In the rare case that entertainment costs are incurred by PM&C the costs are not recorded separately from official hospitality.

2. The Prime Minister's official hospitality is funded through administered funding appropriated for State Occasions and Official Visits and Ceremonial Hospitality. For the period 14 September 2015 to 29 February 2016, the official hospitality spend was \$64,541.09 (GST exclusive). Details are provided at Attachment B.

Other less significant hospitality is funded from departmental funds for support of portfolio ministers' offices. No departmental hospitality for portfolio ministers has been incurred by PM&C for the period 14 September 2015 to 29 February 2016.

Entertainment provided at official functions hosted by the Prime Minister is provided through funding appropriated for the Ceremonial and Hospitality Branch. For the period 14 September 2015 to 29 February 2016, the entertainment spend was \$1,722.36 (GST exclusive). Details are provided at Attachment B.

The terms of reference for the review is to determine the most efficient and effective way to deliver short-term accommodation services that are agile and responsive to the needs of the client base, recognising that these services are essential and should be continued. 2. There are 80 desktops and 27 laptops in reserve stock at the Andrew Fisher building in Barton, ready for deployment. It is not possible to provide an inventory report of computers accessed by PM&C because the asset database captures all assets including those to be disposed and those used by other agencies. Separating the information would require an unreasonable diversion of departmental resources.

3. The standard operating system for computers on the PM&C's protected network is Windows 7 Enterprise which falls under the Whole of Government Microsoft Volume Sourcing Arrangement. Ongoing costs for FY2015/16 is \$28 (GST exclusive) per user.

On 18 September 2013, the then Minister Assisting the Prime Minister for the Public Service, Senator the Hon. Eric Abetz, signed a determination under section 24(3) of the *Public Service Act 1999* that preserved the conditions of employment for non-SES employees that applied to them immediately before the Administrative Arrangements Orders were made. Approximately 60 per cent of employees in PM&C remain covered by this Determination. The Determination has no expiry date and will operate until it is replaced by another instrument, including an agreed enterprise agreement. Terms and conditions preserved by the determination include those in:

- *Attorney-General's Department Enterprise Agreement 2011;*
- *DEEWR Enterprise Agreement 2012-2014;*
- *Department of Broadband, Communications and the Digital Economy Enterprise Agreement 2011-2014;*
- *Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs Enterprise Agreement 2012 to 2014;*
- *Department of Finance and Deregulation Enterprise Agreement 2011-2014;*
- *Department of Health and Ageing Enterprise Agreement 2011-2014;*
- *Department of Regional Australia, Regional Development and Local Government Enterprise Agreement 2011;*
- *Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities Enterprise Agreement 2011-2014;* and

- *One Innovation Enterprise Agreement 2011.*
