through Maldives Government systems. The Maldives Government is not responsible for the delivery of Australia's aid.

Answer

A. In 2013-14, Australia expended around \$7 million on health activities implemented by organisations with mandates that allow, within the laws of the countries concerned, the provision of safe abortion and post-abortion services as part of their comprehensive response to reproductive healthcare needs. These include the following activities:

- \$2.48 million to Marie Stopes International for supporting the Cambodian Government to increase access to family planning and provide training and quality assurance of government health providers in comprehensive safe abortion care.
- \$505,534 to Marie Stopes International for supporting sexual and reproductive health social franchise networks in Vietnam to improve access to quality services, including family planning and safe abortion.
- \$2 million to the International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) in South Asia and \$2 million in core funding to IPPF. In 2013, of the 136.6 million sexual and reproductive health care services provided by IPPF, 2 percent were abortion related, including services such as post-abortion

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family planning.

- B. Expenditure on health activities which provides safe abortion and post-abortion services as part of their comprehensive response to reproductive healthcare needs for 2014-15 will become available in late 2015 when the actual 2014-15 expenditures are finalised.
- C. Estimates for future years are dependent on annual budget processes and country prioritization and planning processes.

In an answer to written question on notice number 45 asked by Senator Boswell at the February 2013 Additional Budget Estimates, the reply stated that it is not possible to identify where and on what International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) and IPPF South Asia spent AusAID funding because it is pooled alongside other donor funds.

However, in answer to Senator Boswell's written question on notice number 17.D for the Supplementary Budget Estimates in November 2013 the reply stated that "IPPF is contractually obliged to comply with the Guiding Principles" which prohibit abortions after 20 weeks gestation as well as coerced abortions and abortions for sex selection.

IPPF's Annual Performance Report 2013-2014 states that in 2013 it provided 533,085 surgical and 341,783 medical abortions.¹ Included in these figures are abortion related services provided by the China Family Planning Association (14,000 in 2011)² and abortion related services provided by the Vietnam Family Planning Association (45,000 in 2011)³. In both these countries post 20 week abortions are permitted by law; abortions for sex selection are endemic, notwithstanding formal legal bans, and coerced abortions are frequent due to the national population control programmes.

Answer

1. The Australian Government has supported a range of advisers, volunteers and experts to assist the Autonomous Bougainville Government (ABG) since 2010, through both PNG national sector programs and through programs specific to Bougainville. Details of advisory positions funded by AusAID in 2013 were provided in response to Question on Notice No. 306 of Supplementary Budget Estimates in November 2013. A list of current advisory positions funded by DFAT is provided in response to Question 83 below.

The precise number, role and duration of individuals assisting the ABG fluctuates over time. The annual costs vary depending on the period advisors are engaged for and the reimbursable travel costs incurred in a particular year. The Department does not maintain a separate central record of advisers engaged since 2010 from all the programs in Bougainville with costs totalled over the four year period requested. To collate such this information would entail a significant additional investment of resources. The Department does not consider this diversion of resources from priority areas to be justified.

4. Australia co-funds with New Zealand the Governance Implementation Fund (GIF). The GIF expended \$436,264.65 up to 31 October 2014 to implement the Mining Community Negotiations and Consultations Project. Forums/events conducted under the project have included:

- workshops to identify and address negotiating issues for landowners and develop an integrated negotiation position between ABG and landowners;
- workshops working with landowners to develop their negotiating skills and their capacity to effectively manage the business of their associations;
- workshops providing specific opportunities for women representatives to identify and address negotiation issues and build their capacity to influence decision making;
- organising the Bougainville-wide Women's Forum for women to receive information regarding, and have input into, preparations for the Panguna negotiations;
- establishing the Bougainville Negotiation Forum, the broadly-based stakeholder group designed to ensure that negotiations are directed by a body that has broad representation from all key Bougainville interests, including the ABG, Panguna affected landowners, ex-combatants, women's groups, churches, councils of elders, business and youth; and
- village level community engagement in the Panguna area to ensure those most affected by earlier mining operations are fully engaged in preparations for negotiations.

The GIF also funded a Mining Negotiations Adviser, Professor Ciaran O'Faircheallaigh, to support the ABG to consult and negotiate with relevant communities and stakeholders on the reopening of the Panguna Mine. Funding provided since 2010 totalled \$796,302.40, including \$19,053.97 provided by DFAT in 2011.

Australia also provided \$49,425.45 for ten senior ABG representatives, including President Momis, to attend the ABG Mining Conference in Canberra in February 2013.

Australia has also provided funding to the ABG to support the consultation process the ABG has conducted on the mining sector in Bougainville, including to engage advisers to assist, among other things, the ABG plan and conduct the public consultations.

Australia funded an ABG Strategic and Legal Advisor, Mr Anthony Regan, to advise the Bougainville Executive Council, and Chief Administrator and the Autonomous

Bougainville Government on a broad range of legal, constitutional and policy issues. This has included advice on mining policy and negotiations on re-opening the Panguna copper mine and assistance with the development of the proposed Bougainville Mining Act and interim mining legislation. - 5. Through the Australia-PNG Forestry Cooperation, senior officials from the Department of Agriculture and the PNG Forestry Authority (PNGFA) meet annually to discuss forestry issues. The fourth meeting was held on 29-30 May in Madang PNG and was attended by two officials from the Department of Agriculture and six PNGFA officers. The meeting discussed Australia's illegal logging laws and PNGFA provided draft country specific guidelines to support the regulations. The Department of Agriculture is considering the draft guidelines. The guidelines will be used to assist Australian timber companies to import from PNG businesses that meet the due diligence requirements.
- 6. Australia's Illegal Logging Prohibition Act 2012 makes it an offence to import a timber product or to process an Australian grown raw log that has been illegally logged. In the context of activities in Papua New Guinea, the Act is applicable if illegally logged timber is imported to Australia.

The Australian Government is supporting improved forest management and conservation through the existing partnership between the Department of Agriculture and the PNG Forestry Authority. PNG receives support through the Asia Pacific Forestry Skills and Capacity Building Program, which provides PNG's

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Forestry Authority with skills based training, technology transfer and information exchange and transfer.

More broadly, Australia plays an active role in supporting good governance, improving law and justice and combating corruption in PNG.

The Australian Government takes all allegations of foreign bribery seriously. Officials are under an obligation to report all allegations of extra-territorial offences committed by Australian citizens, permanent residents or companies, including information they receive about bribes paid to foreign public officials. These allegations are then referred to the Australian Federal Police for investigation.

Australia has a robust anti-corruption regime that prohibits the bribery of foreign public officials. The prohibition applies extra-territorially to Australian individuals and businesses operating overseas. The foreign bribery offence attracts significant penalties for both individuals and corporations.

Australia is a party to the key international conventions concerned with combating foreign bribery and is a member of the OECD Working Group on Bribery.

DFAT seeks to ensure that Australian businesses are aware of their obligations under Australian anti-bribery laws. In conjunction with the Attorney-General's Department, DFAT conducts outreach activities to the private sector about these laws and the Australian Government's zero tolerance approach to foreign bribery.

- 1. In June 2014, Australia pledged \$140 million over four years (2015-18) in core funding to the Global Partnership for Education (GPE). Australia provided \$270 million to GPE for the previous replenishment period (2011-14).
- 2. The decision to contribute to GPE was a decision about international development and the Australian aid budget. As such, consultation beyond the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade was not required.
- 3. Yes, the Minister for Foreign Affairs made the decision to contribute.

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- 4. This question should be directed to the Minister for Foreign Affairs and her office.
- 5. Education remains a priority area for Australia's aid program. The Government has not set an overall target for expenditure in the education sector.
- 6. No. There is no overall allocation for education in the aid budget. Education initiatives are funded through a range of bilateral, regional, cross-regional and global budget programs. The Australia Awards program within DFAT was increased by \$31.7 million in 2014-15. This will ensure DFAT can offer over 4,500 scholarship and fellowships awards in 2014-15.

1. The Japan-Australia Economic Partnership Agreement (JAEPA) entered into force on 15 January 2015.

2. Yes

- 2(a) The Government negotiated staging periods of up to two years for some imported Japanese motor vehicles, to assist local industry adjustment, for example the 5.0 per cent tariff is reduced to 1.7 per cent in 2015 (following two cuts), before a cut to 0.0% on 1 April 2016.
- 2(b) This is a question for manufacturers but for example tariff reductions in JAEPA will benefit Toyota Australia, as it imports some models and components from Japan.
- 2(c) Very positive. This is because tariff cuts and quota size increases are scheduled on entry into force, and on 1 April each year. With entry into force occurring before April 2015, Australia will secure two tariff cuts and, where applicable, quota size increases in quick succession. This effectively front loads benefit, enabling better market access for our agriculture sector.
- 3(a) Within JAEPA there is a scheduled renegotiation of market access after five years and also strong review/renegotiation mechanisms that protect Australia and offer pathways for further liberalisation.
- 3(b) Australia is negotiating for improved market access on all products in the TPP and other plurilateral negotiations.

- 1. (a) Since 1 June, 16 meetings have been held.
 - (b) These meetings have been held in Beijing, Sydney and Canberra. Meetings were attended by relevant officials.
 - (c) The approximate cost was \$510,000.
 - (d) Further meetings between relevant officials are planned to finalise the legal scrub with locations and dates to be finalised. Meetings costs will be kept to an effricient minimum.

- Instruments of ratification are exchanged between the parties. This exchange takes place once the other party has completed its own domestic treaty processes, and enables the treaty to enter into force.
- 6. Yes.
- 6 (a) Under ChAFTA, tariffs on all Australian dairy exports to China will be progressively phased out.

Crucially, New Zealand's FTA with China contains restrictive safeguard measures on a wide range of dairy products (where China raises the tariff back to the normal rate when New Zealand exports exceed a certain volume). In contrast, under ChAFTA, Australia will face a discretionary safeguard only on whole milk powders, with the safeguard trigger volume set well above current trade levels and indexed to grow annually. For all other dairy products Australia will receive unlimited preferential access.

7. This would depend on the nature of the modelling.

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- 8. This is a decision for government. The Agreement will, however, benefit Australia through the creation of significant new market access and it secures Australia's competitive position in China, our largest export market.
- 8 (a) This is a decision for government but the Department will monitor relevant bilateral trade and investment data once the agreement has entered into force.
- 9. DFAT relies on a range of information sources, including reporting by diplomatic and consular posts, analyses prepared by other government agencies, international organisations and academic institutions, as well as foreign and domestic media reporting.
- 10 (a/b) Briefings are provided as required in various formats.
- 11. The Department monitors a range of media coverage on issues of portfolio relevance. Posts monitor media coverage abroad. Portfolio Ministers and their offices recieve regular summaries of relevant media coverage electronically. In respect of subscriptions, see response to QoN 136 part 2c.
- 12. (a) DFAT did not report on speculation about the resumption of coal tariffs.
- (b) Neither the Minister nor the Department had prior notice of the Chinese Government's decision.
- 13. (a) China provided information on the coal tariffs when publicly announcing the re-introduction of tariffs on 9 October 2014.
- (b) While coal tariffs generally had been part of the FTA negotiations from the outset, there were no specific discussions with China about its plans to reintroduce tariffs.
- 14. While the tariffs will have some impact, they are relatively small and will be phased out once the FTA enters into force.
- 15. Prior to its decision to resume coal tariffs, China had already offered as part of the FTA negotiations to eliminate tariffs on coal and other mineral products.
 - (a) The outcome on coal was just one element in a comprehensive package of market access outcomes which resulted from FTA negotiations.
- 16. Yes. The tariffs are an additional cost, but will be phased out relatively quickly one the agreement enters into force.
- 17. All foreign State Owned Entities require prior approval by the Foreign Investment Review Board before making a direct investment in Australia, starting a new business, or acquiring an interest in land, regardless of the value of the investment.

- 20. The China-Australia Free Trade Agreement does not contain provisions on environmental standards.
- 21. The Government has a policy of Direct Action to meet Co2 emissions reduction targets. Global demand for high quality Australian resources and energy exports, including coal into China is expected to remain strong.
- 22. (a) The limit on sulfur content is not expected to affect Australian coal exporters as Australian coal is well below the required standard. The proposed ash content standard may affect a small number of exporters however these producers have several options to reduce the ash content to meet the required standard.
- (b) The proposed standards do not apply to electricity generators that are fitted with technology to reduce fine particle emissions and who are the main users of imported coals from countries like Australia.
- 23. The Intellectual Property Chapter was negotiated by a team of experienced and appropriately qualified officers.

A range of stakeholder and community views was sought and taken into account during negotiations. In addition DFAT and other agencies conducted informal consultations with stakeholders on particular issues during the course of the negotiations.

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- 27. Obligations in the MNP Chapter under China-Australia free trade agreement will be legally binding on both Australia and China. Answer

1a. The Government has taken every opportunity presented to make representations to Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries and the GCC Secretariat to have Australia be considered a priority country for an early resumption of FTA negotiations.

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- 1b. GCC Foreign Ministers approved on 4 March 2014 conditional resumption of FTA negotiations, almost five years after the GCC suspended FTA negotiations with all its negotiating partners, including Australia, in 2009. There is yet no indication as to when and with which countries the GCC would resume FTA negotiations.
- 1c. With the GCC yet to resume negotiations with Australia, the Department has not allocated any additional funds towards this FTA and has drawn on the existing budget to meet the costs of representations seeking a resumption of the FTA negotiations with the GCC.
- 2a. The GCC applies a common external tariff of 5 per cent on virtually all imports from outside the GCC, including major exports from Australia.
- 2b. Australian exporters have registered a number of concerns about non-tariff barriers to their trade with the GCC. These have been outlined in a study on the prospects and possible benefits of a free trade agreement between Australia and the GCC (https://www.dfat.gov.au/fta/agccfta/agcc-fta-study.html) and in DFAT's submission to the Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade's inquiry into Australia's trade and investment relationships with countries of the Middle East (http://www.aph.gov.au/Parliamentary_Business/Committees/Joint/Foreign_Affairs_Defence_and_Trade/Middle_East_trade_and_investment).
- 2c. This is a question for the Department of Industry.
- 2d. This is a question for the Department of Agriculture.
- 3. Australia's total exports of Alumina were worth \$5.4 billion in 2013 (up 7.6 per cent on 2012) and accounted for 1.7 per cent of total goods and services exports. In quantity terms, Australia's exports were 17.8 million tonnes in 2013 (up 1.8 per cent on 2012).

The Census and Statistics Act 1905 provides the authority for the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to collect statistical information and requires that statistical output shall not be published or disseminated in a manner that is likely to enable the identification of a particular person or organisation.

For Alumina exports, the ABS has published aggregated global exports. However details of the country of final export destination (including country groups) have been suppressed in order to satisfy the requirements of the Act.

1. Foreign Minister Ms Bishop led the Australian delegation at the 14th Meeting of the Council of Ministers (COMM) of the Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA) held in Perth on 9 October 2014. Departmental officials also in attendance included: Deputy Secretary; Acting First Assistant Secretary (South and West Asia Division); Assistant Secretary (Development Operations Branch); Director (India Economic and IORA Section); four officers to support delivery of the policy outcomes; two officers to manage the administrative, security and logistical aspects of the COMM; a media liaison officer to manage the media engagement for the event; and six graduate trainees to act as liaison and coordination points for member country

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delegations. Other government agencies that attended the COMM included Austrade and the AFP.

1a. The IORA COMM's total cost to the Department was \$389,260, not including salaries.

1b. The IORA Economic Declaration was a key trade and investment outcome for the 2014 COMM, committing members to economic integration and driving greater trade and investment in the Indian Ocean rim. A commitment was made to identify gaps and opportunities among IORA members for increasing trade and investment. A parallel series of business events was held with the COMM to deepen understanding of the role of women and private industry in the Indian Ocean rim's development. Projects and activities to further trade and investment are taken forward through the IORA Working Group on Trade and Investment.

2a. There is no intention currently to negotiate a free trade agreement between countries in the Indian Ocean rim.

2b. Australia is currently negotiating the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (RCEP), which includes the following IORA members: India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore and Thailand. Beyond this, the Government works bilaterally with IORA countries to advance Australia's trade interests.

3a. The IORA Economic Diplomacy Fund (\$1million over 2014-2015 drawn from Australian aid program funding) supports activities that contribute to Australian engagement in IORA and the prosperity of the Indian Ocean region. Proposed activities (up to \$200,000 in value) will need to demonstrate alignment with the six priority areas for IORA and Australia's economic diplomacy agenda, as well as meeting effectiveness and accountability criteria. Guidelines have been circulated to relevant Australian government agencies. The criteria reflect internationally agreed OECD DAC aid effectiveness criteria, with proposals required to clearly articulate objectives, relevance and context, effectiveness, efficiency, sustainability, and how gender equality will be progressed through the proposed activity. Successful applicants will be required to report mid-way through their program as well as at its completion.

 The 15 September 2014 informal WTO Heads of Delegations meeting in Geneva was attended by Australia's Permanent Representative to the WTO Hamish McCormick and officers from the Australian Permanent Mission to the WTO.

The meeting was intended to discuss the impasse at the WTO surrounding the Trade Facilitation Agreement Protocol of Acceptance. The meeting confirmed that Members were not in a position to agree on a way forward on that issue.

There were no costs associated with participation at this meeting.

2. The 35th Trade Negotiations Committee (TNC) meeting, postponed until 31 October 2014, was attended by Australia's Permanent Representative to the WTO Hamish McCormick and officers from the Australian Permanent Mission to the WTO in Geneva.

At the meeting the WTO Director General sought the views of WTO Members on what should be done about the impasse over Trade Facilitation, implantation of the Bali package and the implications for the multilateral trading system. There was no agreement among Members on these issues.

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There were no costs associated with participation at this meeting.

3. The blocking by a Member of an agreement unanimously agreed to by Ministers in Bali has eroded trust. The lack of trust among WTO Members will need to be addressed if there are to be productive negotiations in the WTO.

The Department is working to make progress where possible by remaining constructive, pragmatic and consultative. In addition to working to resolve the impasse over Trade Facilitation (answer to QoN 112 provides more detail), the Department remains actively involved across the full spectrum of WTO work. This work encompasses not only the monitoring of compliance with existing WTO rules, but plurilateral negotiation on the expansion of the Information Technology Agreement, on a Trade in Services Agreement, and on an agreement on environmental goods.

- 4. The Department, in consultation with relevant stakeholders, is working to promote Australia's interests in an effective multilateral trading system through encouraging adherence to the outcomes reached at the 9th WTO Ministerial Conference in Bali. In doing so the Government is working closely with other delegations and the Director-General.

Yes. All G20 members included at least one trade facilitation measure in their growth strategies. Many members have also reduced barriers to services that support trade, particularly in transport, logistics and port services and are working to integrate SMEs into the global economy.

4. The number one recommendation by the B20 was the prompt implementation of the Trade Facilitation Agreement. Given the current impasse on this agreement, what alternative growth strategy will Australia recommend?

On 13 November, India announced it had successfully resolved its differences with the US relating to the issue of public stockholding for food security purposes in the WTO, which would open the way for implementation of the Trade Facilitation Agreement.

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The status of disputes where Australia is a respondent is described below.

Tobacco Plain Packaging Disputes

WTO dispute settlement panels have been established in relation to Australia's tobacco plain packaging measure at the requests of Ukraine (on 28 September 2012), Honduras (on 25 September 2013), Indonesia (on 26 March 2014), the Dominican Republic (on 25 April 2014) and Cuba (on 25 April 2014). A large number of WTO Members (41 in total) have joined the disputes as a third party.

On 5 May 2014, the WTO Director-General appointed the panelists who will hear the disputes. The disputes will be heard together pursuant to a harmonised timetable.

On 7 May 2014, Australia filed requests for preliminary procedural rulings in relation to the panel requests made by four of the five complainants (Ukraine, Cuba, the Dominican Republic and Indonesia). The Panel issued its preliminary rulings on 19 August 2014. These rulings confirmed the measures at issue in the disputes are limited to Australia's tobacco plain packaging measure and excluded certain claims from being pursued by Ukraine in its dispute.

The complainants filed their first written submissions with evidence on 8 October 2014 in Geneva.

The Panel has advised that it does not expect to issue its final report to the parties before the first half of 2016.

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Estimated costs of disputes

The Department's Trade Law Branch is responsible for representing Australia in WTO disputes. It does not bill for its services. Therefore, it is not possible to estimate costs related to dispute activity.

2. Australia is the respondent to an investor-State dispute concerning tobacco plain packaging, brought by Philip Morris Asia under the Australia-Hong Kong Bilateral Investment Treaty. The Attorney General's Department, in collaboration with DFAT and the Department of Health, has the lead on the preparation of Australia's defence in that dispute.

A hearing on Australia's request for bifurcation of the proceedings was held before the Tribunal in Singapore on 20 and 21 February 2014. Bifurcation is the term which describes the separation of the proceedings into two phases: a preliminary jurisdictional phase and a subsequent merits phase, if required. On 14 April 2014, the Tribunal issued Procedural Order No.8, deciding to bifurcate the proceedings.

PM Asia submitted its Counter-Memorial on Australia's Preliminary Objections on 7 July 2014. Australia filed its Reply on 1 December 2014. PM Asia's Rejoinder was filed on 12 January 2015.

The hearing on Preliminary Objections will begin in Singapore on 16 February 2015.

Additionally, domains that carry significant content will often store their video or images in third party content servers. The user would be recorded as downloading data from the third party content server, rather than the domain they visited.

CODE OF CONDUCT

POLICY SCOPE: All EFIC Staff

LAST REVIEWED: March 2013

POLICY STATEMENT

The Code of Conduct is a principal policy that applies to all EFIC staff and management, including the Executive. This policy is also accessible form within the EFIC Workplace Agreement 2008-11.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the Code of Conduct Addendum.

OBJECTIVES

The EFIC Code of Conduct outlines the obligations and responsibilities of all employees employed by EFIC. EFIC employees are required to comply with the Code of Conduct.

GENERAL RESPONSIBILITY

In their employment, employees have a responsibility to:

- be impartial and objective;
- consider matters on their merits;
- perform to the best of their ability, with honesty and integrity;
- treat everyone with courtesy and respect, without coercion or harassment of any kind;
- not participate in corrupt practices, including bribing foreign officials₁ or accepting undisclosed benefits for or from any third party;
- not pursue personal interests which may conflict with EFIC's interests; and
- comply with applicable Australian laws and EFIC's policies, procedures and guidelines as amended from time to time.

FINANCIAL AND OTHER PRIVATE INTERESTS

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(a) Official Duty and Private Interest

Employees must make a written declaration to EFIC if their private interests (financial or other) may, or may be perceived to, conflict with EFIC's interests. Some examples of situations which must be declared are where an employee:

- holds a position of influence in connection with a company or an organisation which is a supplier to EFIC or which has applied to EFIC for a financial facility;
- holds shares in, or is a member of, a company or an organisation that is a supplier to EFIC or which has applied to EFIC for a financial facility.

In addition, any employee who has had a prior dealing or association (direct or indirect) with an organisation which could be seen to influence their impartiality, should offer, in writing, to exclude themselves from EFIC's dealings with the relevant organisation.

All EFIC employees are expected to be familiar with the Code of Conduct as amended from time to time. In addition, the employee must inform EFIC in writing of every actual or potential conflict of interest of which they become aware, including in relation to the employee's immediate Family.

Declarations in connection with conflicts of interest should be given to the relevant Executive.

(b) Acceptance of Gifts and Entertainment

EFIC employees should make a diary note of any gift, hospitality or entertainment received in connection with their employment that is specifically targeted at the EFIC employee. Diary notes are not required for public events or hospitality that involve a number of entities, unless in the employee's judgment the invitation to the event or the hospitality could be construed to relate to business matters under consideration by EFIC.

In accepting any gifts, hospitality or entertainment, the employee should consider the motivation for the offer and the value of the benefit being provided.

Employees are to advise the Board Secretary of any gift received which exceeds AUD 60.00 in value. This amount may be increased at any time at the discretion of the Board Secretary. The Managing Director will decide whether gifts will be kept by the employee, handed over to EFIC or returned to the giver.

(c) Inducements

Employees should not accept inducements that may, or may be seen to, influence them in the performance of their official duties. The relevant Executive must be promptly advised of any attempt to improperly influence the employee.

(d) Outside Employment

An EFIC employee who wishes to engage in any outside employment or voluntary positions which may impact adversely upon their employment with EFIC, is required to obtain prior

written approval from the relevant Executive. Appointments in this case include appointment as Non-Executive Directors to Boards.

FRAUD CONTROL PROGRAM

Employees have a responsibility to make themselves aware of, and comply with, EFIC's Fraud Control Program. The Program document, as in force from time to time, will be displayed on the EFIC intranet site.

USE OF INFORMATION

(a) Confidential Records

Employees are required to respect the confidentiality of, and keep secret, any information or documentation concerning EFIC and EFIC's clients to which they have access as a result of their employment with EFIC.

Employees must not use information or records for any improper purpose, and should take all steps to safeguard the confidentiality of confidential information and documentation. Employees are obliged to observe the secrecy provisions of Section 87 of the EFIC Act as in force from time to time. If employees have difficulty interpreting this Act, they should contact the Legal Department.

Employees are also obliged to comply with the confidentiality provisions of the EFIC Act even after they cease to be employed by EFIC.

Details of the confidentiality obligations of employees are set out in the Confidentiality Policy, which can be found on the EFIC intranet site. Employees must familiarise themselves with the Confidentiality Policy as in force from time to time.

(b) Intellectual Property

EFIC retains ownership of all specific knowledge, documentation, processes and technologies developed by an employee in the performance of their duties.

(c) Public Comment

Unless an employee has been nominated by the Executive as a spokesperson, an employee should decline to make public comment on any issues relating to political matters (in their capacity as an EFIC employee), EFIC business, EFIC's clients, or employment with EFIC.

USE OF EFIC COMPUTERS

EFIC's computer equipment is provided to conduct EFIC business and may be used for limited appropriate personal use which is not in conflict with EFIC's interests.

Employees must abide by EFIC's IT Security Policy and Guidelines and the Internet Communications Policy, which can be found on the EFIC intranet site.

PERSONAL BEHAVIOUR

(a) Duty of Care

Employees have a duty of care in the performance of their role. They should ensure to the best of their ability that all information distributed is accurate, complete and balanced.

(b) Peformance of Duties

Employees are required to perform their job diligently and to the best of their ability, and accept reasonable direction from their manager.

Employees must exercise due care in the use of all EFIC property, in order to minimise potential risk of loss or damage.

(c) Use of Facilities for Private Purposes

EFIC allows employees reasonable access to EFIC's facilities for private purposes provided this does not conflict with their job responsibilities or with EFIC's interests.

Employees are expected not to misuse this privilege and should obtain prior approval from their manager for any extended or extraordinary use of EFIC facilities.

(d) Professional Conduct

EFIC employees should be courteous and professional in their dealings with their colleagues and all representatives of the public, government and business with whom they have contact.

EFIC's commitments to its clients are outlined in the Service Charter and all employees should contribute to the achievement of these commitments.

SANCTION

Failure to follow the Code of Conduct may result in disciplinary action and/or dismissal.

Addendum

Acceptance of gifts and entertainment

There is a general recognition within EFIC that the receipt of hospitality or entertainment, and to a limited extent gifts, is acceptable provided that proper disclosure is made and appropriate ethical and related policies and guidelines are followed.

EFIC employees should make a diary note of any gift, hospitality or entertainment received in connection with their employment and then notify their Manager that they have accepted the gift, hospitality or entertainment. For the purposes of this policy, gifts may include travel and or accommodation provided by a host in connection with a conference.

Employees are to seek approval from the Board Secretary of any gift, hospitality or entertainment received which exceeds AUD \$300.00 in value. This amount may be increased at any time at the discretion of the Executive. The Executive will decide whether gifts will be kept by the employee, handed over to EFIC or returned to the giver.

In accepting any gift, hospitality or entertainment, the employee should consider the motivation for the offer and the value of the benefit being provided. Employees may use EFIC's computer equipment for EFIC business or limited personal use which is not in conflict with EFIC's interests.

Employees must abide by EFIC's <u>Corporate Information Security Policy</u> and the <u>Information Security</u> <u>Charter</u> (which are available on the Intranet) as in force from time to time.
