Senator Singh (L&CA 90) asked:

Senator SINGH: How many infringement notices have been issued by the ACPBS over the past 12 months? Also, do you have a breakdown of offences, of the number of infringement notices issued?

Mr Quaedvlieg: I will take that on notice, unless very helpfully some staff come up with some more material, which they have just done in relation to your question on undeclared cash. Let me go back and finalise my response to that. Year-to-date, in relation to undeclared cash detections, there have been 330 detections to a total value of \$9,662,171. Compared to the previous years, in 2012-13 there were 308 detections for the full year for a sum of \$7.6 million, and for the 2011-12 financial year there were 279 detections for a total sum of \$5.4 million. You will note from those figures that the figures are substantially up this financial year, year-to-date. Again, that is to 31 March.
