Senator Cameron asked:

CHAIR: I am interested in the department's use of video conferencing. Can you tell me the savings you have achieved from video conferencing between areas of the department and with the minister in his office. I would like information on flight and travel costs saved and time savings from avoided travel.

Ms Carlos: I will have to take the detail of that question on notice and come back to you, but we do broadly use a fair amount of video conferencing. We have connections through to AAD in Tasmania, the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority in Townsville and our supervising scientist in Darwin. We use these facilities on a weekly basis in terms of running our management meetings. We also use them when we have larger conferences. There is quite a broad use of video conferencing. We also video conference with the minister when he is

CHAIR: When you implemented this process did you use it as a savings measure?

Ms Carlos: No. I was not with the department when they implemented it, but we can certainly do some estimates of what travel has been avoided by the various line areas.

Answer:

The Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities (the department) primary business driver for the implementation of video conferencing was raising organisational effectiveness by improving business collaboration between central, regional and remote offices.

Below is a breakdown of the number of video conferences initiated by the Minister and those initiated by departmental sites between 1 July 2011 and 30 April 2012¹:

The connection costs for video conferences are calculated at approximately \$200 per hour which includes the monthly line costs, call charges, infrastructure, maintenance and resourcing.

As the department does not record the specific details of individual video conferences it is not possible to directly quantify travel savings, however an indication of potential savings can by gained by comparison with averaged costs for staff travel, meals and transfers.

If each of the 758 departmental-initiated video conferences obviated the need for travel of at least one staff member a saving of over \$567,000² would be acheived. This is in addition to the productivity saving realised by staff not spending many hours travelling.

² Based on 758 one-hour department initiated video-conferences at a cost of \$151,600 compared to 758 trips to Sydney at a cost of \$719,084.

Could you just have a check through and see whether there has been any update to the procedures since the ANAO report was released. And if there were any variations, can you advise us of any changes to those procedures that may have occurred from the departmental perspective to ensure that ministers don't inadvertently breach the guidelines again, please?

Dr Grimes: We can see what further information we can provide you with.

Answer:

Prior to late 2007, there was no official guidance provided to agencies relating specifically to the administration of grant programs.

To further support the 2009 Commonwealth Grant Guidelines, the Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities (the department) implemented a robust Grants Administration Framework in early 2011. This highlighted the responsibilities of Ministers and departmental officials in relation to the administration and approval of grant funding programs. Quality assurance processes are also well documented to assist the department with its compliance obligations.

Since the ANAO Report - Administration of Grant Reporting Obligations (covering the period 1 January 2009 to 30 June 2010) was tabled on 24 January 2012; departmental staff have been advised to report on any grant which may cross into the Minister's electorate, regardless of the level of percentage of the grant which may be involved. This is to overcome any ambiguity as to whether reporting obligations include the location of the physical project funded by the grant, or the location of the applicant undertaking the grant, or both.

There has also been an increased level of training, awareness raising and centralisation of the grants management function for relevant staff, particularly as the new Commonwealth Grant Guidelines come into effect on 1 July 2012.

Note also, that 1 (a) of this response stated that 172 travelled overseas when the answer should have been 128 staff; and 1(d) stated 146 travelled business class, when the answer should have been 102.

For the period 1 February 2011 to 30 April 2012:

- 1. 75 staff travelled overseas.
- 2. **Attachment A** provides details for overseas travel by division and classification level, noting that total expenses includes only those expenses paid by the Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities (the department). In some cases travel was partially or fully sponsored by third parties.
- 3. Only one person travelled first class during this period.
- 4. All departmental staff may travel business class for overseas travel, however depending on business needs and available aircraft this is often not the case. The department does not record travel data in a way that readily allows identification of numbers of staff travelling business class but we can advise that no more than 60 staff travelled business class.

For the period 1 February 2012 to 30 April 2012:

1. The total cost of overseas travel for the Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities (the department) was \$844,797. This amount is subject to minor change due to industry delays in processing variations to air travel.

Please refer to **Attachment A** for all international travel itemised by trip, noting that:

- a. In some cases overseas travel is undertaken with or solely by non-departmental staff.
- b. Meal Costs and Total Costs include only those expenses paid by the department. In some cases travel was partially or fully sponsored by third parties.
- c. As it is departmental policy to pay for international accommodation by departmental credit card where possible, most of these expenses are not recorded against trips in the financial management information system. While these expenses are included in the total costs specified in both Questions one and two, they cannot be broken down by trip without substantial diversion of departmental resources.
- d. Purpose and specific outcomes have not been compiled due to the extended resources required to prepare this information. However, it should be noted that all overseas travel is subject to strict guidelines and is initially scrutinised and approved by a Deputy Secretary. It is then subject to a further review and approval process by the Department's Executive Board.

Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities ¹

The Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities (the department) provides staff with opportunities to access job related learning and individual career development activities, including in-house training organised and/or delivered by divisions, corporate expert areas of the department (for example financial management and procurement) and the central workforce development function; training and development sourced externally to the department; and support to undertake external study through educational institutions.

The department currently does not have a mechanism to fully capture and centrally record details of all learning and development activities undertaken by employees, nor the total expenditure on this function. Efforts are underway to improve the capture of data in this regard. While it is not possible to give a comprehensive report on all learning and development activity and expenditure across the department, it is possible to report on training packages organised and/or delivered through the department's central workforce development function. These are reported at 2a below.

In addition, under the department's Enterprise Agreement, staff members may apply for study support involving study leave during normal working hours and a bursary of between \$1,300 and \$2,600 per annum depending on the type of course. Expenditure on study support is reported in 2b below, excluding the value of the leave component. The amount of study leave granted to each participant varies depending on the requirements of the course and the needs of the individual and their work area. It is not possible to accurately report on the amount of leave accessed for the purpose of external study as individuals may use various forms of leave and may or may not record it as being for the purpose of study.

It should also be noted that in a small number of cases, the full costs of a course may have been met by the department for a participant, including for eligible Indigenous staff members as a specific condition of the Enterprise Agreement. However it is not possible to accurately report on such instances as various learning and development accounting codes may have been used and it may not be clear that payments are specifically for fee reimbursements.

Bureau of Meteorology

The Bureau of Meteorology's (the Bureau) guidelines for formal study are presented as "Study-bank" Policy and Procedures. Study-bank aims to enable and encourage staff to undertake formal secondary, tertiary and post-graduate study activities. Only approved students are eligible for study leave.

In broad terms the objectives of Study-bank are to:

- satisfy the Bureau's needs to achieve corporate goals, manage change and extend organisational effectiveness;
- improve an individual's current and future job performance;
- enhance an individual's adaptability and mobility within the Bureau and across the Australian Public Service (APS); and
- help the APS achieve its strategic objectives.

Study-bank achieves these aims and objectives by providing assistance at three different levels:

- approval of student/scheme of study;
- four categories of study leave to cover regular weekly activities, irregular activities, travel to and from examinations or leave without pay to undertake full-time study; and
- financial assistance (in the form of a bursary to support approved study-related purposes).

 - an additional five hours per semester/per unit for attendance at examinations; and/or
 - \$5,000 (five thousand dollars) per year toward course fees and charges.
- An employee may only claim for reimbursement upon successful completion of the unit/s studied. To substantiate the claim the employee must provide the Assistant Director HR Operations with the following documentation:
 - a completed Study Assistance Reimbursement form (attachment B) authorised by his/her General Manager;
 - official notification of his/her results demonstrating that the student has met course or unit requirements;
 - (c) tax invoice(s) identifying course tuition fees and charges; and
 - (d) receipt for the full payment of the unit of study.
- Employees who elect the deferred payment option (currently known as) HECS-HELP
 via PAYE instalments or who have any other financial support through Government,
 private or other grants/scholarships, Commonwealth loans or any other forms of
 official sponsorship will not be eligible for financial support through the Authority's

Answer:

 The Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water Population and Communities (the department) has entered into a Whole of Government (WoG) contract between the Commonwealth of Australia, represented by the Department of Defence, and ERM Power Limited for its Canberra sites. This agreement is for the period 1 July 2011 to 30 June 2015 and covers the Australian Capital Territory (ACT) and New South Wales (NSW).

Electricity for the department's office in Tasmania is provided by the landlord, Australian Antarctic Division Nominees, with two current leases. One commenced on 1 July 2004 and ends 30 June 2024 and the second commenced 1 July 2007 and ends 30 June 2017.

The department has two tenancies in the Northern Territory. The department's tenancy at Darwin Airport purchases its electricity from the sub-lessor, Darwin International Airport. The current sub-lease commenced on 24 July 2002 and ends on 23 July 2017. The department's field station at Jabiru has its electricity supplied by Energy Resources Australia, Ranger Mine. There is no current formal agreement in place.

The Director of National Parks has entered into the same WoG (ACT and NSW) contract for the same period for the Australian National Botanic Gardens.

The Sydney Harbour Federation Trust has also entered into the same WoG (ACT and NSW) contract for the same period for its large sites. All remaining smaller sites are on normal commercial business plans with Energy Australia. These are standard commercial contracts, so there is no fixed end date.

The Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority has no current formal agreement in place.

The Murray Darling Basin Authority's electricity contract with ActewAGL was transitioned from the former Murray-Darling Basin Commission on 15 December 2008 and has no specific end date.

The National Water Commission (the Commission) has not entered into a purchasing agreement with an electricity provider. Due to the Commission's small size and low electricity usage, the Commission is unable to participate in the whole-of-government electrical power contract arrangement. Electricity is currently purchased from ActewAGL on a monthly usage basis.

The Bureau of Meteorology has 5 electricity purchasing agreements; all of the other sites are on standard connection rates.

- In developing departmental policies and programs, stakeholders are actively encouraged during consultation phases to discuss issues related to their individual or group access and equity concerns concerns through communuity meetings, reference panels, social media etcetera.
- The department provides a range of communication mechanisms for people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds to learn about the work of the department and to provide feedback.
- Within the department, a number of initiatives are undertaken to ensure departmental employees have an understanding of access and equity issues and have the skills to provide services to a multicultural Australian public.
- The department's Enterprise Agreement provides a governance framework for terms and conditions of employment which allows human resource practitioners and delegates to identify and respond quickly to emerging issues affecting the diverse needs of staff.
- The department's Diversity Plan 2009-2012 includes the following initiatives to ensure that the government's Access and Equity Strategy is implemented:

- online orientation for remote locations includes location-specific electronic modules for staff in remote and regional areas. This ensures all employees receive essential employment information customised to ensure relevance to their workplace;
- corporate diversity awareness training provided at least eight times during the financial year is available to all Canberra and Hobart based staff. The training promotes principles of equity and productive diversity in the department. This covers not only cultural diversity but all areas of differences among employees;
- a Spoken and Written English for Speakers of Other Languages Program delivered between September 2010 and May 2011 was organised specifically for departmental employees to improve spoken and written English skills for employees whose first language is not English; and
- guest speakers from community organisations at an all staff presentation for Harmony Day were invited to raise awareness for diversity.
- 2. Clients from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds can provide feedback or make a complaint through a variety of communication methods. This includes a toll-free number, face-to-face with outposted departmental employees, through the website, by email or by letter. Complaints are managed through a departmental community information unit and are reported to senior management on a regular basis.
 - Further, the department is required to contribute to the whole of government annual access and equity report which is managed by the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC). This provides an opportunity to review and highlight the department's responsiveness to client needs and detail the full extent of achievements in this regard. Annual access and equity reports are available on DIAC's website.
- 3. The department is currently undertaking an evaluation of its existing diversity plan 'Diversity Works 2009-2012'. Following the outcome of this evaluation, the plan will be updated and improvements sought through a consultation process.
- 4. The department's corporate learning and development function undertakes a key role in ensuring that the department has a culturally competent workforce through delivery of the following programs:
- Diversity Awareness Training promotes the principles of equity and diversity within the department.
- Indigenous Cultural Awareness Training promotes greater understanding of, and appreciation for, Indigenous Australian cultures.
