Senator O'Sullivan (L&CA 64) asked:

Senator O'SULLIVAN: Of the 30,000—I am just relying upon your independent knowledge of this and I do not need you to take it on notice—are you able to say within some reasonable parameters how many might be referred outside? How many of the 30,000 survive the journey and end up at the Australian Federal Police or some other agency?

Mr Vardos: No, I cannot I am sorry. I would need to ask. I will take that on notice.

Answer:

The National Allegations Assessment Team (NAAT) reports on the number of allegations that have been referred onto other areas of the department, and those referred to external agencies. It is important to note, that other business areas may share allegation information with external agencies. The below table only provides centrally controlled referrals.
